Mabel Nendel Asks Damages

Injuries in Same Accident Involved in Other Suit Basis for Action

Suit for \$36,607 damages was filed in circuit court here yesterday by Mabel Nendel against George Meyers and T. G. Galther based on her allegations that defendants were to blame for an automobile accident in which she says she suffered neck fractures, fractured pelvis, multiple fracture of ribs, and bruises and lacerations. The crash, over which Arista Nendel is now suing the same defendants, occurred on the Pacific highway between Woodburn and Hubbard last May 1.

One large estate was opened yesterday and preparations to close another made. The estate of Sidney Miller, estimated worth \$15,000 in personal property, was admitted and Neal W. Miller, son and sole heir, appointed administrator. S. H. VanTrump, E. A. Rhoten and J. Ray Rhoten will make the appraisal. Miller died August 5 in Portland.

Estate of the late Carroll L. Moores, for many years a janitor in the state supreme court building, has a balance of \$23,341.36, according to final account filed by Ladd & Bush Trust company.

The report shows \$61,548.58 received and \$32,007.22 paid out. Accompanying the report was a resolution passed by the Salem city council accepting a bequest under the will which provides that upon the death of immediate beneficiaries, the residue shall be used to erect a monument in honor of the city's pioneers. Hearing on the final account was set for September 7.

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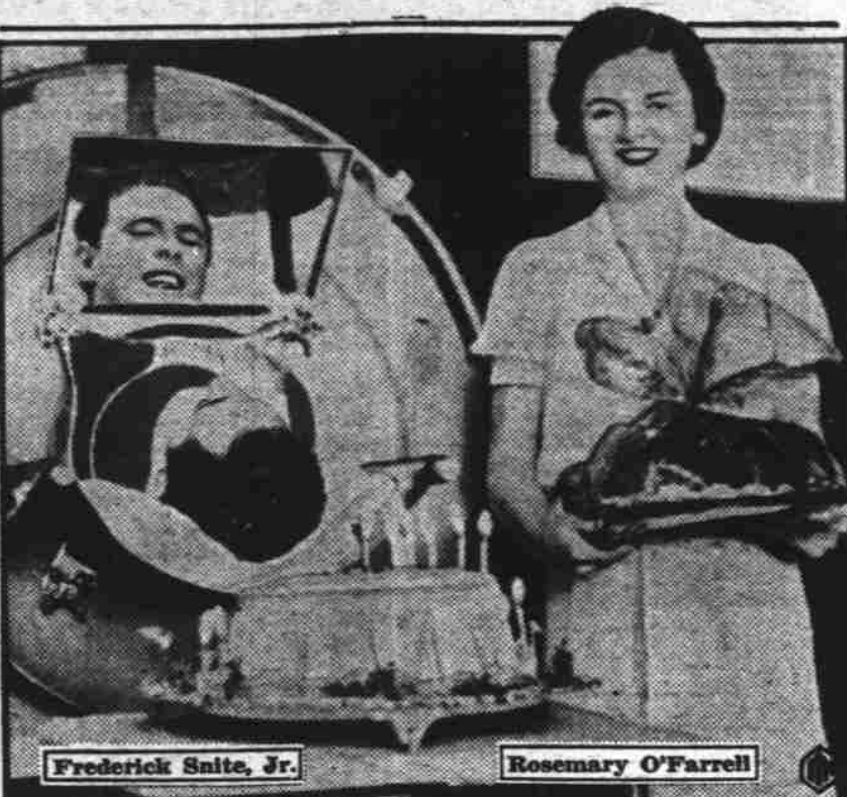
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Snite Spends Birthday in "Lung"

Hogs and Pork Prices Hit 11-Year High At Chicago as Acute Scarcity Looms

CHICAGO, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The highest prices in eleven years were paid for hogs and the meat they yield today.

Acute scarcity of hogs, due mostly to small feed grain production in the drought years 1934 and 1936, spurred the upturn. Live stock authorities watching developments at the world's greatest meat packing center, where receipts recently have seen the smallest on record, could see no prospect of material increase movement of swine to slaughter within the next few months.

Although cheered by almost \$14 hogs for the first time since 1926, corn belt farmers were unable to benefit from high prices to the full extent because they lacked hogs to sell in normal volume. Consumers, paying highest prices for some pork cuts in 11 years and correspondingly high prices for some other types of meat, pinned hopes for relief on the big corn crop now ripening.

Half of the hog alleys in the stockyards on Chicago's southwest side have been closed, because of charges of contributing to delinquency of a minor waived; defendant bound over to grand jury and returned to sheriff's custody in lieu of \$500 bail.

Scholarships will be awarded to the fraternity and sorority having the largest representation, and to the independents if they reach their quota.

An automobile bearing a Washington license and occupied by two women and a boy, crashed through the side of the Sullivan kitchen, damaging furniture and bumping the baby, a report filed in the sheriff's office here stated.

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
