Pioneer Kinsmen To Meet July 25

McAlpin, Jones, Terhune Reunion Will Be at Silverton Park

Descendants of three pioneer settlers of 1851-52 will gather in Silverton city park Sunday, July 25, for their annual picnic.

Robert McAlpin, his wife Jane and six children, in company with his sister, Margaret Jane Terhune, her husband James and three children, left Sarnas, Mo., for Oregon in March, 1851. A year later he was followed by another brother-in-law, Lewis Jones, and his wife, Mary Ann, and seven children.

Arriving in Marion county in September, 1851, McAlpin settled in the Waldo Hills about 15 miles southeast of Salem near the present site of the McAlpin school. Terhune went to Santiam City on the Santiam about one mile below the present town of Jefferson where he operated a ferry for many years. When Jones arrived he stopped for a time with McAlpin then located at Union Hill and lived there for five or six years before moving to the Santiam, not far from Terhune.

These pioneers were of a thrifty, honest and hard-working heritage and took a large part in the building and development of the new country. They were all blessed with large families. McAlpin had twelve children, Terhune had 13 and Jones 14. Four of these children survive. To name all the grandchildren and the great and great-grand children would be to call the roll of a large part of Marion county and other sections of Oregon and even of Washington and California.
