Favorite Meat Takes on Company Airs

Good old hamburger goes in for quite a bit of style when served as individual meat loaves at dinner. Mix the ground meat with grated onion, breadcrumbs, finely diced bacon or some fresh pork and seasonings. Add an egg if desired and form into good sized balls, enough for an individual serving. Put in the oven, arranging the meat balls close together in a pan. Add a very little water and bake quickly as possible until well browned.

Serve the individual meat loaves with baked potatoes, new broccoli, sliced hot spiced beets and fresh vegetable salad, as the main course. May be a mushroom gravy for added elegance.

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Several Fancy Breads Made, One Recipe

Along about this time in the fall when cooking becomes a pleasure, most good cooks decide to make yeast bread. And if they're in the habit of making bread frequently, they'll find themselves talking about fancy sweet breads.

There are many sweet breads to make from a basic bread, and once you've learned the knack of baking white bread, there are ever so many variations possible. Vienna twists, Swedish tea rings, butterhorns, bear claws, raised doughnuts, butter rolls, finger rolls, Parkerhouse rolls, pecan rolls, and many others are to be made.

This sweet dough is a good recipe to know.

SWEET DOUGH 1 cake compressed yeast 1/2 cup lukewarm water 1 cup boiling water 1/2 cup shortening 2 teaspoons salt 1/2 cup sugar 1 cup cold water 2 eggs, beaten 10 cups flour, or more

Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water. Mix shortening, boiling water, salt and sugar. When dissolved add 1 cup cold water, eggs and yeast mixture. Use large wooden spoon to stir in flour, knead well. Put in buttered bowl, cover, rise until double in bulk, shape into rolls, rise again. Put in 450 degree oven set for 375 degrees and bake 15 to 20 minutes.

Kolaches are sweet rolls made using the same dough.

SHAPE SWEET DOUGH into small balls and let rise until double in bulk. Press centers down to hold filling. Fill when light with thick jam. Brush with melted fat and bake in 400 degree oven 20 minutes. While hot brush with thin confectioners' sugar and water icing.

SAUSAGE ROLLS Cut dough in rectangles and wrap around little pig sausages, or cut in strips and wrap spirally around sausages. Bake in 375 degree oven 20 minutes.

POTATOES O'BRIEN 2 tablespoons butter 2 tablespoons flour 1 1/2 cups milk 1 cup grated American cheese Salt, pepper 1/4 small onion chopped 1/4 green pepper chopped 1 pimiento chopped 4 medium size boiled potatoes Melt butter, stir in flour, add milk. Cook two minutes, add cheese, stir until cheese is melted, season to taste. Add onion, green pepper and pimiento. Place a layer of diced potatoes in a buttered baking dish, then a layer of sauce, repeating alternately, with sauce on top. Bake 20 minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees).
