

### Great Artists Among Those To Appear

No less than a dozen outstanding musical and dance attractions have been scheduled for presentation in the Portland public auditorium next winter. This imposing list of single artists and groups, headed by such persons as Lily Pons, Nelson Eddy and the world-renowned Salzburg Opera Guild, has been assembled by the Ellison-White bureau, and, although the performances are all to be given in Portland, they are designed to cater to music-lovers throughout the Willamette valley.

Virtually every major division of musical entertainment is represented in the two concert series, between which the various attractions have been divided. Grand opera will be presented by the Salzburg Opera guild, the largest and most important European musical organization ever to visit America. In addition, Lily Pons, John Charles Thomas and Kathryn Meisle, stars of New York's Metropolitan Opera company, will sing individually. Two eminent pianists will be presented—Jose Iturbi and Percy Grainger, and two outstanding ballet companies—Shara Kar and his Hindu ballet, and Trudi Schoop and her comic ballet. Also of exceptional interest will be Lanny Ross, the immensely popular radio tenor; and Marian Anderson, the great Negro contralto.
