Citizens' Group Acts to Set Program on Way; Election Planned

the years 1929 to 1935, inclusive, and the revenue from a two-mill tax levy for the years 1936 to 1944, inclusive.

All transferred money under this plan would ultimately be restored to the funds from which it was borrowed, Mr. Trindle explained. He pointed out that the financing program outlined permitted and the law required the court eventually to replace any transferred money.

Proposals to be submitted at the special election are one authorizing the court to construct the new building, a second authorizing the two-mill tax and a third authorizing the court to exceed the 6 per cent tax limitation. Revenue estimates submitted by Deputy County Clerk Connell C. Ward indicated that by April 1, 1938, date set for start of construction if a PWA grant is obtained, the construction fund would contain \$150,500 in cash. By April 1, 1940, construction date without federal aid, the fund would have reached \$332,500. On the 1938 date there would be \$450,500 in assets available in the building fund and on the 1940 date, \$530,500.

William S. Walton, financial adviser to the building committee, gave assurance yesterday that the banks would lend whatever sums the county might require in advance of tax collections, under the program as now set up, Mr. Trindle reported. The loans would be repaid by the issuance of warrants against the construction fund.

No borrowing would be necessary under a PWA-grant arrangement, Clerk Ward told the committee. Without the grant, the county probably would borrow \$124,500 in 1941 and \$37,000 in 1942. The loans and the transfers of funds both would be repaid by the end of 1944.

Approval of the resolution was expressed before its adoption by Joseph J. Keber of Mt. Angel, J. L. Jordan of Stayton and John Ramo of Woodburn, three of the four members of the citizens' committee, and by Fred H. Paulus, deputy state treasurer. The fourth committeeman, Cuyler VanPatten, was absent.

wrote: "However, you are informed that the department is making an inquiry with respect to this matter."

"If you have evidence in your possession which you deem indicates a violation of the act," Cummings replied, "May I suggest that you transmit it to this department for our consideration."

