people do this winter after seasonal work is over."
Governor Martin, who apparently expected the workers to march on his office yesterday after their appearance at the employment office, said that he will have a list of 5644 jobs available through the employment service to submit to the Worker's Alliance committee when it arrives at his office Friday.
The same list, a mimeographed form listing jobs available in six Willamette valley counties, was supplied to the delegation at the employment office yesterday. It lists 5280 jobs in seasonal employment, 166 woodcutting jobs, 19 farm jobs, 139 domestic help and 40 miscellaneous help.
"It may be that the Worker's Alliance agitators have discovered that I was ready for the delegates with these jobs," Governor Martin said.
Persons who are willing to work can find a range of employment and capacities on the state employment service listings. It is not seasonal work by any means."

Morgan Railroad Empire Dissolved

HOBOKEN, N. J., Aug. 11.—(AP)—"I can't live forever," said J. P. Morgan, the elder, and J. P. Morgan & company may be dissolved after I'm gone, so I wanted to put the Northern Pacific into a company with a capital so large that no one would ever again attempt to take away the control."
Thus did Morgan set forth the reason for creating the mighty \$400,000,000 Northern Securities company in the early autumn of 1899, erecting it from the ruins of the "Northern Pacific panic."
In this organization, the first of the great holding companies in this country, he vested control of the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern, and thereby effected peace between the two magnates who had battled with millions for railroad supremacy in the west, James J. Hill and Edward H. Harriman.
Today the last vestige of Morgan's railroad trust was erased from the record. The Northern Securities company—its corporate structure rather useless after the supreme court, in 1904, invalidated it as a holding company for Great Northern and Northern Pacific—was dissolved at a special stockholders meeting.

Stanfield Swats At Martin Policy

PORTLAND, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Robert N. Stanfield, former United States senator from Oregon, said in an interview here today that Governor Charles Martin, "like other amiable, complacent governors," was playing politics with eastern Oregon grazing lands at the expense of the irreducible school funds.
Stanfield has opposed a report of a committee of nine recommending that state lands be exchanged for federal lands on a basis of location best suited to livestock interests wishing to increase their range.
Large reservations, embracing as much as 50,000 acres, would bring a greater return to the state than small acreages selected on a basis of availability.
The exchange with the federal government would be effected to centralize the state's holdings now widely scattered.
"We should not use land that belongs to 300,000 school children to subsidize the livestock industry," Stanfield said.

Pierce Absent as McCulloch Probe Opens at Capital

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Representative Walter M. Pierce of LaGrande, Ore., failed to appear today at a meeting of a senate judiciary subcommittee called at his request to hear testimony to the appointment of Claude McCulloch of Klamath Falls, Ore., as federal judge.
Pierce notified the committee he would not appear.
Representative Nan Wood Honeyman of Portland, Ore., testified in favor of McCulloch's confirmation.
Committee members said McCulloch was on his way to Washington and would be heard Thursday or Friday.

McCarthy Is Not Paroled, Stated

Roy Herschel McCarthy, 27, held in Portland for the slaying of Floyd Peunier, service station attendant, was released from the Oregon state penitentiary here June 9 after serving a five-year term for robbery in Multnomah county.
Warden Lewis said Herschel served his full sentence, less good behavior credits.

Woman Injured in Auto Crash North of Albany

ALBANY, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Helen Murray of Portland was cut and bruised when a car in which she was en route to the American Legion convention here overturned on the Pacific highway six miles north of here today. She was alone in the car.

Blood Tests for Both Parties to Marriage Asked

PORTLAND, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The state board of health, in its weekly bulletin today, urged passage of a measure initiated at the last legislature requiring both parties in a contemplated marriage to pass blood tests for syphilis before obtaining a marriage license.
The majority of persons found to be infected with the disease have been ignorant of their affliction prior to the tests, the board said, asserting that the law will undoubtedly lower the infant death rate in Oregon and the number of children deformed at birth.
Positive reactions have been found in about one in every hundred tests for syphilis, the bulletin stated.

