Mt. Angel Girls' Meeting Team of Quille Tonight

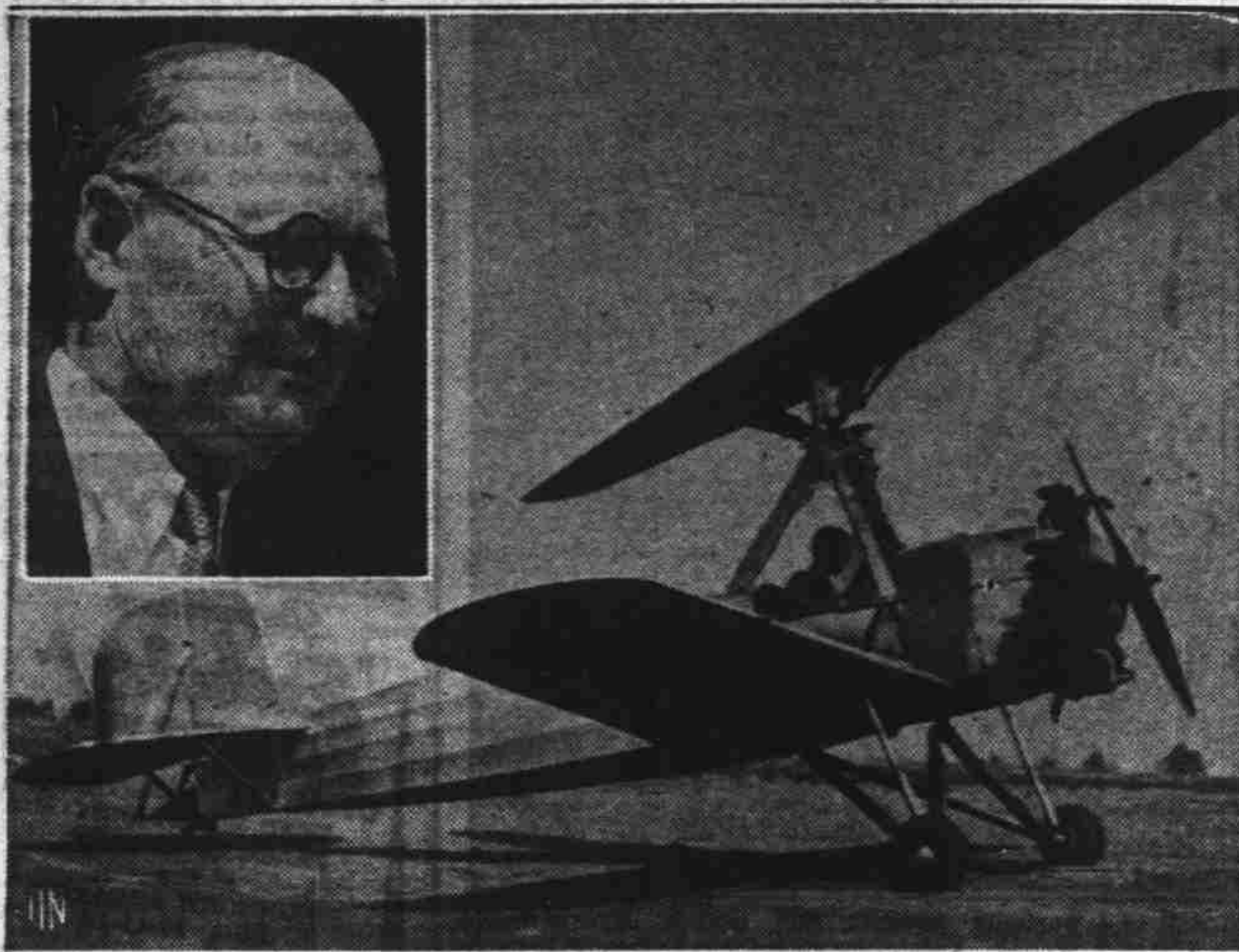

Latest in Vertical Flying—The "Vertaplane"



Pictured at Boulevard Airport, Philadelphia, Pa., is a "Vertaplane," the invention of Gerardus P. Herrick (inset), a distant relative of the late Ambassador Myron T. Herrick. The plane, which lands almost vertically with its top wing spinning in the breeze, underwent tests before an assemblage of government, navy and civilian aircraft engineers. It is said to combine the advantages of lifting efficiency and speed of ordinary planes with the convenience and safety of the windmill plane.

