Scampering around the base-paths with an agility which belied their graying beards, Dr. L. E. Barrick's motley crowd of old men softballers last night defeated 11 to 7 a team from Dallas which, in comparison with the Salem veterans, was just a bunch of kids.

With Miller, bald hurler who pitched for the ill-fated Quells team in the spring league, keeping the nine hits he gave up fairly well scattered, the Salem team capitalized on two big innings to win.

The scintillating fielding of Clifford Rockhill Parker and the snappy work behind the bat of B. Oscar Pade contributed greatly to the win of the Salem ancients. Hollis Huntington on third base, except for once when he sprawled on all fours, also displayed a lot of stuff.

Three runs in the first inning on hits by Old Pappy Hendrie and Ray Moon plus a pair of errors put the Old People's Home club out to a fast start and the momentum carried over into the second frame when they went round and round for six more runs.

That didn't take the heart out of the Dallas youngsters few of whom could claim to be over 40, and they might have overtaken Barrick's men had not the game been a seven-inning affair by agreement.

Hendrie, Parker, Pade and Miller the Salem nine in slugging with two base hits apiece. Fleming Dallas left fielder was the only visitor to get two blows.

The Papermakers defeated Square Deal 7 to 4 in the final league game of the season a contest which saw most of the home-head plays on the books perpetrated.

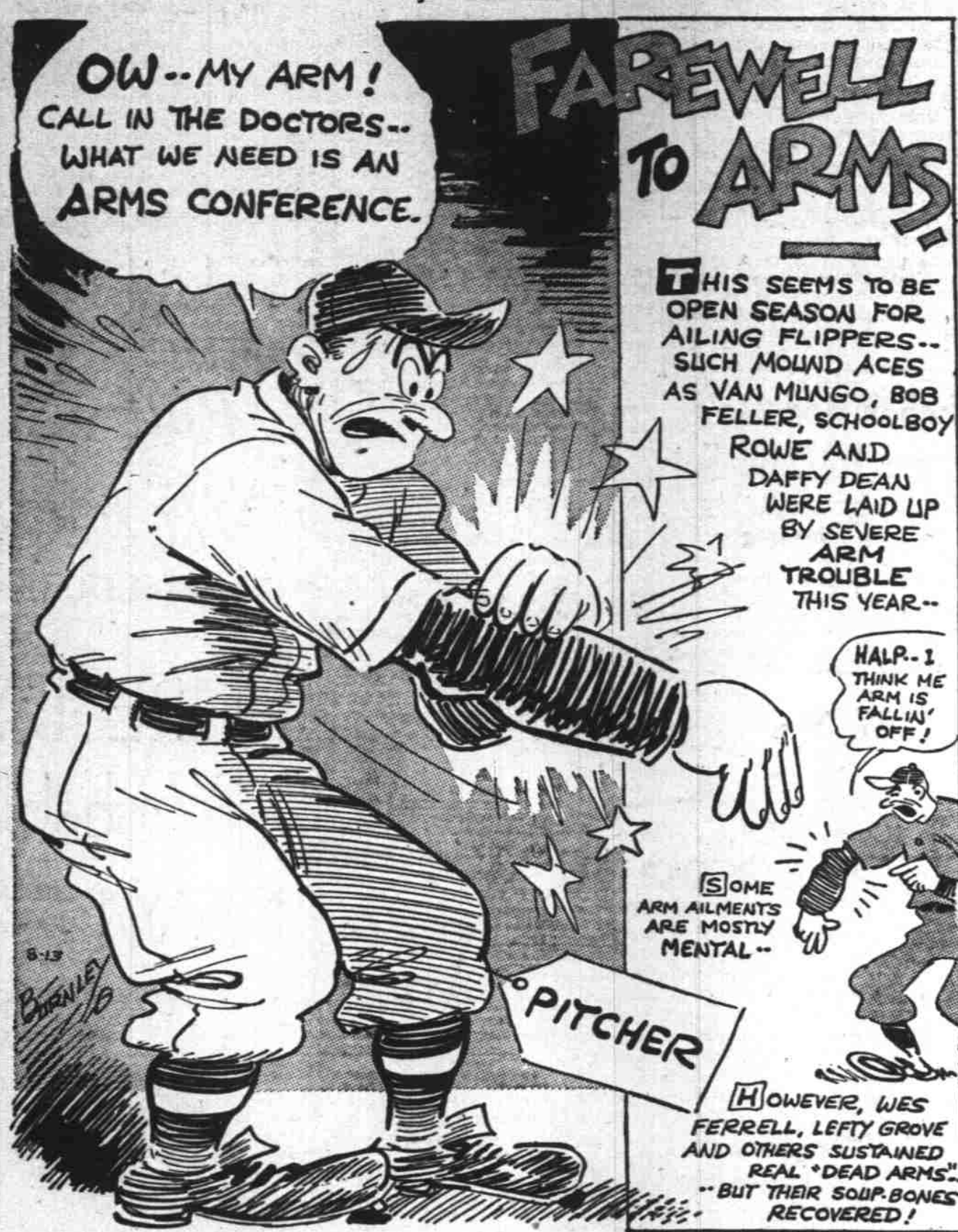

Unbeaten Rubinstein's Softballers From Eugene Come Here Tonight to Battle Hogg's; Corvallis Due Also

Unbeaten in nine straight contests, Rubinstein's softball team of Eugene will do battle with Hogg Bros. in the first of two intercity softball tilts on Sweetland field tonight. Wait's will meet an all-star aggregation from Corvallis in the nightcap.

