

Funeral Held for George F. Ziedler

ALBANY—Funeral services for George Frederick Ziedler, 60, were held from the Fisher Funeral home Thursday morning at 10 o'clock, Rev. J. Boyd Patterson officiating. From Albany the body was taken to Oregon City where services were held. Bur-

ial was in the Oregon City cemetery. Mr. Ziedler died as the result of self-inflicted wounds with a razor and butcher knife around 11:30 a.m. Tuesday. Mrs. Ziedler is critically ill at the Albany General hospital, suffering from knife wounds, supposedly inflicted by her husband. It is believed that Mr. Ziedler killed himself in a fit of temporary insanity and Mrs. Ziedler in attempting to prevent him, was cut. According to the sons

and daughters of Mr. Ziedler, in 1924 he was injured when a tree fell, hitting him on the head. This left him in a nervous condition. George Ziedler was born in 1876, in Baltimore, Md., where in 1897 he married Nora Lee Brown. In 1903 Mr. and Mrs. Ziedler with their family came to Oregon. For 20 years they made their home in Clackamas county. Five years ago they moved to Route 1, Albany, near Fry Station where they have been mak-

ing their home on a farm. Surviving are the widow and ten children, and nine grandchildren. The children are Mrs. Jennie Moehnke, Mrs. Louisa Nelson and Mrs. Bessie Nelson, all of Beaver Creek, Carroll Ziedler of Tangent, Frank Ziedler of Gresham, and Ernest Ziedler, Rex Ziedler, Walter Ziedler, Mrs. Mabel Walker and Mrs. Lucille Walker all of Albany. He is also survived by four brothers, Clarence and Henry of Baltimore, Md., Ed of Amity and Frank of

Portland, and one sister, Mrs. Louisa Stang of Baltimore, Md. Mr. Ziedler was a member of the Masonic lodge of Gervais. **Mathey Files Suit** DALLAS—A. R. 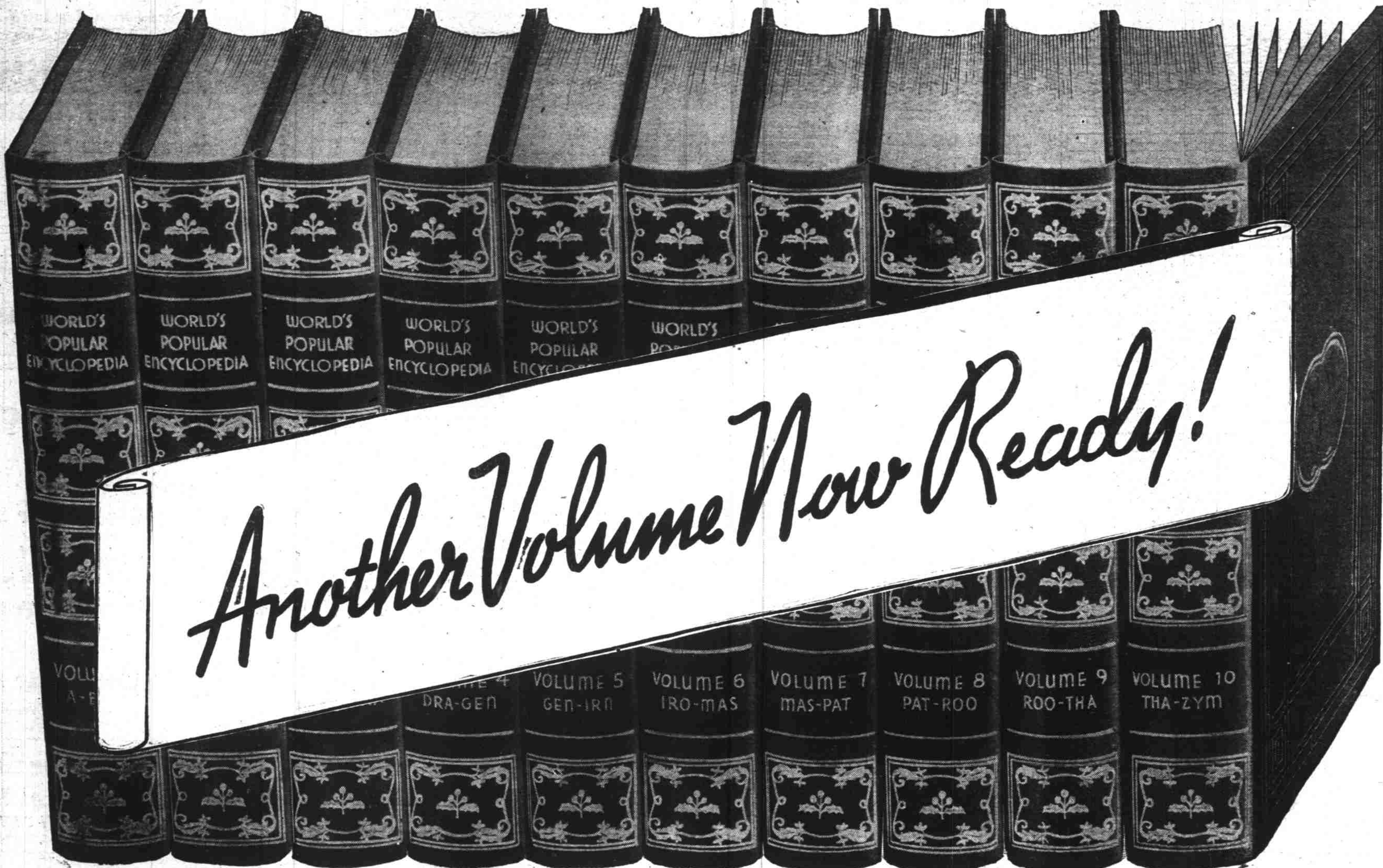
Rickreall School To Have new Head
