

Scio Water Work Okehed, Council

Improvements to Be Put to Voters Soon With Special Election

SCIO—Plans for the proposed improvement of the city water system had been approved, it was reported at the regular August meeting of the Scio town council. Special election for the purpose was discussed but definite action was not taken.

Repair of leaks at different points in the city was reported by the proper committee. Other repairs are to be made, it was stated.

The council voted to lay new iron mains from Mill street north several hundred feet, on the west side of Main street. Purchase of hose also was authorized.

Roy Shelton appeared before the council and stated that complaints had been made concerning the alleged unsanitary condition of the Jerome Smith buildings, until a few months ago used by the Scio mill company. The matter was to be referred to the city health officer, Dr. S. C. Browne.

Complain of Nuisance
Upon report of W. E. Kyle, who appeared personally before the council, the mayor announced they would see what they could do about the complaint that cows were molesting the Kyle premises.

The city marshal was instructed to post notices on board sidewalks in several parts of the city where needed and where complaints had been made. The condition of other walks was discussed.

All members of the board were present except Frank Bartis. Some delay was necessary pending a quorum.

Bills allowed included Mountain States \$102.62, Fred Bilyeu \$12.50, city recorder, city marshal, and city water superintendent contract bills, Scio Tribune \$2.50, Riley Shelton \$1.00, Fred Bryan \$1.00, R. M. Cain \$1.43.

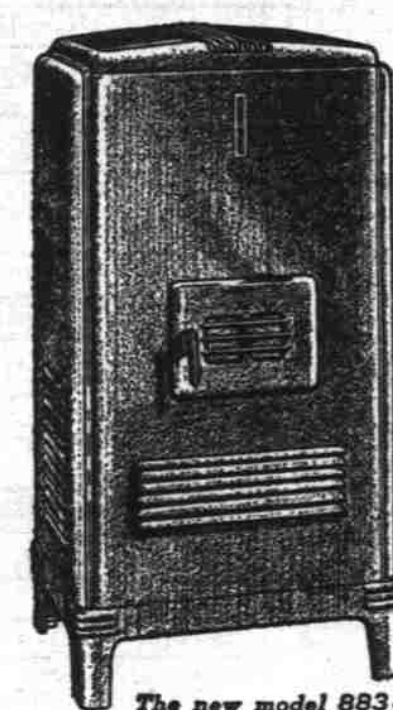
