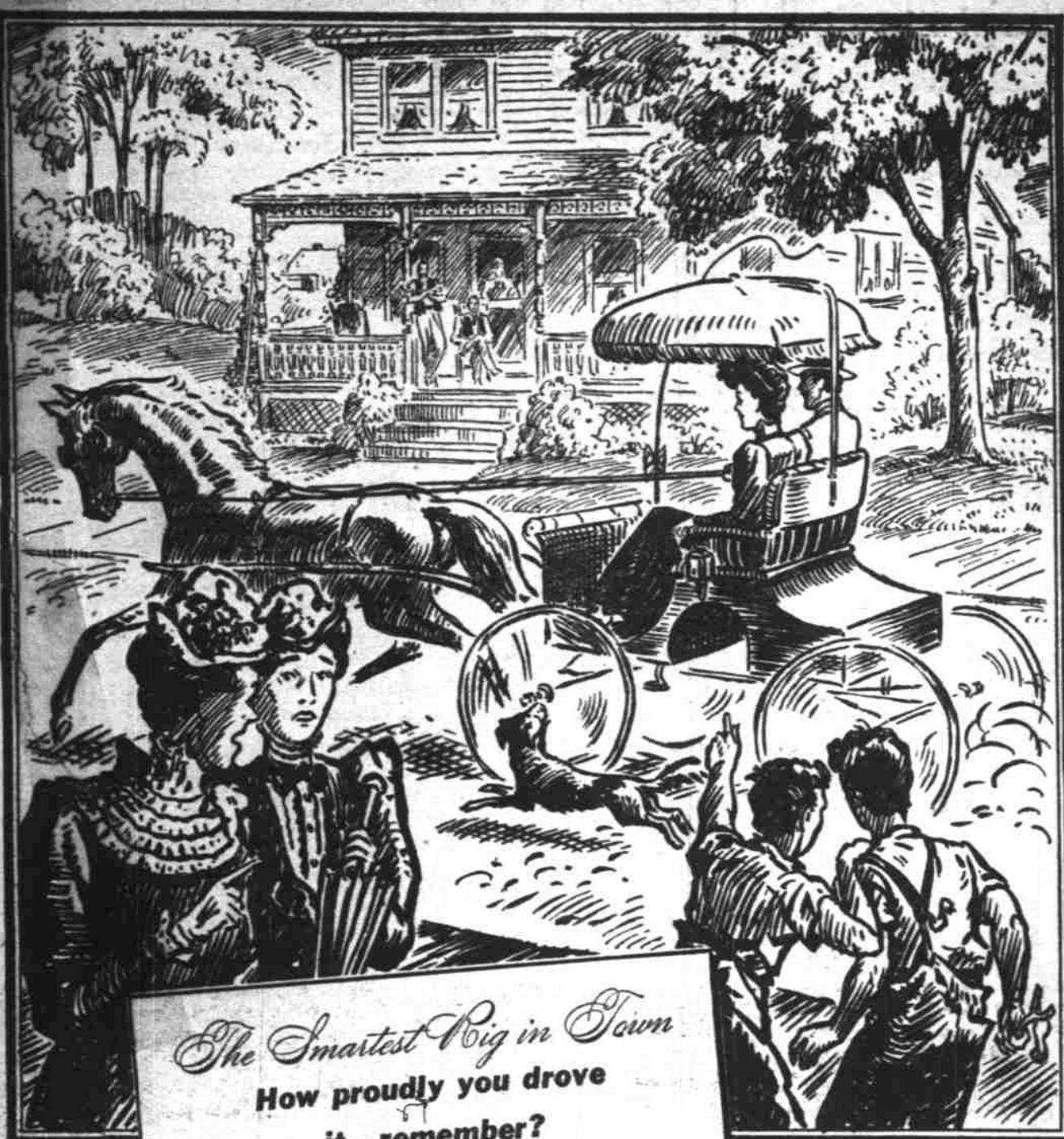

on its Albany-Dollar branch. Stuart claimed that he was hurtled from a speeder and that the accident was due to negligence of the company in removing a rock lodged on the track.

Three points were stressed by the defendants. First, that Stuart was engaged in interstate commerce; second, that he himself was responsible for the condition of the track; and third, that his present condition is due to arthritis rather than to injury. Stuart was asking \$60,000 in compensation, which the jury denied.

Old Wood Water Mains Replaced With Iron Pipe

SCIO—With favorable weather conditions a crew of six men under direction of Councilman Fred Roadarmel made good progress this week in the project of uncovering old wooden water mains on West Main street preparatory to laying new six-inch cast-iron pipe for a distance of approximately 500 feet north, beginning at the Mill and Main street corner of the Wesely grocery store.

This work will carry the line to the proximity of the Lowe funeral home on Main street, replacing wooden pipes that have served the city for many years. Several hundred feet of new iron pipe was placed last year, from Main street to the school grounds.

It is stated by old-timers that some of the wood pipes have been in service here for 40 years, "and they certainly owe the city nothing now," a pioneer observed.
