

# Terror Sets Track Record to Win Eastern Oregon Handicap

## Race Meeting To End Today

Editors Will Be Honored; Pine Bur Comes in as Longest Shot yet

Terror, 9-year-old chestnut mare owned by O. T. Anderson, Klamath county, set a new track record of 1:06.8 for the 5 1/2 furlong distance in the Eastern Oregon handicap race at the fairgrounds Friday.

Jockey John Dillea brought Terror gradually to the front, taking the lead in the last 200 yards and finishing two lengths ahead of Elegant Miss. Terror paid \$11.20 to win.

Pine Bur paid \$51.32 to win the second race, highest straight price of the six-day meeting, which will close today. The horse won by three lengths.

Flying Stick, Audrey Anderson's bay filly, stamped herself as a coming winner by taking the first race, for maiden 2-year-olds foaled in Oregon, by five lengths.

About 7000 persons attended Friday, the weather being clear and the track fast.

Mutuel Total High Mark Larwood, head of the mutual department, predicted that the week's betting handle will set a new record of \$85,000.

The previous record, set last year, was \$65,868. Friday's handle was \$14,798, as against \$10,890 a year ago.

Today will be Editor's day at track, there being eight running races named for Portland and Salem newspapers, editors, and press associations.

The feature will be the Au Revolt handicap at 5 1/2 furlongs for a \$300 purse.

## Burke One Stroke Ahead of Cooper

TORONTO, Sept. 10 (AP)—A wide-open struggle for the Canadian open golf championship developed today as Leeson Little tossed his title overboard with a 76 on the second round while a half dozen or more sharpshooters battled to take his place.

Little, who set a tournament record of 271 for 72 holes over the same course last year, reached the halfway mark total with 150, just a dozen strokes behind the leader, Bill Burke of Cleveland, former US open champion.

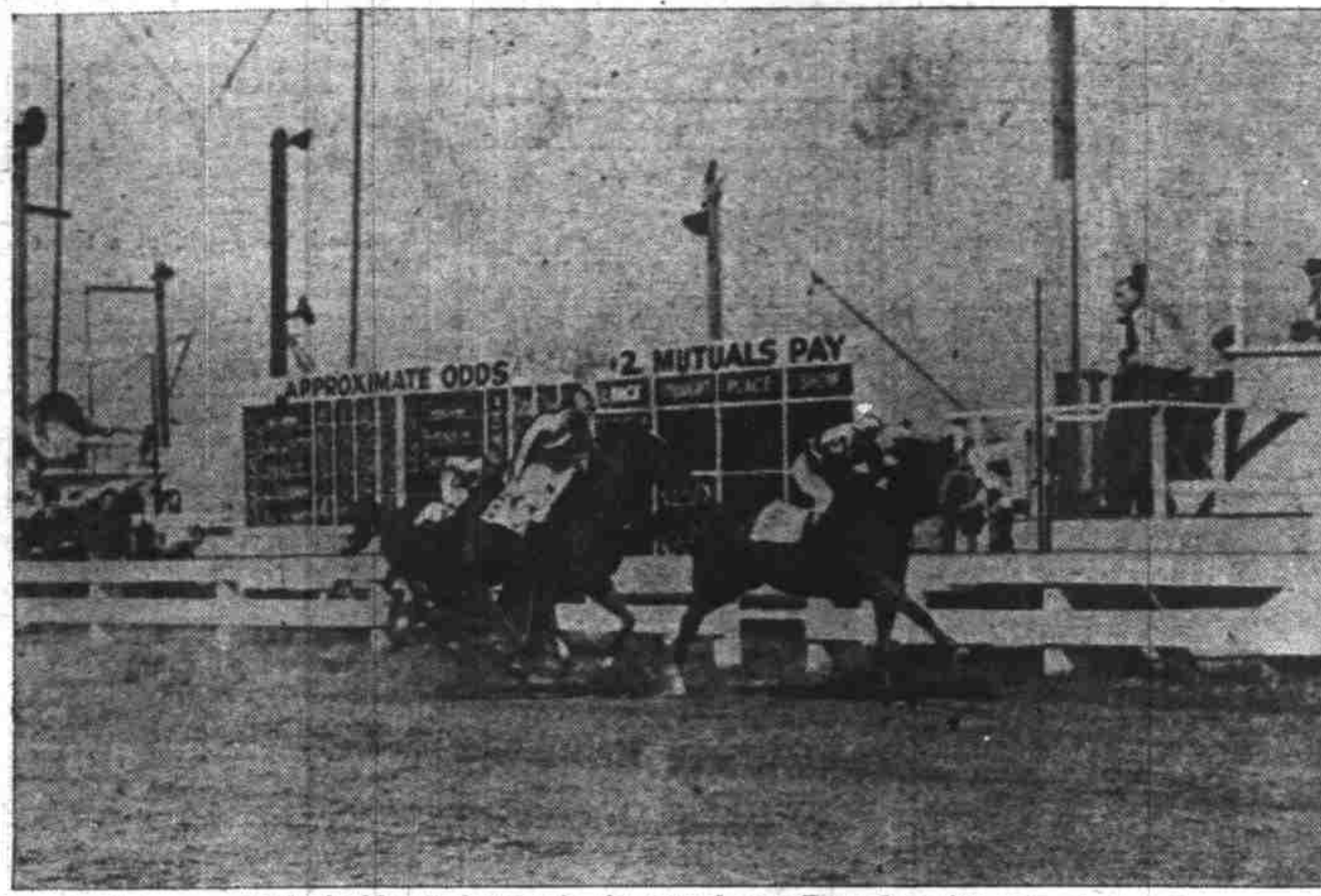
Burke fired his second straight 89 today to reach the turn two strokes under par and one up on "Light Horse" Harry Cooper of Chicago, Mass.

