

Simpson Clan Has Its Ninth Reunion

Annual Meeting Held at State Fairgrounds Is Mecca for Many

ZENA—The ninth annual reunion of the clan of William and Mary Simpson, who crossed the plains with their ten children from Missouri in 1846, was held at the state fairgrounds Sunday.

The oldest descendant present was James B. Simpson, 80, who is the son of David Simpson and his wife Julia Ann Haven Simpson, and the grandson of William and Mary Simpson. The youngest was Darryl, 9, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Blivin (Sybil Simpson) of Portland and great-grandson of the pioneers.

A bounteous basket dinner, which was centered by a birthday cake baked by Wilma Crawford for her great uncle James B. Simpson, preceded the afternoon program, presided over by the new president, John Simpson. The program included a prayer by Mrs. B. J. Simpson, a speech by an old family friend, Henry Porter, whose family came across the plains in 1849 and settled as near neighbors of the Simpson family.

Mr. Porter said that the Simpson family played a great part in settling this country. It would seem almost like an old Biblical pilgrimage when they started across the plains, with their father, William, who was a Baptist preacher, as patriarch of the train and with all their household goods, oxen, mules and horses. Benjamin, eldest son, was chosen as captain of the train. He had three children, John, Sylvester and Samuel L. Simpson, the latter being author of the classical poem "Beautiful Willamette," which was read by Mrs. Clyde Blivin, at the request of Mr. Porter. He offered a cash prize to the youngest Simpson who could recite this poem at the next reunion.

History Is Read

Mrs. Blivin read the life history of James B. Simpson, whose 80th birthday anniversary occurred in June. John Simpson read an interesting article written July 28, 1929 concerning the second reunion held on that date. Judge D'Arcy, deceased, old family friend, was present then and gave the early history of the Simpson clan.

John Simpson exhibited some wonderfully preserved articles of clothing made of homespun, which were brought from Carolina and were made over 160 years ago. Among them were a pair of white trousers, part of a wedding suit, a long cape, sunbonnet, two children's dresses, and a black silk shoulder cape.

West Salem Prepares for Regatta, Popularity Contest Opening Today

WEST SALEM—The popularity contest, which will be an important part of the big West Salem regatta to be held August 10 to 14, opens today, Corey J. Conley, general regatta chairman, announced.

Contestants will sell buttons which will entitle the owner to a seat in the grandstand each of the five evenings and also give the contestant votes. It is expected that lodges and business houses will sponsor girls for the popularity contest although the contest is open to all. Contestants must be between the ages of 16 and 26.

Contestants for the boating events to be run off may sign up at the administration building here beginning Thursday.

During the first evening as a fill-in until the queen and princesses are elected, there will be a bathing beauty contest with the winner selected by the audience. It is also hoped that the famous "Sons and Daughters of Neptune" water show may be secured for the evening entertainment.

Fireworks Scheduled

Each night there will be from an hour to an hour and half's entertainment. On the closing night there will be a display of fireworks. There will be diving acts, swimming contests and boat racing during the five days of the water regatta and carnival.

The Browning Amusement company, with headquarters in Salem, is furnishing concessions and rides during the regatta and carnival. Each evening the Mel-low Moon Dance pavilion will be open for dancing.

A 300 foot grandstand will be built along the water front to afford the best view of the various contests and a fence will be put along the river bank to keep children from falling in.

This carnival and water regatta is sponsored by the West Salem Community club and a large share of the money taken in will be spent on the playground which will be used not only by children and adults of West Salem but of Salem and surrounding towns. A big float and diving mast will be built to afford safety in swimming here in the river. Equipment will also be bought for the double tennis courts to make them more up-to-date.