Ancient Walled City of China Which Figures Prominently in Recent News Is Described by Former Salem Boy

From his personal observations in Peiping, center of the present Sino-Japanese disturbances, David Eyre, son of D. W. Eyre of Salem, wrote the following description of the "walled city." Young Eyre, now on the Oregon Journal news staff, visited Peiping while on a world tour several years ago.

"Scores of Portland and Oregon residents are keeping anxious eyes on headlines originating in Peiping, seat of battle between Chinese and Japanese troops. Ask the traveler to the orient, ask any globegaddler to name his three favorite cities, one out of 10 times Peiping will be included in the trio.

"Peiping—always called Peking by those who live in the ancient stronghold—is THE walled city of dynasties, of jade and lacquer and gold and silver. A city of shouting—peddlers and hawkers, of chestnuts roasting on dirty little fires, of flies swarming and produce brought by mule caravans from across the desert. A city where Chinese women still trot on half-developed feet, cruelly bound in the old custom of the country. And the rickshaw is seen in great confusion, pulled by a man you hire for 20 cents a day.

Is Cosmopolitan to the nth degree—a more substantial type of the cosmopolitan than exists in Shanghai, for though the Chinese capital has been moved to Nanking, behind its walled quarters in the Dragon city, German, French, Italian, American, British, all gather at famous Wagon-Lite hotel to dine and dance and talk in a terrific mingle of accents.

"The legation people know Peiping. They know the best shops on Jade street or Lantern street or Silver street. The visitor is always entranced by these streets, devoted entirely to shops specializing in certain products. And far coats! While coats—probably bunny but very nice—with reversible mandarin wrap may be bought for \$10 if you know where to go. "You could spend months in Peiping and not see everything. It is a city filled with treasures hundreds and thousands of years old. Palaces Marvelous

"The Forbidden City, opened not many years ago to the eyes of the world after being walled in mystery for centuries. The sum-

mer and winter palaces, marvels in marble and rich tiles, semi-precious stone and ancient carvings. The tremendous towers that hold old bells and gates that now stem the tide of Japanese soldiers. These, plus 'Peking Dust,' famous both for its street abundance and as a local desert made of ground chestnuts, plus beggars and smells and colorful funeral marches and more smells, have been drawing the traveler inland from Shanghai, from Tientsin, from Mukden for years.

"On the outskirts of the city is the Temple of Heaven, a breathtaking structure comparatively new among old temples of the city. Fire destroyed the first temple and when it was rebuilt the world was searched for the most enduring and beautiful wood. Oregon pine timbers were selected and today stand as huge pillars around the walls of the old temple, looking down on Chinese executions.

"The treasures of the Orient truly are held within Peiping's walls. May they be spared war's spoilage."

Sixty Mile Hike, Plan for Scouts

The hike route includes Marion lake, Pamela lake, Jefferson park and Breitenbush hot springs, where the party will be met by cars which will bring them to Salem. From Marion lake the trip will be made on the famous Sky-line trail.

Monroe and one or two staff members will return to Camp Pioneer after the hike to prepare it for winter.

Traffic Accident Statistics Given

Of a total of 316 traffic accidents in Portland during the first five months of this year 264 occurred at street intersections. Secretary of State Snell reported. The report also showed that 12 out of 14 fatalities during the five months period were at street intersections.

More accidents occurred at busy east side intersections than at the downtown crossings on the west side, the report continued. There were 11 deaths from pedestrian accidents at east side

crossings as compared with only one on the west side. The largest number of pedestrian accidents occurred at East Broadway and Interstate with 37 recorded for that period. Only two of these were seriously injured. At Fremont and Union there were 34 accidents in which two persons suffered serious injuries.

Second and Burnside, with a total of 23 accidents, topped the west side intersection mishaps.

Visiting Nebraska Man Dies on Farm at Scio

SCIO—John B. Janzi, 61, retired farmer of Wood River, Neb., died Saturday from a sudden heart attack at the home of his son, Boyden Janzi, on route 1 near Scio. He and Mrs. Janzi had been visiting there for several weeks.

The body was shipped to Nebraska for interment, the Scio son accompanying his mother east. The widow, two sons and two daughters reside in Nebraska.

Timber Operation Large in Area Near Lebanon

LEBANON—Timber in large lots is being cut by Hadley and Turnidge in the Green mountain section on Crabtree creek and trucked in Scio to be shipped to the lumber mill at Silverton.