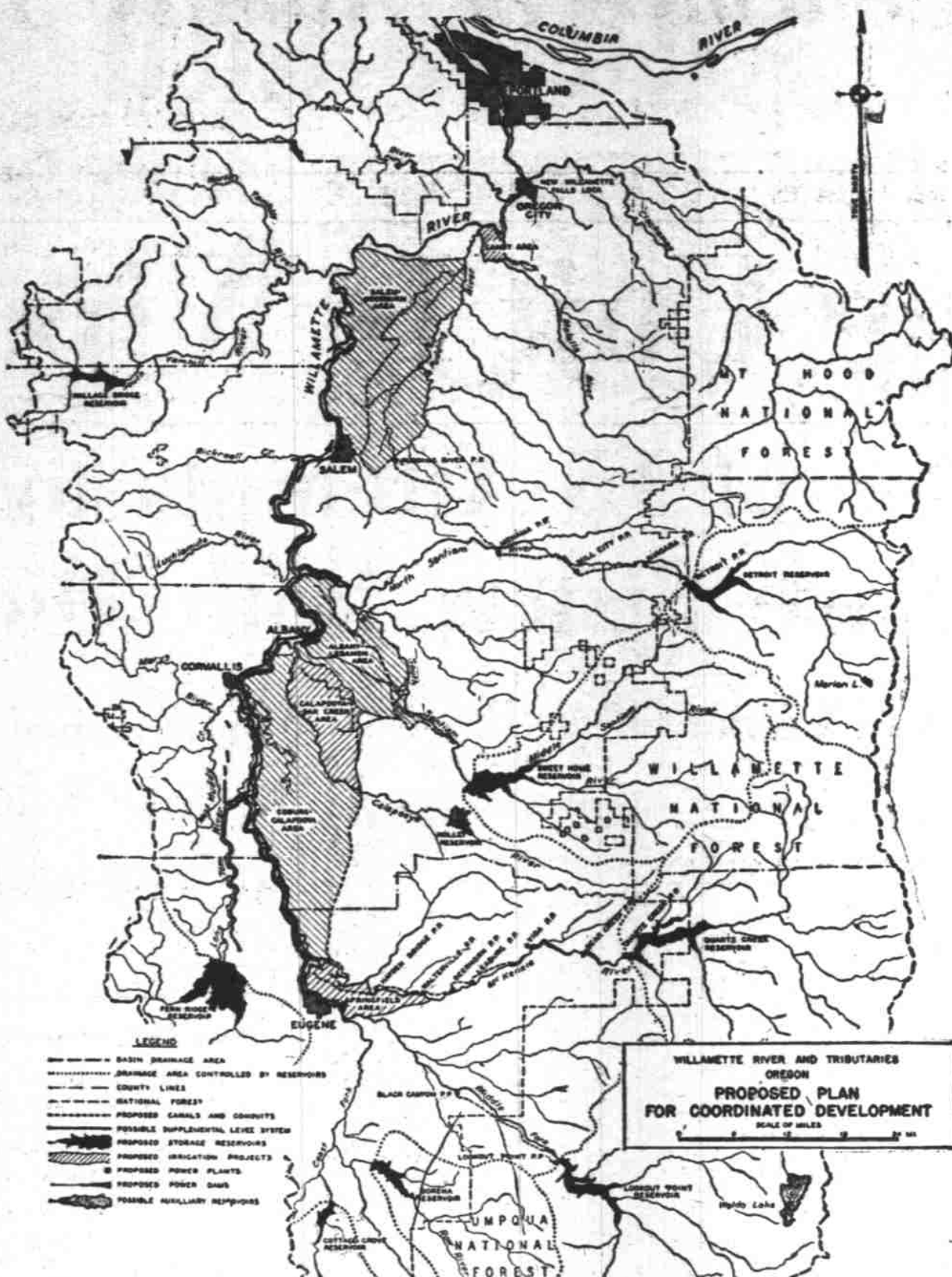

In explaining the California and Nevada position, he said he and California power contractors had tried for months to win over representatives of the upper Colorado river basin states to the amendment.

"But we were unable to convince them that the suggested way was the just way," he added. He asserted the proposed survey of the Boulder rate structure with the view to possible downward revision was necessary because "our project is not treated with the same liberality as Bonneville."

He termed it unfair that Bonneville charges should be written off to navigation while Boulder dam power contractors must foot the bill for flood control costs, estimated at \$25,000,000.

Senators Bone and King told Pittman he was "seeing ghosts" and that there was no way of determining what the rates would be on Bonneville until the entire project was completed and various allocations made.

Funds for Flood Control Provided

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9—(P)—President Roosevelt has approved allocations totalling \$44,437,700 for 44 flood control projects congress authorized in June, 1936.

Army engineers making this announcement today, said other allotments probably will be made within two months. Work on the \$44,437,700 worth of projects can start as soon as conditions in the various areas permit, they said.

The largest allocation was \$11,478,000 for flood control work in Los Angeles county, California. Of this \$6,478,900 is to be taken from relief funds and the rest from war department money.

The approved projects, with allocations from regular department and relief funds include:

Columbia river basin, Oregon, levee construction, \$1,094,883 and \$403,158; Willamette river basin, Oregon, levee construction, \$520,060 and \$275,940.

Silk Workers out In Sudden Strike

Howard Murray, 25, Hood River hiker, apparently slipped, plunging down the beautiful falls into a 15-foot pool. Sheriff's deputies, summoned by the only witnesses, Mr. and Mrs. Leigh Price of Milton, Ore., recovered the body.

The youth's companion, Joe Jarvis, 60, of Hood River, had paused on the trail and did not see the accident. He searched for Murray and did not learn of his death until he descended two hours later.

Joseph L. Kirch, 23, of Vancouver, a student at the University of Washington, and Arabella Palmer, 21, of Vancouver, died in an auto crash on Denver avenue, Portland, Sunday night near the Interstate bridge. Authorities held Roger Shaw, 16, the driver, for juvenile authorities.