The Eugene nine, managed by Ed Siegmund, boasts a formidable lineup with Bill "Speedball" Jones, Eugene's swiftest nifty hurler, on the mound. Mike Mikulak, great Oregon grid star and now backfield coach at his alma mater, will patrol first base for the Eugene team while Bobby Anet, Webfoot basketball flash, will hover around the shortstop.

Don Mabech, all-star forward at last year's state basketball tournament, will be in the outfield for Eugene along with Ed Siegmund and Cliff Horner. Besides Anet and Mikulak infielders are Foster Burnett, second base, and Bob Welton, third base. Charles Christenson performs the backstop duties.

Corvallis, which hopes this year to send a stronger team to the state tournament than it did two years ago, will present an all-star team headed by Young Lee, lefthanded Chinese pitcher who was a tournament favorite last year. Lee was the most effective pitcher in the Corvallis league, allowing an average of only five hits per game and striking out 65 men in the six games he pitched.

Catching Lee's curves probably will be Spec Daily, who played third base at the tournament in 1935 for the Corvallis team while Tass Weber, who was chosen all-state first baseman in 1935, will be at the initial sack. These three are the only ones who competed in the last Corvallis appearance at Salem.

Three members of the Gazette-Times team, city champions, will be in the starting lineup for the all-stars. Bud Wagner, who pitched for the winners, has been shifted to left field where his .444 batting average will come in handy. The other two are Joe Spinik in right field and Mush Torsion, former Corvallis high school athletic coach, who may be at third.

George Gray and Parke Eckman, two veterans with many years of baseball experience, will be at second and short respectively with Pong Lee, diminutive American Legion baseball star and brother of the pitcher, in center field.

Girls Undefeated At Independence

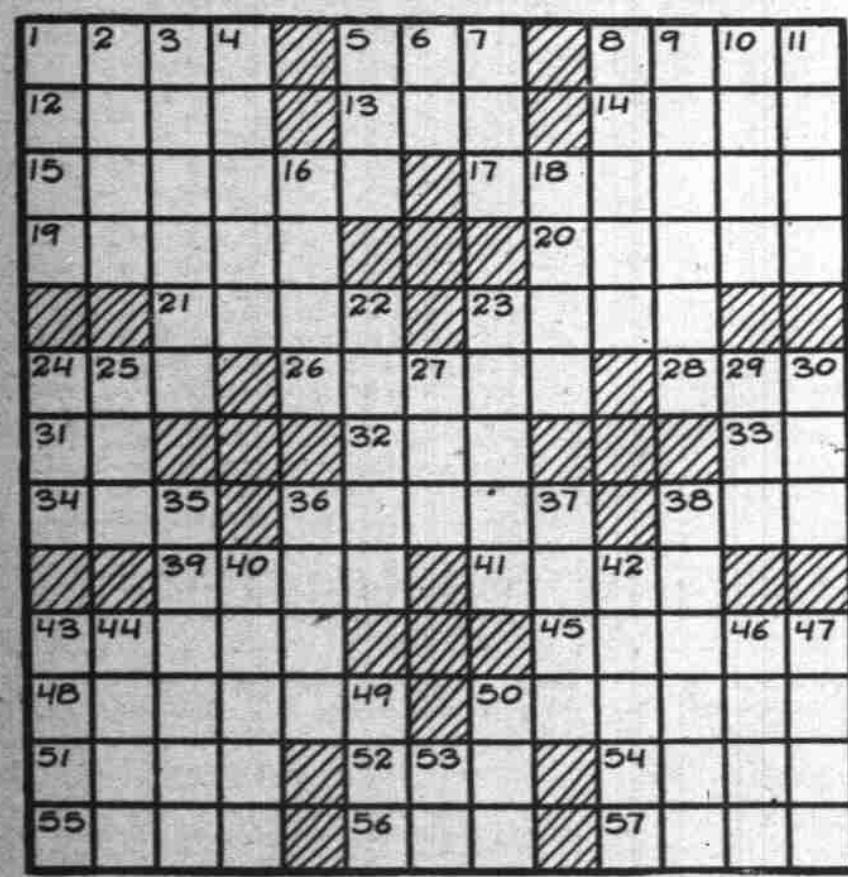
