extended, would still carry on the battle in other parts of the state. They consider the status of the machines before the law is the same as though no action had ever been filed.

District Attorneys Take Varying Views

Inquiries made by the Associated Press throughout the state Thursday brought replies indicating that few district attorneys are planning to give Moody aggressive support in his fight.

The more encouraging evidence, from Moody's standpoint, comes from counties nearby. District Attorneys Bruce Spaulding of Polk county and Mark Weatherford of Linn county have indicated that they intend to cooperate.

The status of pinball cases throughout the state is practically uniform. Operators are taking temporary injunctions preventing seizure of their machines, all based upon the expectation that the supreme court would clarify the law by ruling on the Campbell and Arnold appeals. Disposition of these restraining orders is the next step. A motion to that effect in Washington county is already before Circuit Judge Peters.

The varying attitude of prosecutors elsewhere in Oregon is reported as follows by the Associated Press:

The district attorney's office in Portland said something would be done to confiscate the machines. The circuit court in Portland has held that they can be operated for amusement only. "Glee" licensing happy operators is the next step.

The Lane county district attorney said he was uncertain as to what action he would take. The county has banned them for more than a year, but the Eugene city officials of these license fees which the machines net for them, plan no action.

Moody said that it would make no difference whether cities hold the machines legal so they tax them, explaining that this would not hold water in a court fight.

County officials at Pendleton, La Grande and Roseburg indicated they plan no action for the present, while officials at Grants Pass admitted it looks like they may have to do something about it.

The district attorney's office at Klamath Falls said it expected to shut down the games if there is a statewide movement.

Governor Praises Milk Control Act

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—(P)—As a milk-drinking nation, the United States ranks last among the 11 major countries of the world, G. A. Norris, Montana, president of the National association of milk control boards, said as the third annual session of the association opened here today.

Speakers stressed the increasing importance of milk control as an interstate problem and the need of federal assistance in maintaining price parity.

Howard G. Elsamman, chairman of the Pennsylvania commission, described persons, who seek to guarantee lower consumer prices without due regard to the problems of production as "agitators."

Governor Charles Martin of Oregon praised the Oregon milk control act as having effectively increased returns to the producer and provided the public with a stable milk supply and standard quality.

He asserted that objection to such legislation was prompted "either by ignorance of the facts or by selfish motives."

Sanitation Effort McMinnville Plan

McMINNVILLE, August 5.—(P)—A four-point health program, ratified by the city council, classes the family cow and outdoor comfort stations among the unwanted reminders of rusticity with no place in a modern community.

A survey was ordered, however, to determine if banishment of the cows would deprive children of needed milk.

Fire on Columbia Doubles Its Area

Reinforcements Coming in From Distant Points; Wind Unfavorable

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—(P)—Doubling its area during the last 24 hours and still spreading rapidly in its southeastern sector, the Spud Hill fire in the Columbia National forest in Washington has covered nearly 2,000 acres, forest service officials said tonight.

Reinforcements were on the way from as far south as Medford, and an estimated 1,300 men, including 700 CCC enrollees will be on the fireline tonight.

The regional office of the forest service here said the east and southeast sectors were the most critical and that control of the blaze might be further delayed by unfavorable winds.

Both second growth and virgin timber has been swept by the flames, with considerable loss to valuable 30-year-old stands in the cut-over area.

SEATTLE, Aug. 5.—(P)—Western Washington's forest fire situation was greatly improved today. Only one serious fire, the Cispus river blaze in northern Skamania county—continued to give concern.

Large crews of firemen, including squads of CCC workers, were fighting the fire, which has spread over a large area.

The Washington Forest Fire association reported the humidity in western Washington today at around 50 to 55 per cent as compared to 20 to 30 per cent recently.

Fishing Prospect At Weekend Fair

PORTLAND, August 5.—(P)—Fishing conditions continue generally good in Oregon this week, although some of the lakes have suffered because of low water.

The weekly report of the state game commission said today.

Marion county lake fishing was reported only fair. Olallie was the most popular with fish lake second. Bait fishermen made nice catches in the North Santiam.

Breitenbush and Humboldt are both poor. Pamela is closed.

The Big Luckamute is the favorite stream for anglers in Polk county.

In Tillamook county Trask and Nestucca rivers gave the best catches. Offshore trolling for salmon was especially good.

McColloch Is Named Jurist

Klamath Falls Attorney Is Roosevelt's Choice; State Demo Chief

vice with Horace Manning and the late Ralph Moran. More recently he was the law partner of Harry Bolvin, speaker of the house.

McColloch sought, unsuccessfully, the post of democratic national committeeman in 1934. He was elected to the party chairmanship before the last general elections.

He first entered the campaign for the federal judgeship, when he visited the national capital in the interests of Evan Reames. Reames was eliminated as a candidate because his age conflicted with phases of the president's court reorganization plan.

PORTLAND, Aug. 5.—(P)—The appointment of Claude McColloch to the federal bench leaves the post of chairman of the state democratic central committee open, but the political "kingmakers" have the situation well in hand.

The names of Jack E. Allen of Pendleton and Jack Caulfield of Tillamook have been mentioned prominently.

Allen, who sought the democratic nomination for state treasurer and served in the senate in 1935, appeared tonight to have the post position in the race, but followers of Howard Latourette, national committeeman, contended the Oregon coast man held the edge.

While Allen had the backing of

one wing of the democratic organization, Caulfield had the aid of the group which supported him against McColloch last year, when Caulfield lost the chairmanship by a few votes.

SEATTLE, August 5.—(P)—The Seattle central labor council, A. F. of L. affiliate, launched what it termed tonight a campaign to "clear our ranks of subversive agents, particularly those who openly support the CIO."

Council Secretary Charles Doyle said anyone openly supporting the CIO would be expelled. Four labor men were unseated from the council last night.

The Seattle chapter of the American Newspaper Guild, which was accused by the council of "doing everything possible to tear down and disrupt organized labor" when a strike was called at the Seattle Star, said it had no delegates in the council.

Garden Hose Used Upon Debt Picket

EUGENE, Aug. 5.—(P)—A. C. Mathews ended with garden hose the picketing of his residence by Mrs. Alice Blaine here today.

Mrs. Blaine carried a sign reading "A. C. Mathews owes my 83-year-old father \$600 for hard labor" and "sat down" at the Mathews residence.

Mathews turned the hose on her and offered her the use of his telephone to call the police. She refused the offer but said she planned legal action.

program and of increasing tax levy above 6 per cent limitation.

November 29—Final budget meeting.

The method of financing the courthouse project as now being considered consists of establishing a construction fund and placing in it \$100,000 from the county's unexpended balances, or surplus; \$150,000 from the delinquent tax account, and the proceeds of a two-mill tax levied in the years 1938 to 1944, inclusive. The tax levy will replace the surplus county money that will be utilized as a means of securing ready cash at the start of the project.

August 20—First publication of notice of the public hearing to be held September 20.
September 22—Start mailing notices to judges of election.
November 4—First budget meeting.

November 5—First publication of notice of final budget meeting.
November 12—Final notice of last budget meeting.

November 15—Second hearing on construction proposal, which Trindle believes may not actually be necessary but recommends to make certain that requirements of the various laws involved are carried out fully.
