Fishing Is Good In Detroit Area

Fishing conditions in the Willamette national forest continue to be good, says Glenn C. Charlton, district ranger stationed at Detroit, in his weekly news letter to The Statesman.

Limit catches are being taken regularly from Breitenbush and North Santiam rivers, while Marion and Elk lakes are also yielding some good catches.

The fire hazard is serious enough to make rangers require tourists to carry permits. The first major damage from a fire here this season occurred on August 19 when a 25-acre fire in the Heron Logging company holdings 5 miles east of Detroit, burned from 500,000 to 700,000 board feet of timber. Quick acting by 150 loggers, aided by power pumps, hose, and equipment furnished by the forest service, had the blaze under control soon.

Divorce Court Moves Swiftly

Decree Won in Four Days; one Annulment, two Divorces Granted

Marion county's divorce court moved swiftly yesterday as Myrtle E. Davidson received a decree severing matrimonial ties, between her and Roy E. Davidson, just four days after she filed suit. The complaint was filed Monday. Davidson filed a demurrer Wednesday, the court overruled the demurrer, and with the defendant declining to plead further, granted Mrs. Davidson the divorce yesterday.

The Davidson decree also ratified a property settlement agreement whereby plaintiff receives Salem real property, \$275 payment for amount yet due on heat-radiator equipment, and \$3000 cash at the rate of \$75 per month. The plaintiff by the agreement relinquishes all interest in Davidson's Auto Service and gives a quit claim deed to certain Multnomah and Tillamook county real property.

One other divorce and an annulment decree were granted yesterday and two new complaints for divorce filed.

Circuit Judge L. G. Lewelling awarded a divorce decree to William Hite against Gladys Hite in a disputed case tried during the day. Decree annulling her marriage in 1931 to Elmer Erwin White was granted Nadine L. Verne White.

In the new actions, Cleo G. Loyne applied for a divorce from Ernest J. Loyne, to whom she was married in Marion county in 1931, and Clementine C. Dahlberg asked for a divorce from Harry E. Dahlberg, to whom she was married at Valley Forge, Pa., August 20, 1936. Both plaintiffs alleged cruel and inhuman treatment as grounds for divorce.

Seal Sale Plans For County Laid

At a meeting of the Marion County Health association held yesterday afternoon in the association's offices in the Masonic temple, Mrs. Ralph Appleby of Mt. Angel was elected to serve as vice-president for the coming year.

Mrs. A. P. Dunlap will be in charge of Christmas seal sales throughout the county for the coming year, and C. A. Sprague will head the committee in charge of sales in Salem.

It was revealed at the meeting that Marion county will be allowed to retain 75 per cent of the total funds raised from seal sales, while last year only 70 per cent was kept in the county.

A total of approximately \$3,500 was realized last year from the sale of Christmas seals, a thousand dollars over the previous year.

Railway Tank of Gasoline Is Used Each 30 Minutes

Motor-minded Oregonians are burning the equivalent of a railway tank car of gasoline every 30 minutes, Secretary of State Earl Snell declared yesterday in commenting on rapidly increasing sales of motor fuel in this state.

Despite the volume to which gasoline sales and gas tax collections have risen, only three-tenths of 1 per cent of these taxes are spent for administrative costs. This percentage, Snell said, is the lowest in the United States.

Aside from administrative costs and 11.8 per cent going into refunds to farmers and other tax-exempt gasoline consumers, the state gas tax goes to the state highway department for road construction, Snell said.

Circus Is In Salem Today

Clyde Beatty Outfit to Show Twice on Madison Street Grounds; Parade Set

Three special trains traveling over the Southern Pacific railroad will bring the Cole Bros. circus with Clyde Beatty and Ken Maynard to town today for two performances. The first section known as the "flying squadron" and bearing the commissary department, the menagerie and four sleeping cars departed from Portland where the big show appeared yesterday at 12 o'clock last night. The second section bearing baggage wagons, horses and more horses, tents and a appearances was speeding here soon after midnight. In close pursuit followed the balance of the equipment and a score of sleeping cars with performers, officials and employees not carried on the two preceding sections.

As quickly as the trains arrive they will be parked on convenient sidings where the work of unloading will begin and the transfer of the equipment to the show grounds on Madison street. Because of the acreage used by the Cole Bros. across the street, the dining tents, the commissary department and the stable tents, will be raised some distance from the show grounds, where the big top, the world's largest tent—nearly two city blocks in length—will be placed. Altogether 22 tents covering some 12 acres of ground are used to house the gigantic enterprise.

Street Parade Set for Morning

Circus festivities will be ushered in shortly before noon today with a spectacular street parade. It is more than two miles in length, containing scores upon scores of cages, dogs, allegorical floats and other vehicular appointments. Upwards of 1000 men, women, horses will be seen in the elaborate procession. There will be trumpeting bands, tooting carriages, 30 elephants and two caravans of camels from Asia and Siberia.

Clyde Beatty, the greatest wild animal trainer of all time, heads the list of amazing stars. Ken Maynard, star of more than 100 moving pictures will head a congress of rough riders, cowboys, cowgirls, Indians and Cosacs.

Harrie Beatty, wife of the celebrated trainer, will be seen here in a startling and unusual act, that of a full grown male lion and a Siberian tiger riding atop of an elephant at the same time, three natural enemies taught to perform simultaneously.

The Aurelia troupe of nine European equestrians; the Zoeppe family, equestrians, newly recruited from Spain; the Great Gratonas troupe of amazing high wire performers from Germany; Harold Barnes, the juvenile wire dancer; the Flying Harolds and the Aerial Illusions, are among the stars. There will be sixty clowns and more than 250 trained horses.

Doors to the huge double menagerie will open at 1 and 7 p. m., affording an hour to inspect the world's largest traveling zoological collection with its 30 elephants or camels, 1000 horses and 10,000 Robbins' military band. On account of the length of the performances, they will begin promptly at 2 and 8 p. m. Reserved and admission tickets are on sale at Central Pharmacy. On the show grounds the white ticket wagon will be delivered Sunday at the purchase of reserved seats. General admission tickets will go on sale at the red ticket wagon simultaneously with the opening of the doors.

At midnight the last of the circus trains will be en route to Eugene where the big show will exhibit one performance Sunday afternoon.
