

Drain Project Nearing Finish

Only Cleanup Work now Remains; 7730-Foot Pipe Is in Place

More than 14 carloads of cement—14,500 sacks—or enough to pave 15 average city blocks of 30 feet wide street were used in constructing the drain and paving over where it was necessary to tear up paving.

Basements Flood Again, Hope

The drain, most of which is now in operation, will serve the Summer and D street area, the new high school, and the watershed between the Jason Lee cemetery and State street. It is expected to relieve flooded basements in all that territory.

Work on the project was maintained on a six day week, eight hour day schedule nearly all the time the job was going. Because of WPA time regulations it was necessary to alternate 200 men on the job so that there were 100 men working on the project daily during the main construction.

Appreciation was expressed by members of the city engineer's department for the cooperation given by WPA officials, especially R. D. Cooper, resident engineer; G. R. Boatwright, projects engineer, and Jack Bartlett, deputy administrator. A. J. George of the engineering department was superintendent of works.

ed for, the Multnomah Civic club sought today to obtain a review and revision of the army engineers' report on the Willamette valley project.

Copies of the CLUO's appeal went to the board of army engineers, President Roosevelt, Secretary Ickes and the Oregon delegation in congress.

The report of Col. Thomas M. Robins, division engineer, was termed "incomplete and misleading in some respects," in that it "gives little or no consideration to irrigation, drainage, water power, domestic or industrial water supplies or flood control" for that portion of the Willamette valley lying north of Oregon City.

The club termed the alleged omission "a staggering blow to the most populous and richest portion of the state of Oregon, where conditions are very complicated and beyond solution by private agencies."

The Clackamas river, the appeal said, "is now dominated and controlled by a private company. Its plans for development are incomplete, making expensive power from that source. This we have been and patiently endured. We believe that such private company will never complete its program for development, because of cheaper power from Bonneville."

Clackamas river canals could be constructed, the club contended, to provide large volumes of low-cost, pure water for pulp and paper mills and other industries along the Columbia river from Troutdale to St. Johns, along the Willamette from Molalla to St. Johns, and in the Tualatin valley.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Sen. Charles L. McNary of Oregon told the senate today future reciprocal trade agreements with Canada should provide protection for the domestic lumber industry, particularly in the Pacific northwest.

Asserting that to the forest industry, the foreign trade "undertakings of the government have spelled reciprocity in reverse," the minority leader of the senate suggested that when the time comes for renewal of the Canadian agreement, the "concession made to Canadian lumber" either should be withdrawn or its renewal conditioned upon "an equivalent for American lumber in the British empire."

Other members of the sub-committee are Senator Hatch of New Mexico, O'Mahoney of Wyoming and Burke of Nebraska, democrats, and Borah of Idaho, republican.

Senator Steiwer, Oregon republican, asked to be excused. Neither Steiwer nor Senator McNary of Oregon has received communications concerning McCulloch's nomination by President Roosevelt or the request for a hearing.
