

Cole's Circus To Come Soon

Clyde Beatty's Lions and Tigers Back; Movie Star in Troupe

Get ready! The circus is coming! The Cole Bros. show, the world's newest and largest with Clyde Beatty and Ken Maynard will exhibit in Salem Saturday, August 28.

Three special trains are used to transport this great organization from city to city. Traveling with the greatest circus are 1,080 employees in addition to 125 advance men. Fair Department Leaders Changed

Three Revisions in Setup Announced; Beef, Dairy Cattle to Combine

Three changes, two combining and one dividing departments, have been made in naming superintendents for the 76th Oregon state fair to be held at the fairgrounds here September 6 to 12, State Fair Director Solon T. White said Thursday in announcing the department heads.

George Gaebler of Portland has been placed in charge of rabbit and pigeon entries which are separated this year from the poultry superintendent's direction. Beef and dairy cattle have been combined under superintendency of J. J. Taylor, Salem; and floral, bee and honey and dairy and land products will be under one head, Charley Cole of the state department of agriculture.

Other superintendents are: Poultry, Edward Shearer of Estacada who this year will serve his 22nd consecutive year in this capacity; sheep and goats, Frank Doerfler, Silverton; horses, Clyde Meyers, Summerville; swine, Warren Creech, Bethel; textiles, Mrs. Ruth Higgins, Salem; photographic art, William Ball, Corvallis; art, Mrs. W. Carlton Smith, Salem; night horse show, A. W. Metzger, state department of agriculture; racing, Dr. W. H. Lytle, state department of agriculture.

Mrs. Mable Chadwick, Eugene, will be superintendent of the agricultural pavilion again this year.

Alienist Aide at Prison Proposed

Employment of a competent alienist to observe and report the mental and physical condition of prisoners in the Oregon state penitentiary, probably will be recommended at the next legislative session, officials reported Thursday.

In the few cases where operations have been performed on prison inmates the results have proved very satisfactory," Warden James Lewis said.

Two or three outstanding cases of mental deficiency apparently cured by operations were cited by Warden Lewis.

In the case of one man, serving a long term for murder, Lewis said an operation eliminated his vicious tendencies and transformed him into one of the most congenial and best behaved prisoners in the institute.

A number of eastern prisons already have alienists on their payroll, officials said.

Riots Mark Visit of British Rulers to Belfast



Large-scale outrages designed to mark the visit of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth to the Ulster capital broke out in Belfast as the first British rulers to visit Irish soil in 16 years arrived. Customs huts were blown up and burned, a bridge

partially wrecked and riotous demonstrations staged. Authorities stated that Extremist Republicans were responsible for the outrages. Scenes were common such as the above, when unemployed clashed in the streets several years ago.

Security Numbers Assigned Locally

Social security account numbers are available immediately upon application at the social security board office in the Oregon building according to a recent announcement of Ben O. Lipscomb who relieved R. C. Stillwell as Salem office head early this week.

Obtaining of security account numbers has been speeded up a week or more by this new arrangement, the applications going to the Portland office and back under the old plan.

Applications for lump sum settlements may also be made at the local office, made available under the social security act. Lump sum settlements are due beneficiaries of employees over 65 who have died since January 1, and are equal to 3 1/4 per cent of any earnings since that date.

Road Meeting of Court Set Today

Seven matters including two new petitions for establishment of 40-foot county roads will be up for consideration at the August road meeting of the county court at 10 o'clock this morning. One of the new petitions, signed by M. F. Headrick and

others, asks for designation of a county road serving residents south, west and southwest of City View cemetery, who now have no outlet by county road.

The other petition, submitted by A. E. Hughes and others, seeks establishment of a county road in the district between Monitor and Woodburn.

Officials Accept Canby Invitation

Governor Charles H. Martin and other state officials yesterday accepted an invitation of the Clackamas county planning board to inspect the proposed Canby irrigation August 13.

This district comprises approximately 4,200 acres of land lying along the Molalla river in Clackamas county.

Governor Martin said the federal army engineers already had

approved the project and that an effort was now being made to have it taken over for construction by the reclamation bureau.

The original surveys cost approximately \$20,000, of which the 1933 legislature appropriated \$7,500. The remainder of the cost was allocated by the federal government. An additional \$1,000 was raised by residents of the Canby section to review the report of the engineers.

"The success of this irrigated project would demonstrate fully the value of irrigation in the Willamette valley," Governor Martin said.
