Marion county's WPA road program will be a more complicated during the coming winter than in the past because each job will have to be submitted as a separate project, according to County Engineer N. C. Hubbs. In other years a blanket allotment of funds has been granted the county and under the road department permitted to operate when and where it saw fit, under WPA engineers' supervision.

Hubbs said that in a survey of the county he had decided on 10 probable projects. Crews of 40 or more men will be made available for each project approved by the Portland WPA office.

One of the most important projects will be that of removing brush from county road right of ways, particularly at intersections where undergrowth obscures motorists' vision. Hubbs said growth of brush has been especially rapid in the last two years.
