Big Timber Noted In Scio District

SCIO—Indicating the size of logs cut in the Cascade foothills near Scio, a case at West Scio, near this city, is noted in which three fir logs trucked through Scio to that point are reported to have exceeded the railroad company's maximum height limit for such logs, as the three logs measured more than 11 feet when piled in a triangular position.
