

Pro Stars Will Test Skill on Salem Golf Club Turf Today

Course Record Is Endangered

Exhibition Is Scheduled to Start at 2:15; no Charge to Public

What will four of the biggest stars of the golfing firmament manage to do to the Salem Golf club course?

That's just one of the questions that will be in the minds of hundreds of Willamette valley golfers this afternoon as they watch Harry Cooper, Jimmy Thomson and W. Lawson Little battle their way around the familiar turf of the Salem course.

The show starts at 2:15 with an exhibition of plain and fancy shotmaking before the quartet gets down to the serious business of a best ball 18-hole match.

To offset any advantage from the careful grooming of the course including fresh mowing of the fairways, the tee will be set as far back as the surroundings permit, adding several hundred yards to the total distance of the course.

Much speculation as to the scores which the professionals may make has been indulged in by local golfers. Such scores as 66 and 68 on standard courses have been turned in by various members of the group since their arrival in the northwest.

All four of the touring professionals have won numerous important championships. Cooper being recognized as the most consistent top-notch in the game today although his mates frequently surpass his feats and are ranked near the top in consistency.

Harry V. Collins will serve as master of ceremonies for the day's program. A public address car will be present to amplify announcements. Ercel Kay and John Varley, officers of the golf club, will serve as referees of the match.

The club's more experienced caddies have been assigned to the players. Members of the Active club will serve as gallery marshals.

Paul open though both were nosed out at the finish. Thomson is recognized as the longest hitter in the game. Smith was medalist in the recent British open, setting a new course record at Carnoustie, Scotland.