## Flanagan Bests 3 National Records

CHICAGO, Sept. 10 (AP)—Ralph Flanagan, Miami's contribution to major league American swimming, stroked to another triumph today in his conquest of three national A.A.U. outdoor titles and records to go with them.

Flanagan, who inaugurated his campaign yesterday with a smashing, world-record victory in the one-mile, came right back today in Lake Michigan's choppy waters to win the 440-yard event in record time. He coasted home 30 yards in front of Tom Haynie of the University of Michigan, in 4 minutes, 46 seconds, more than two seconds faster than his own american and meet standard of 4:48.6.

Along with it, he swam his first 300 yards in 3:14.2, bettering the listed American mark of 3:18 set by John Macdonis of Yale university in 1935, while his time for the full route was almost two seconds under his own 400 meters record of 4:47.8.

## Low Water Hurts Anglers' Chances

PORTLAND, Sept. 10 (AP)—Weekend anglers, confronted by general conditions no better than fair, can still fill their creels by picking their spots with care in the state game commission said today in its weekly report.

The upper Deschutes still yields fish to flies and spinners, but the river is poor near Maupin. Bucktail coachman flies have been good for limit catches in Paulina, East, Elk, Sparks and Lave Lakes in Deschutes county.

Low water damaged results in small streams of Marion county. The North Santiam and Elk Horn were fair, with the fish small. Eastern Marion county lakes were improved. Conditions were poor in Polk county.

Tillamook county offered good catches of Silversides, and the Rogue river in Josephine county provided good steelhead fishing.

## 1937 Salmon Pack Estimates Large

TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 10 (AP)—Lemuel G. Wingard, ranking federal fisheries agent in Alaska, estimated today Uncle Sam's ice-box will produce 6,500,000 cases of salmon during the 1937 season.

Wingard, whose office is at Juneau, predicted the pack would be more than 2,000,000 cases short of the 1936 "pack" but still would be considered an above-average year. He pointed out the pack has increased from 8,159 cases recorded in 1935, the first year records were kept of the catch.

