

Martin Sued for Large Sum Over Earl Fehl's Imprisonment

Papers Served Upon Governor

Conspiracy With Moody Is Alleged; "Railroaded" Says Former Judge

PORTLAND, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Governor Charles Martin was named defendant today in a \$548,000 damage suit filed in circuit court here by Earl H. Fehl, former Jackson county judge, who served a prison term in connection with Jackson county ballot theft cases.

Fehl's complaint alleged that the governor conspired with Ralph Moody, assistant attorney general, to deny him release from the state penitentiary on April 15, 1936, when, Fehl contended, he should have been freed under a good-time credit rule.

Governor Martin, attending the Pacific International Livestock exposition here today, remarked that "I understand I have a little suit." He must think I'm an economic royalist," the governor laughed. "He'll have a hell of a time collecting it."

Governor Served
T. G. Lowry, Multnomah county deputy sheriff, served the papers on the governor as he stood near the entrance of the stock show, chatting with exposition officials.

Fehl charged that the alleged conspiracy was the result of a "fiendish desire" to crush him personally and as judge in Jackson county "in order to assist Moody in covering up his alleged misdeeds while operating in Jackson county under the protection of the prosecuting attorney's office."

The complaint alleged that the governor and Moody spent \$68,000 of the taxpayers' monies to "railroad" Fehl to prison, and that he remained in confinement more than a month because of alleged unconstitutional acts of the governor. Fehl claimed 480 days' good-time credit off his original sentence of four years.

Says Forced to Sign
When eventually released, Fehl claimed he was forced to sign an agreement the provisions of which, not fulfilled, meant death of 16 months additional confinement.

The agreement, he said, was not authorized by the parole board but was "the personal and vicious act" of Governor Martin.

The conditional parole required that he stay out of Jackson county until last August.

Fehl also claimed that the governor, after the last legislature passed a bill upholding good-time rewards for prisoners, released other prisoners but failed to take action on his case.

The state supreme court once released a plea by Fehl for the deduction of good-time credits from his sentence, the decision being followed by a riot in the penitentiary attributed to resentment by the convicts of the court ruling.

others will be dissuaded from such a course.

"There must be positive endeavors to preserve peace," the president added.

His address, which was broadcast nationally, called no names, but it seemed clear some of his remarks concerning aggression were aimed at participants in the undeclared Sino-Japanese war, attacks in the Mediterranean on neutral shipping, outside nations taking sides in the Spanish civil war, and the Italian occupation of Ethiopia.

After asserting strife among a tenth of the world's population threatens the security of the rest of the world, the president declared:

"When an epidemic of physical disease starts to spread, the community approves and joins in a quarantine of the patients in order to protect the health of the community against the spread of the disease."

that Brown was an accomplice of Coffey. His second objection was to admission of the testimony of Curtis Ferguson that Brown once asked him in the Model cafe for \$10 and then walked out in front of the restaurant to talk to Coffey. The court's dismissal and comment was that Brown's "request for the money possessed no different significance than if, after punching a cash register upon the appropriate key, he had taken out ten dollars. Being a verbal act, which lent significance to equivocal acts, his request for the money was admissible as evidence."

The contention by Coffey's counsel that the trial court erred in admitting as evidence a photostatic copy of a check alleged to have been paid by Brown to the St. Paul Furniture Company in satisfaction of a bill owed there, because the check was said to be a gift of appreciation for Coffey's action in returning to Brown a slot machine previously seized, was overthrown by the court.

The fourth error alleged by the defendant, that the trial court erred in refusing to permit the defense to introduce as evidence an order of the Marion county circuit court directing some Salem police officers to return to their owners certain slot machines which had been seized, was also denied, on the grounds that there was nothing in the court order which the defendant sought to introduce showing that Coffey was one of the officers directed to return the machines, or that the machine Coffey returned to Brown was one of those described in the order.

"Yet we had no more right and no more responsibility to act on your behalf in those cases than we have now to forbid an employer to coerce membership in one of your unions, or in one of the CIO unions, or in an independent union not affiliated with either."

"And if this (Wagner) law shall ever be amended so that in words or in effect it shall say that employees shall be entitled to be represented by a union of the employers' choosing, then all the rest of the law should be repealed, for America will have become again the happy hunting ground for the company union."

Europe Hails Statement as Favorable; League Sees Support Here

cabinet ministers in an important session today would discuss it at length.

Sources close to the British government said the American executive's speech tended to reinforce the British and French demand, at present in the hands of Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy, for removal of foreign volunteers from Spain's civil war.

Comment in foreign capitals was restricted largely to general terms pending receipt by officials of the text of the address.

(The state department in Washington cabled copies of the speech to United States representatives abroad, to be made available to any foreign power desiring to study it.)

League Considers Stand Supported

In Geneva, League of Nations' statesmen regarded the league's condemnation of Japan for the Sino-Japanese conflict as made especially forceful by President Roosevelt's declaration.

In Paris, a foreign office spokesman characterized it as marking the "real entry of the United States" into the world's troubled affairs.

The speech will have tremendous repercussions," he said. "The full backing of the United States for nations who are working to preserve peace means that they will be greatly strengthened."

Officials in Berlin were loath to comment pending receipt of the full text but there was a tendency to assume the president referred principally to the far eastern situation.

