Ex-Kingwood Man Hurt in Accident

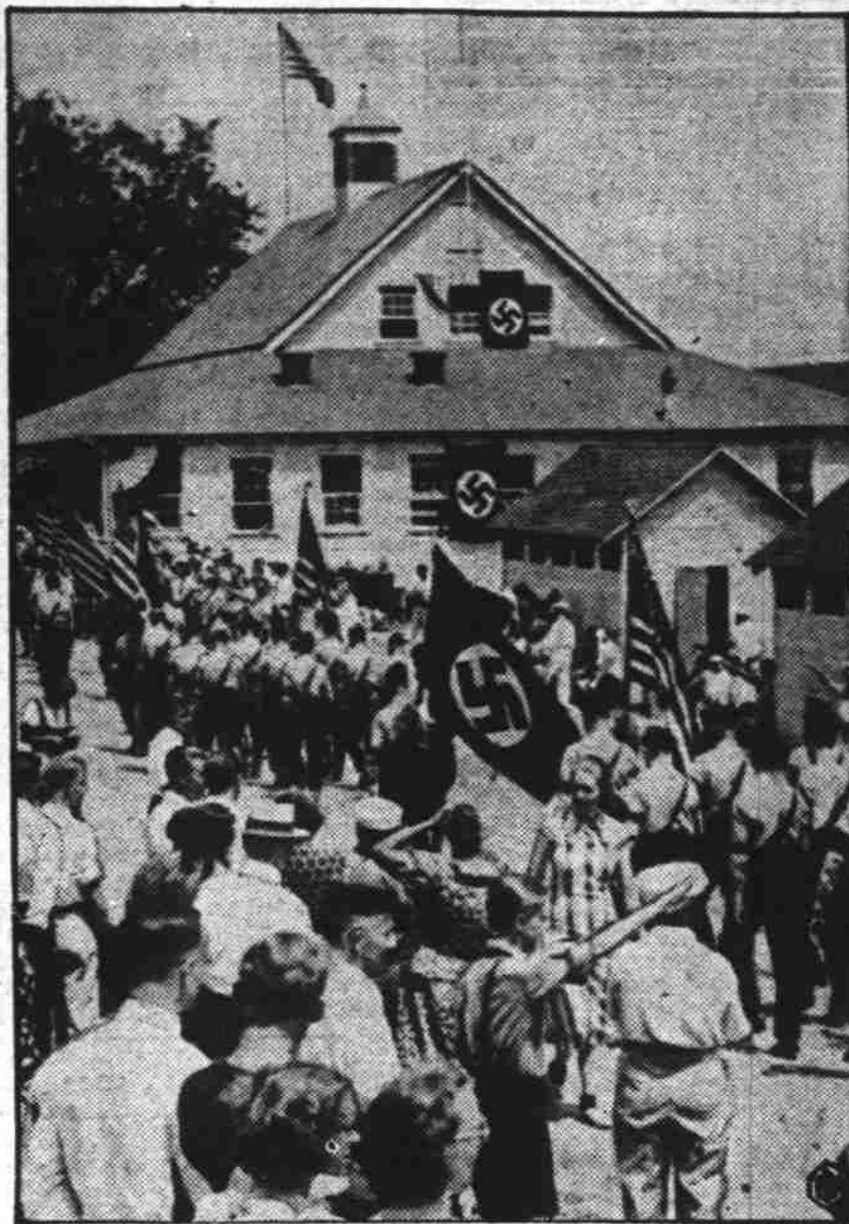

The crop was equally divided between Jory of Salem and Spencer of Lebanon at 9c a pound.

There are approximately 30 acres of berries not in the association and all these independent reports a good yield. All these berries were sold to Spencer of Lebanon.

The next Lacombe crops will be prunes and filberts which ripen about the same time and which promise a fine harvest of unusually good quality.
