Tomkins Case Before Jurors

Painter Partition Trial Halted for Testimony of Absent Witness

Deputy Sheriff B. G. Honeycutt announced yesterday afternoon he had filed with the grand jury, which was in session, a charge of arson for the purpose of obtaining money by false pretenses, against Fred Tomkins, whom he took into custody Tuesday night.

"I also presented Tomkins' signed statement admitting he set fire to a house and asked the grand jury to indict him," Honeycutt said.

Tomkins, a Corvallis man, had been caring for a place on route three, the residence of a sister, Betty Bernhart, and not of his wife as reported earlier, the deputy said. The woman, who is in California, was not connected with the house burning, he explained. No insurance was collected on the fire.

The grand jury adjourned late yesterday until Tuesday.

In circuit court the partition trial of Painter vs. Painter was continued, after an all-day session, until testimony from a witness now in California may be obtained by deposition or by personal appearance here.

Housing Circular Is Causing Furor

Responsibility Admitted by Sen. Wagner; McNary Hits at Propaganda

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(P)—Tumultuous objections to the distribution of "propaganda" in the senate chamber delayed a final vote today on the Wagner low-cost housing bill.

Senator Clark (D-Mo) made the charge of propaganda when page boys placed on each senator's desk a printed statement opposing an amendment which would restrict the cost of each housing unit to \$4,000. The amendment was adopted yesterday at the urging of Senator Byrd (D-Va.).

The statement was issued by the American Federation of housing authorities, the housing legislation information office, the labor housing conference and the National Association of Housing Officials. It was marked, "concurrent in by the American Federation of Labor."

Clark asked if there was a senate rule to prohibit "senate employees from passing out propaganda from private resources regarding legislation pending before the senate."

Pages Not Blamed

Senator Pittman (D-Nev), president pro tempore, ruled the senate pages could not be blamed for the distribution if a senator had ordered them to undertake it.

Senator Wagner (D-NY), author of the housing bill, quickly assumed "full responsibility." He said he had not believed there was anything "improper" in the procedure.

Minority Leader McNary (R-Ore) said the incident could not be closed by Wagner's statement. He denounced it as "the boldest attempt to influence legislation I have seen in 20 years in the senate."

He added that he would demand a rule inflicting a penalty on any organization undertaking to circularize members in the chamber.

Lightning Blamed, 204 Forest Fires

The most disastrous series of lightning fires ever experienced by the state forestry department occurred during the period July 15 to 31 of this year, State Forester J. W. Ferguson reported.

A total of 279 fires were suppressed by the state forestry department organizations during the 16 day period. Of these fires 204 were due to lightning.

Ferguson said that despite the large number of fires the total area burned was only 1479 acres of which 600 acres was in a logging operation in Lincoln county.

During the first seven months of this year 410 fires burned over 15,200 acres.

The careless smoker heads the list in the number of man-caused fires with 52, Ferguson said. Logging operations were second with 32 fires and the brush burned third with 26 fires.

The usual proportion of lightning fires is about 10 percent.

Dr. Franklin commented on the high prices in the east, pointing out that dining car rates jumped from \$5 to \$1.25 during the trip east.

New Unit Has Good Location

Morris Stewart Manager; Wrath Building Lease Taken by Company

The characteristic colors of the far-flung Safeway system, light yellow and red, adorn a brand new building in which a brand new Safeway store will open in Salem on Friday, August 6. The location is the corner of Broadway and Belmont street, considered a strategic location for a food store because it is on an important highway street, surrounded by a closely built area of homes, with canneries and industries on the western fringe of the district.

The manager of the new store is Morris Stewart, a Salem young man, who has worked up in the Safeway system. He is promoted to a management position from the position of head salesman at the store at 935 South Commercial street. Another Salem boy, Orey Barnes, who has been employed in the Safeway store at Court and Commercial, will be manager of the meat department—another case of promotion earned through service.

The new building was erected by John Wrath and leased to the Safeway company. The size is 40 feet by 80 feet. Construction is of reinforced concrete, making it safe from fire. Folding doors, opening up wide in the summer time to give virtually an open air market, and closing in cold weather, have been installed for the front. Ample electric lighting is provided throughout the building.

Self-Service Plan
The store is designed to operate on the self-service plan. Goods are arranged for attractive display and for the convenience of the patrons. A fine new equipment is provided for the vegetables. The meat case is supplied with mechanical refrigeration and specially designed for the display of meats. A big refrigerating unit provides ample cooling space for perishables.

While operating in a residential neighborhood the new Safeway store will be run on the same lines as the down-town markets, carrying full stocks of groceries, vegetables and meats.

One of the features for convenience of patrons is a check stand

close to the entrance where parcels may be checked while shopping is done. Ample parking space is available on the street by the building.
