Jim Nicholson twice got on base by walks and both times he reached third on wild pitches but each time there was no hit to drive him in.

The Woodworkers, until they finally pulled the trick, had even less chance to score than the Papermakers for until the tenth Crowfoot had put only three men on base, two by hits and one by a free pass.

Rotary Bread made short and sweet work of it and had its place in the finals tucked away before its tilt with Wait's was two innings old.

General testing and cleaning operations probably will continue until late in October. R. E. Koon, water department engineer, expects to have the supply system in shape for use on or about November 1.

Mellon's Funeral Set in Pittsburgh

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Andrew W. Mellon will come home to the city of his fortune tomorrow.

A special funeral train carried the body of the one-time secretary of the treasury from Southampton, N. Y., where the city's greatest philanthropist since the days of Andrew Carnegie died last night.

The only member of the immediate family not aboard the train was Richard King Mellon, the nephew who, financial circles predicted, will succeed to the head of the family's vast financial empire.

News of Mr. Mellon's death was carried by airplane from Alaska to a little island off the coast where the nephew is vacationing from his duties as president of the Mellon National bank.

Rev. Stuart Nye Hutchisson, pastor of the East Liberty Presbyterian church, will conduct the funeral at 2:30 p. m. (EST) tomorrow in the \$3,000,000 edifice built by the Mellon family.

Since 1930 he had contributed \$70,556,003 to charitable and educational institutions.

Highlights on the senior scout hike taken from Camp Pioneer to the destination at Breitenbush.

The party left Camp Pioneer Monday afternoon and had a fine hike toward Marion lake. Just below the Marion lookout the party stopped and gathered enough huckleberries to make a fine huckleberry cobbler. This proved to be the highlight of our evening meal.

The next day perhaps the most interesting highlight was our swim in the Lake of the Woods. This is a small lake off the beaten trail where swimming may be enjoyed by the vacationer who wishes it. Of course our final highlight of the day was coming down the gorge into Pamela lake. The ranger at Pamela told us how to climb Mt. Jefferson and promised to get us started.

Mt. Jefferson is one of the most difficult mountains in Oregon to climb because of its ruggedness, steep and shaly rock. But if time is taken and caution exercised, it may be made with little hazard. One need never touch snow in climbing Mt. Jefferson, because from the Pamela lake side a bare ridge runs clear to the top.

A party of five of us, Bob East, Walter Bushnell, Allan Stevens, who was camped with his troop at Pamela, Bob Day and Cappy Monroe, left Tuesday evening to reach Timberline, and of course taking no blankets along it was necessary to do what little sleeping we did around a campfire until 4 in the morning when we found it was light enough to start on up the mountain.

We reached the top about noon. It certainly is an awe inspiring sight to be so high and see all of the valleys, rivers and mountains around you. We could see as far south as Mt. Thielson, and as far north as Mt. Rainier, although it was rather hazy we could make out the Pacific ocean.

Probably the next big thrill to the party was the landing of an 18-inch trout by Wallace Humphreys. He was justly proud of this catch and I think the whole party helped him share his pride. The fish was caught in Hunt's lake, which was about three miles from Pamela and of course Wallace was the premier fisherman of the party after that.
