History Drama Is at Elsinore

"Parnell" Concerns Noted Irish Leader; Gable, Myrna Loy Star

The tensely human story of a love that affected nations is drawn vividly in the fictional drama of "Parnell," uncrowned King of Ireland, which Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer offers at the Elsinore theatre, with Clark Gable and Myrna Loy in the starring roles.

Gable and Miss Loy are superb in their respective roles as the fiery Irish leader and the beautiful Katie O'Shea, whom he loves beyond any fame or fortune that political power might bring.

"Parnell," as it is here presented, becomes international, although it remains essentially Irish of course. But always, it is the dramatic love story of a striking individual and a gorgeous woman, presented with supreme artistry.

The supporting cast is one of the most impressive ever assembled for a picture. Included are Edna May Oliver, Billie Burke, Alan Marshall, Edmund Gwenn, Donald Crisp, Berton Churchill, Donald Meek and others.

The story describes the historical rise of Parnell, who was the only man ever to unite the 86 members of the Irish party in a struggle for home rule. His love of Katie O'Shea, a married woman, the scandal which results when he estranged husband, Willie O'Shea, divorces her, and the collapse of Parnell's political career, are closely followed with all of their dramatic qualities.

"Slave Ship" now Playing at Grand

Baxter, Beery in Typical Roles With Colorful Sea Background

Storming in epic sweep over half the world, as the last slave sails on its last desperate voyage, "Slave Ship" opened yesterday at the Grand theatre, giving the screen a new claimant for the title of mightiest of all the sea sagas. In the most colorful role of a colorful career, Warner Baxter plays Captain Jim Lovett, romantic scourge of two seas, who defies the navies of the world, is betrayed by a shipmate, and fights at last for love in the greatest sea adventure of them all.

Wallace Beery, whose long list of shipboard roles reads like a veritable history of the salt-water cinema, sinks his teeth into a meaty role that presents him as the villainous mate of the slaver—big-titted, bull-headed, genial, and treacherous to his dying breath, one minute a roaring beast the next, a gentle child; friend and foe alike to the captain he serves—and betrays.

"Slave Ship" traces the tempestuous career of a swift bark engaged in the slave trade, as its courageous captain, Warner Baxter, who planned to retire from "blackbirding" to settle down to

a new life with his young bride, Elizabeth Allan.

As they sail on Baxter's boat on the honeymoon cruise which is to mark the end of its days as a slaver, they find that they have been betrayed by the mate, Wallace Beery, and the crew, avid for more slaving profits. The honeymoon cruise is turned into a voyage in which they are continually brought face to face with danger and death.

Sought by the navies of every nation, and torn by mutiny aboard, the slave ship sails on through adventures on the high seas and along the African coast, and it is a dramatic climax which clears the future for the captive couple and sends the ill-fated slaver to its ominous destiny.

Powerful Drama Seen at Capitol

"Midnight Madonna" Will Introduce new Stars of Great Ability

"Midnight Madonna," the dynamic story of mother-love which opens today at the Capitol theatre, serves to introduce two new personalities to the screen who, this reviewer has no hesitancy in predicting, will be at the top rung of stardom before very many more seasons are out.

They are lovely Mady Correll, recently recruited from the New York stage, and charming little Kitty Clancy, a child prodigy for whom no other word but the overworked "sensational" would be adequate. Miss Correll is beautiful, an accomplished actress and a sympathetic personality, all of which will carry her to the top. But little Kitty, who has never been on the stage or screen before has all the elements of a great little actress which are going to endear her to America's filmgoers as few child actors ever have. And that's in writing.

The story, which features handsome Warren William in the leading romantic role, concerns the battle for the custody of her child fought by Miss Correll, and Robert Baldwin, the worthless father. The child had been made sole beneficiary of a large legacy and in order to get her the father besmirches the mother's character. The father wins the child in court but things are ironed out successfully and in a very novel manner by William, a big-time gambler, who is in love with Miss Correll.

"Midnight Madonna" is fast moving, gripping and taut. Miss Correll, cast as a night club entertainer, sings a new hit tune against a background of rhythmic show girls. It is "The Plain Old Blues," written by Arthur Johnston and John Burke.

'A Family Affair' On at Hollywood

He averts divorce and settles the domestic difficulties of the older daughter, then proves to the town that his decision prevented what would unquestionably have been disaster.
