by the roaring planes, took to the air from the islands, forcing the ships to climb higher for safety.

Flight and Search
Topics in Congress
Criticism of Miss Earhart's flight and the navy's conduct of the search was voiced in the house of representatives in Washington.

Representative Collins (D-Miss) objected to the time necessary to get planes into the search and said America would have slight chance of winning a war if its air force performed no better than the naval forces seeking the aviator.

"Miss Earhart was forced down in easy flying distance of Honolulu more than a week ago," he said, "and if news accounts can be believed only three planes have reached the spot."

A navy flying boat which started out from Honolulu was turned back several days ago by a severe storm.

Representative Scott (D-Calif) said it was time for someone in authority to announce the navy will not hunt for "publicity stunt" fliers in the future.

At Paris Hill, Me., Lieut. Comdr. Harry W. Lyon, navigator for Capt. Charles J. Kingsford-Smith on the Britisher's flight to Australia in 1935, said tonight he saw no hope for the safety of Miss Earhart. Lyon, familiar with large areas of the Pacific through service with the U. S. merchant marine, said he believed Miss Earhart and her navigator met death 300 miles south of the Howland island group.

Convinced the plane was forced down, Lyon said it would be wrecked by ordinary seas. He added there was no inhabited island

within 300 miles and that Miss Earhart's supply of drinking water was too small to last for more than a few days. Shark-infested waters would add to the hazards of a forced landing, he said.

H. E. Barker, president of the Salem Trades and Labor council, is general chairman for the picnic and Harry Savage secretary. Committee chairmen include R. Turner, finance; Ralph Harlan, tickets; Les Peterson, speakers; C. F. Fish, parade and grounds; C. A. Chambers, food; Mrs. Les Peterson, picnic store; Harry Savage, refreshments; Gene Kennedy, publicity; and L. S. McIntyre, entertainment.

Among the day's speakers will be S. Stephenson Smith, University of Oregon professor, and Roy R. Hewitt of Salem. Others are yet to be arranged for.

A softball game between Walt's and Hogg Bros. of the major city league will be played at 3 p. m. on the picnic grounds.
