Britain Key Power in International Crisis



Committed to playing an active role in international affairs because of her far-flung empire and interests, Great Britain is confronted with two difficult problems simultaneously because of the Mediterranean and Far East situations. Russia's curt charge that Italy was responsible for submarine "piracy" in the Mediterranean found British Premier Neville Chamberlain relying on a conference of Mediterranean powers at the League of Nations at Geneva as a possible solution. Failure of this

parley to reach some agreement may mean that the British fleet, reinforced by France, will be assigned to patrol the southern sea. In China, Britain has investments totaling some \$1,500,000,000. Here, too, the situation was complicated by Japan's polite but unyielding answer to Britain's note demanding redress for wounding of the British ambassador to China. British policy has been one of caution, avoiding forcing of any issue.
