Stadium Concert For Monday Is Outstanding

Lajos Shuk, born in Budapest, and America as one of the outstanding conductors of the present day, is conductor of the Buffalo philharmonic orchestra. He is noted for his brilliant musicianship and for his fine program building.

Shuk will open with the stirring overture to "Die Meistersinger." Then will come the Rubenstein "Kamenoi-Ostrow," always an orchestral favorite.

Cadman will play his much talked-of new number, "The Dark Dancers of the Mardi Gras" with the orchestra. This number has received enthusiastic comment wherever it has been played.

Following the intermission, the stadium philharmonic chorus will sing "The Land of the Sky Blue Water," "At Dawning" and "The Sunset Trail," all popular compositions by the guest artist.

The program is especially well adapted for an out-of-doors concert, and a large audience is expected for the event.