Road Board Votes Million in Bonds

PORTLAND, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The state highway commission voted tonight to sell \$1,000,000 worth of short term bonds, the proceeds of which will be used to match federal grants and insure an unslackened pace in highway construction.
The bonds, to be dated October 1, 1937 and to mature April 1, 1938, will bear interest of not to exceed one per cent. The sum will assure use this year of approximately \$1,500,000 in federal highway funds.
Commission members said funds may be available to retire the issue January 1.

SHANGHAI, August 11.—(AP)—Japan massed naval power at Shanghai tonight while far to the northwest the ancient city of Nankow was reported after following new hostilities in the Sino-Japanese north China conflict.
Twenty-seven warships from across the China sea were estimated in the force which crowded the Whangpoo river or were stationed in the Yangtze river.
Between 500 and 1000 blue-jackets were landed as Japanese naval authorities proclaimed events culminating Monday in the slaying of a Japanese naval officer and a seaman on the outskirts of Shanghai "mean that Japan's navy effectiveness in China must be increased."

Laying said Hutchinson, a former ranch hand, has been arrested at several places on charges of vagrancy and intoxication. He said Hutchinson told other authorities he was wanted at Alliance for crimes he did not commit.

Recall Mandamus Filing Due Today

Persons in contact with the Slegmund recall movement said yesterday that a mandamus proceeding to compel County Clerk U. G. Boyer to call a special recall election would be filed here late this week. No official statement, however, had been received from recall leaders since Friday when J. S. Baker, spokesman, said a writ of mandamus was being drafted and an effort made to interest out-of-county attorneys in the case.
Clerk Boyer declined to call the election on the ground that the petitions lacked 795 names of meeting the required 4166 required by law. Boyer also rejected an affidavit filed by Baker that listed 910 names which Baker contended should have been certified to by the clerk as those of legal voters. Boyer said he was acting on advice from the district attorney.

Mrs. Hahn, comely wife of a Cincinnati telegrapher who said she formerly was the wife of a Viennese doctor, was being questioned tonight.
She had been charged with grand larceny by one of the men, George Heis, 63, who Acting Detective Chief Patrick Hayes said told a story of having become critically ill after drinking beer with Mrs. Hahn.

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Car Governor no Handicap, Stated

Advantage in Gas Mileage Claimed by Earl Snell After Experiment

Results of driving an automobile equipped with a governor restricting its speed to 50 miles an hour, have been satisfactory, Secretary of State Earl Snell announced Wednesday after giving the device a trial of two weeks.
"It is true that the difference in pickup is noticeable the first day or two," Snell said, "but after becoming adapted to the car's limitations there is not much difference than in driving any other automobile.
"The secret of good driving is to anticipate traffic and road conditions and take into account possible congestion and drive your car accordingly."
Snell said his gasoline mileage increased materially since the governor was installed on his car. "This, alone, should recommend the governor to all motorists," Snell continued.
The secretary of state said there was only six minutes difference in driving to Portland at a speed of 50 and 60 miles an hour.
Snell urged motorists to try the experiment of driving at a speed not to exceed 50 miles an hour on some scheduled trip and determine for themselves the pleasure and convenience of such motor car operation.

Tompkins Handed Year for Burning

Fred L. Tompkins, indicted Tuesday, pleaded guilty in circuit court yesterday to a charge of burning with intent to injure an insurer and immediately received a sentence from Judge L. H. McMahon to serve one year's time in the state penitentiary without parole. Tompkins according to his admission set fire to a house south of Salem. He had \$1300 insurance on the contents.
A two-year penitentiary sentence with parole to Deputy Sheriff B. G. Honeycutt was given Ernest Craig, when he pleaded guilty to a grand jury charge of threatening to commit a felony. A condition of the parole was that he remain south of Eugene, where he has employment.