## Tennis Finals Slated Today

Budge Faces Von Cramm, Only American With Chance for Title

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 10 (AP)—Before a capacity crowd of 14,000 in the West Side Tennis club, J. Donald Budge of Oakland, Calif.; Baron Gottfried Von Cramm of Germany; Jadwiga Jedzejowska of Poland and Anita Lorraine of Chile today battled their way by trying routes into the finals of the National men's and women's singles championship.

Budge, continuing the phenomenal streak that has brought him down to the title round for the second year in a row, blasted his way to victory at 6-2, 6-1, 6-3 over Frankie Parker, his Davis cup teammate from Milwaukee. Von Cramm, on the other hand, was carried to his fourth straight extra-set match to eliminate Robert L. Higgins, chunky, 19-year-old Los Angeles youngster, 6-6, 3-6, 6-3, 6-2.

Neither of the women finalists was extended. Miss Medzjedzowska scored at 6-4, 6-4, over Helen Jacobs, beaten finally in year and champion in the four preceding seasons, while Miss Lizana, hitting out with effortless ease, found 21-year-old Dorothy May Bundy of Santa Monica, Calif., no obstacle at all and brushed her aside at 6-2, 6-3.

Budge Only Hope Tomorrow before the fourth full house in the 15-year history of the stadium, the California redhead who has come out a winner in every one of his single sets matches this season, and the German blond who took him to five sets in a near-zone final, will put on their third match of the summer. And this time it will be up to Budge to keep invaders from scoring a clean sweep of every one of the U. S. titles.

Von Cramm and Finner Henkel already have taken the national doubles laurels. Miss Medzjedzowska and Miss Lizana in the women's final, that championship is bound to go overseas for the third time in its career.

## NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETINGS REGARDING CONSTRUCTION OF NEW COURT HOUSE

Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of Marion County, Oregon, that the County Court of said county on the tenth day of August, 1937, made and entered an order concerning the construction of a new court house a substantial copy of which said order is as follows:

"NOW THEREFORE on this 10th day of August the same being one of the regular meetings of the County Court of Marion County, Oregon, for the August term thereof. It is ordered by the court that it is the finding and determination of the County Court of Marion County, Oregon, that said County should build and construct a new court house and that the court intends and proposes to build and construct said court house after all legal requirements have been fully complied with; that the proposed site for the present Court House stands, located in the City of Salem, Oregon, and is bounded by State Street on the South, Church Street on the East, Court Street on the North and High Street on the West and the east of said site to Marion County will be nothing; that the plans to sign as the preliminary plans prepared by Whitehouse and Church, architects, and Knicker and Howard, associate architects which are now on file in the office of the County Clerk of Marion County; that the approximate cost of said Court House is the sum of Five Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$550,000.00); that the finances for construction of said Court House shall be provided by securing from the U. S. Government a P. W. A. grant of Two Hundred Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$220,000.00) if possible, and by setting up a budget item to be designated "Court House Construction Fund" and transferring to a fund to be budgeted and appropriated under said title the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) in cash from any surplus of unappropriated and unallocated balances on hand in the several subdivisions of the General Fund of Marion County; also by appropriating, transferring, and allocating to said fund the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00) from the uncollected General Fund Taxes for the years 1929 to 1935 inclusive and 1941, 1942, 1943, and 1944, said levy to be made on or about the 15th day of November 1937 for the year 1938, and annually on or about the 30th day of November each year thereafter; providing said fund to replace in any other fund any sum which the County Court may have transferred from such other fund to the "Court House Construction Fund"; that it is the opinion of the Court that it will be necessary to increase the tax levy for the year 1938 to be made November 15th, 1937 beyond the 6% limitation provided by the Oregon Constitution and that an election will be called for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters the question as to whether or not a new Court House shall be built and the right of said county to levy said tax and otherwise provide funds as herein designated shall be granted to the Court; that the County Court proposes to apply for funds from the P. W. A. of the U. S. Government to assist in the construction of the said Court House and in case such funds are made available, construction will start about April 1st, 1940; that a Public Hearing will be held in the County Court Rooms at the Court House in the City of Salem, Oregon, on the 20th day of September 1937 at the hour of 10 o'clock A. M. for the purpose of submitting a full and complete discussion of this order, of the method of financing therein provided and of the question of the advisability of constructing a new Court House, and of receiving petitions if any are presented; and that a Public Hearing will also be held on October 18th, 1937 at 10 A. M. at the County Court Rooms of the County of Marion for consideration of this order, of the general propositions herein contained and for a general discussion of the matter of constructing a new Court House, and of receiving any petitions which the voters may desire to present.

