

Circus Comes To City Today

Russell Bros. Show Will Perform Twice; Many Attractions Listed

Boys and girls between the approximate ages of 2 and 92 will wake up this morning with sudden realization that it's an important day, for the circus is in town.

Long before many local residents have had their bacon and eggs, Russell Bros. circus will be busy setting up its portable "city" and the "big top" at the Madison street circus grounds. There two performances are scheduled, at 2 and 8 p. m.

Doors to the menagerie will be opened at 1 and 7 p. m., affording Salem circus fans an hour to see the large collection of animals before the big show opens.

Included on the program are Bob Fisher and his five Fearless Flyers of international fame, the Rebras duo from France presenting a sensational high pole act; Buddy, the talking sealion; Miss Aerioletta, renowned woman gymnast, and the Six Lelands, acrobats.

Topping the animal attractions are Frank B. Miller's dancing, prancing and rearing horses, Irene Ledgett's performing elephants, Yeo Powers' military ponies and the educated dogs of the Willis Sisters and Hazel King.

Russia Roused Over Incident

Tientsin Incident Opens Moscow-Tokyo Quarrel Again After Truce

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In a vigorous exchange of protests, the crisis was ended finally by agreement for withdrawal of armed forces of both sides.

Russia's protest last night did not make clear how far they would carry their demand for satisfaction.

"Japan has no interests in troubles between the Russians," Shigemitsu said.

Anti-Profitteering Legislation Rushed

Meanwhile, Japan speeded marshaling of her economic resources to finance prolonged hostilities in North China, it was said.

The government endorsed new levies and anti-profitteering legislation designed to raise about \$150,000,000 more funds for armament. A new law permits American and other foreign ships to trade between Japanese ports—one purpose, authoritative sources said, being to release all possible Japanese tonnage from coastal traffic for war shipments to China.

With indications that the North China war was extending into new territory, the United States consul at Tientsin, capital of Shantung province, advised that all American women and children in the interior of the province be concentrated at coastal cities.

The province of Shantung lies immediately south of Hopei and probably would be involved in any extension of the conflict between Japanese and Chinese—began by an apparently chance encounter outside Peiping on July 7, and now developed into critical dispute between the nations over Japan's claim to special economic and political rights in North China.

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suffered broken ribs in a fall in a San Francisco hotel, and a negro porter were reported the most seriously injured.

The 11-car train, run as a special behind the regular Cascade Limited, carried 140 persons, many of them from the east and mid-west.

J. C. Leonard of the nearby Pelican Bay Lumber camp, said the accident slipped over nearly 800 feet of track. The cars did not tip over but rested on a 45 degree angle on the road bed. Witnesses stated a broken rail caused the accident.

Railroad officials said the accident could have occurred as the train passed a switch and a wheel flange broke. The wreck occurred on a straightaway section of a mountain plateau and the train probably was traveling "at a pretty fair clip," J. A. Ormandy, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific system said.

Terror reigned as passengers screamed and rushed for the exits. The porter, thrown through the window, hung half way out. A passenger came up and believing he was crawling through the opening, pleaded:

"Hey porter, let me through first."

Two hours after the accident, which occurred about 7:15 a. m., Ormandy said the passengers had been placed in the forward cars and the section started for Eugene.

The wreck at Yamsay caused some delay of mail here, it was reported. No Oregon residents were known to be injured.

Change Rules for Sunday, Proposed

Floods in Manila Vicinity Drown 12

MANILA, Aug. 2.—(P)—Ten days of incessant torrential rains have caused 12 known deaths in flood provinces surrounding Manila.

An undetermined number of others were reported dead along the Agno river in Pangasinan province, where at least 20 are said to have died of dysentery.

Thousands of persons were still marooned by rising mountain streams and the list of dead apparently will grow as reports percolate to Manila over disrupted communications. The rains continued.

A typhoon sweeping in from the Pacific headed northward but weather observers predicted it would miss the Philippines.

Heavy seas lashing the Samar island coast capsized the sailing ship Marikan, drowning four men.

Pan-American Airways Clipper service was hampered. The Hong-kong clipper has been held two days at Hongkong, but may reach here tomorrow. The Hawaii clipper delayed its departure for Alameda, Calif., until then.

The water commission's recommendation that an additional \$100,000 block of water bonds be sold to finish paying for the current construction program was granted by the council in ordinance form and September 7 tentatively set as the date for receiving bids. The issue will mature in two installments, one of \$75,000 in 1942 and the other, of \$25,000, in 1943.

Because cities are not receiving their share of gasoline tax money, according to a light committee report, the council turned down a request from the state highway department that the city pay one-half the cost, \$450 a year, of lighting the new north Salem highway undercrossing. Installation of a street light at the nearby Silverton road-Southern Pacific tracks crossing was ordered.

Salem Man Runs Mill Near Scio

SCIO—Paul White of Salem has engaged in these mill business southeast of Scio. J. A. Hrudka, father of Mrs. White, is said to be connected with the new enterprise. They are using the plant of C. C. Cameron of Albany, it is stated.

A crew of six men this week harvested eight acres of flax on the O. A. Hall farm a mile west of Scio. A 30-horse-power tractor was used in pulling the flax, which is reported to have been the heaviest crop handled in this part of the county for years. Portions of the tract produced three tons to the acre, it was estimated. The product goes to the state linen factory at Salem at \$25 per ton, with a subsidy of \$7.50 per ton in addition. Trolinger brothers, pioneer farmers near Scio, have charge of the machine, which is owned by the state. Trolingers have about 60 acres of flax this year. A crop was harvested on the Frank Cary farm near West Scio a few days ago.

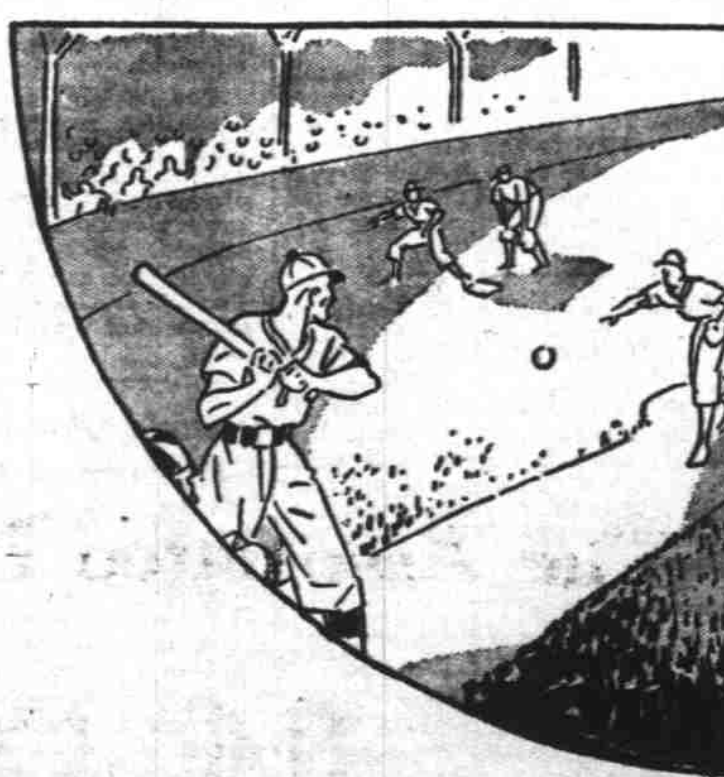
