

Records Show Business Good

Advance Seen in Building and Various Other of Indices for State

PORTLAND, July 22—(AP)—Led by building trade activities, business records in Oregon industry for the 1937 half year and quarter topped those of 1936. The figures compiled by the research department of the Portland chamber of commerce included all but livestock estimates, which were unavailable.

The prosperity curve for the month of June kept pace with the quarter marks and was above June, 1936 levels. Building trades exceeded the first six months a year ago by 116 per cent. June livestock reports gained 15.8 per cent over the corresponding month last year.

Improved banking conditions were noted by the survey, which showed gains in most departments. Bank clearings were up 19.79 per cent and bank debts, 20.22 per cent.

Other gains:
Postal receipts 9.6 per cent; money orders (3 months) 12.6 per cent; express shipments, 9.79 per cent; electric energy sales 12.04 per cent; manufactured gas sales (3 months) 8.02 per cent; newspaper advertising 7.56 per cent; customs collections 25.6 per cent; lumber production (Fir) 19.3 per cent, (Pine) 15.05 per cent; brass and aluminum castings (3 months) 53.1 per cent.

The increase in banking deposits has "partially been brought about by government spending," the summary stated. "However, the better prices being received, particularly by growers of farm and livestock products generally, as well as better conditions in the timber industry, probably represent the major portion of this increase."

The review found that building's boom would soar even higher except for rising costs of labor and material, and the mortgage lending facilities of savings and loan associations will be taxed for several years before the loan needs are satisfied, according to numerous sources.

Livestock men stated higher prices and the best pasturage in years have aided them materially.

ness shot lumber production upward but eastern strikes have tapered it off. The accumulation of orders from the maritime strike aided production in addition to the building upswing the past six months. "The industry is still in a strong position, with smaller inventories and fifty per cent more unfilled orders than a year ago," the review stated.

"The serious loss of its former export markets," has been one of the greatest handicaps of the west coast lumber industry. "The British empire preferential tariffs have taken over 85 per cent of our former off-shore sales to British dominions and with the disturbed conditions in the orient, our total off-shore business is less than one-third of what it used to be."

The survey showed that labor, receiving a large part of the gains in lumber, was getting an average wage at camps and sawmills of 76.9 per cent in May against 67.5 a year ago.

Advertising campaigns of Oregon were credited with much of the 22 per cent gain in tourist travel the first six months.

A review of national prices for farm products as compared to prices paid in Oregon showed that producers of oats, barley, rye, potatoes, veal calves, butterfat, milk cows and horses were receiving more on June 15 than the national average, while raisers of wheat corn, hay, apples, hogs, beef cattle, sheep, lambs, wholesale milk, livechick-

ens, eggs, wool and mules were getting less.

It was the result of a letter written by the Santa Fe railroad to the University of Arizona agricultural experiment station asking if any report were available on ground water conditions along the Santa Fe right of way in northern Arizona.

The railroad was informed one of its employees, N. H. Dorton, had compiled the most comprehensive report ever made on that section of the state. The Santa Fe wrote to say it had found a copy of the report in its files.

Roumanian Flier After new Mark

EDMONTON, Alta., Canada, July 22—(AP)—Confirmation that Prince Constantin Cantacuzino Roumanian aviator, will attempt to set a new round-the-world flight record within the next two weeks, was received today from the Vancouver office of the Shell Oil company.

The tentative date for the flight, presumably to be made in a westward direction, is July 30. The point of departure in Roumania was not revealed.

The oil company announced that 600 gallons of high test gasoline and 45 gallons of oil, sent here several days ago were for the use of Cantacuzino.

Another fuel and oil depot is being established for him at Nome, and two or three alternate fueling spots are being provided in that area in case of bad weather at Nome when he passes through.

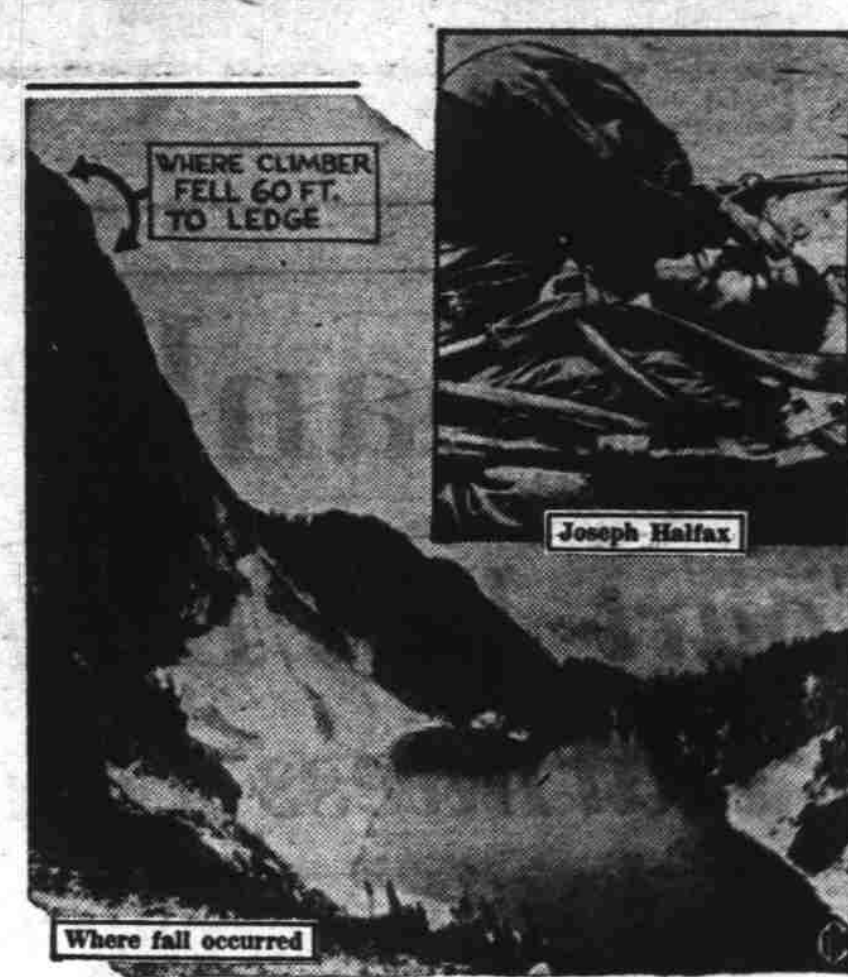
Unionvale Girl Injured In Tumble from Horse; Local Folk View Fleet