It is further ordered that notice of the entry of this order and of the Public Hearings to be held hereon shall be given by publishing a notice thereof in the Oregon Statesman; a newspaper of general circulation published in the City of Salem, Marion County, Oregon, for five consecutive weekly publications beginning with the issue of Saturday, August 21, 1937, and continuing for each Saturday thereafter to and including September 18, 1937, and the County Clerk of Marion County is hereby instructed and directed to prepare and publish a notice herein provided for which said notice shall contain a substantial copy of this order.

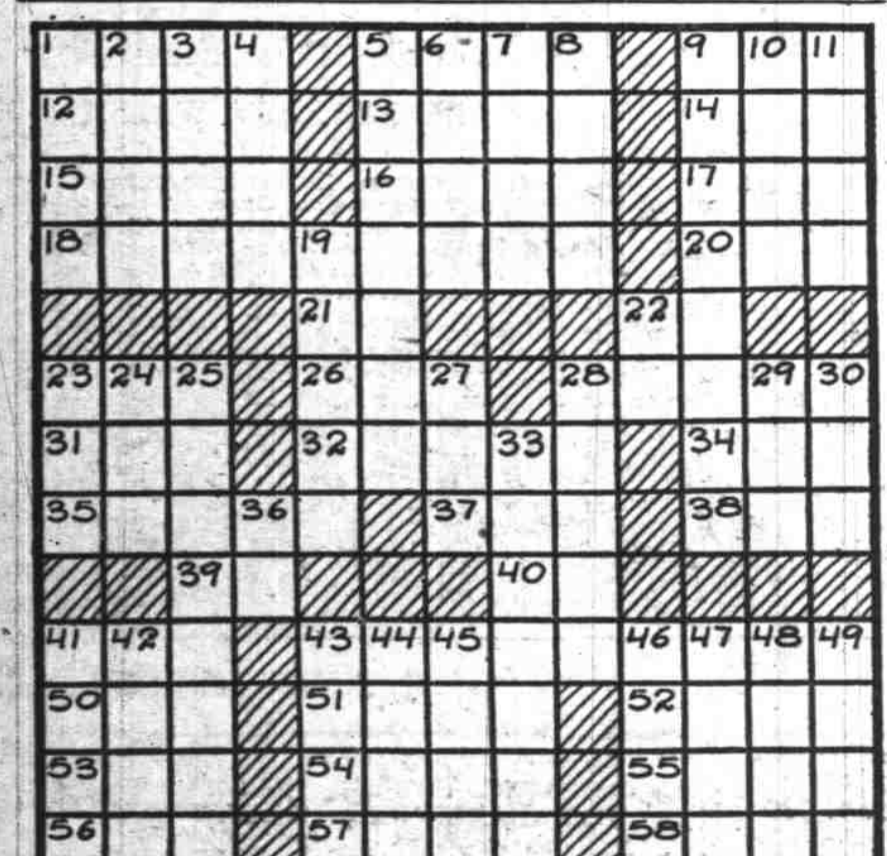