In Rome, the peace motif in the president's address was emphasized. Italian officials called attention to Premier Mussolini's speech in Berlin in which he expressed belief peace would result from his meeting with Chancellor Adolf Hitler.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—(AP)—President Roosevelt's hint of an international "quarantine" against aggressive nations stirred the imagination and wonder of diplomatic circles today with its tremendous potentialities.

Speculation centered on whether Mr. Roosevelt had any specific course in mind when he called repeatedly for "concerted effort" against violators of treaties and rights, when he warned the world that there is no escape from "international" in mere isolation or neutrality, and when he noted communities with quarantines.

No responsible official in the capital would envision in these remarks the extreme of a proposal for an international police force. There was excited conjecture, however, that they might mean any of these things:

1. Moral support and encouragement for current efforts of the League of Nations to dissuade Japan from its war-like course in China.

2. A specific proposal by the United States some time in the future for action by "peace-loving nations" against aggressors, either through trade measures or other means.

3. Testing of public sentiment in this country toward collaboration with other powers.

4. Ultimate invocation of the nine-power pact guaranteeing the independence and integrity of China, or of the Kellogg anti-war treaties, as an instrument of national policy.

The Roosevelt speech today evoked high praise from the Chinese ambassador to this country, C. T. Wang.

Most Latin American diplomatic representatives here expressed enthusiastic approval of the speech. Comment among members of congress generally was favorable.

Conflicting Sino-Japanese reports described a bloody battle in Shantung province, north China, around the important city of Tachow. The Japanese said they had routed the Chinese troops and were advancing toward Kiananfu, provincial capital. Chinese said the battle still raged at Tachow with the outcome in doubt.

Estate Is Seeking To Void Mortgage

Chris J. Kowitz, as executor of the Paul V. Johnson estate, obtained probate court authority yesterday to commence suit to void a \$7000 mortgage executed by the late Mr. Johnson to his mother-in-law, Minnie Graham. Given August 18, 1926, the mortgage was for the purpose of defrauding creditors of the deceased. Kowitz' petition for authority to sue asserts:

The Paul V. Johnson estate is insolvent, the petition further declares. While the estate was appraised at \$12,786.90, claims against it approved to date total \$14,563.23. It claims likely to be approved will reach approximately \$20,000, the executor says.

H. E. Barker, council resident, announced. Identity of the delegate was not disclosed.

Barker said a farmer-laborer relations board consisting of representatives from the two organizations had been formed and had already held several meetings. Walter Chambers, S. P. Davidson and Barker attended a Farmers' Union convention last Saturday.

Bringing the relations of the paper industry unions and other groups closer together was discussed at the council session by Harold Reich of Portland, international representative of the Brotherhood of Papermakers.

Plans for a series of union benefit dances beginning October 29 were announced.

Italian Air Fleet Operations Cause Sharp New Crisis

LONDON, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Fascist reports of a crack new Italian air fleet carrying 11 Duce's aviator son in Spain and a pirate submarine's defiance of Britain's sea might tonight created what informed observers termed "an ugly situation" for world peace.

These two new factors brought France and Britain face to face with a grave threat of events made more critical by bitter warfare in two parts of the world.

Foreign Secy. Anthony Eden, taking at least moral support from President Roosevelt's indictment of creators of "anarchy," broke off a country holiday and hurried to London for tomorrow's important cabinet session.

Well informed sources said President Roosevelt's Chicago speech, in which he pleaded for world peace and stated that warring nations would be discussed at length at the cabinet meeting.

Special Session Strongly Hinted

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—(AP)—President Roosevelt and Secretary Wallace hinted broadly in speeches yesterday and today that congress will be called in special session this fall.

Both emphasized the necessity for immediate action on crop control legislation if it is to become effective in time for spring planting.

Mr. Roosevelt, home ward bound from a trip to the west coast, told an audience at Grand Forks, N. D., that "haste seems to be important from every angle" if new legislation is to affect the 1938 crops.

Secretary Wallace spoke more specifically of the need for speed. He said he hoped that a decision could be reached on a permanent farm program "after full debate during the next two months."

Wallace, frequent advocate of a special session, talked in New York.

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Nine-Power Pact Call Is Forecast

GENEVA, Oct. 5.—(AP)—The League of Nations moved today to convene a conference of signatories of the nine-power pact, including the United States, to deal with Japanese "invasion" of China.

The league's advisory committee adopted recommendations of the Sino-Japanese sub-committee which condemned Japan and proposed league action in the conflict.

The sub-committee, after formally branding Japan guilty of violating the nine-power treaty, the Boxer protocol and the Brundage-Kellogg pacts, recommended the nine powers to meet as soon as possible.

It also recommended the league assembly be kept in readiness for a special session to discuss the far eastern situation.

Signatories of the nine-power treaty which guarantees the territorial integrity of China, are Britain, Japan, the United States, Great Britain, France, Italy, Belgium, The Netherlands and Portugal.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Reduced personnel, both in Washington and in state offices, was forecast today for public works administration employees.

Officials estimated a approximately one-third of the 1,246 employees in the state PWA offices would be let out November 1 when the regional organization plan goes into effect.

Areas where most or all of the work has been completed will suffer greatest in the scaling down process.

The change from the state to the regional setup for PWA will affect 58 in region seven, which Portland, Ore., is headquarters.
