terday for concerted international action to restore world peace, the department's statement accused Japan of violating the nine-power treaty and the Kellogg-Briand pact, renouncing war and the principles which "should govern the relationships between nations."

No Statement on
Conference Issue

The pronouncement did not say whether the United States would accept the league's proposal for a conference of nine-power signatories to consider action, but it was predicted in authoritative circles that the proposal would be accepted.

This government's formal condemnation of the Japanese military operations in China was expressed as follows:

"In the light of the unfolded developments in the far east the government of the United States has been forced to take the action of Japan in China is inconsistent with the principles which should govern the relationships between nations and is contrary to the provisions of the nine-power treaty of February 6, 1922, regarding principles and policies to be followed in matters concerning China, and to those of the Kellogg-Briand pact of August 27, 1928."

GENEVA, Oct. 6. (AP)—The League of Nations put pressure on Japan tonight to end her undeclared war on China.

The league assembly threw its "moral support" to China, called on the nine-power treaty group to act and told Japan there might be other measures if she did not quit her war.

The assembly, in which 52 nations sit, first adopted unanimously a report of its advisory committee which named Japan as the guilty nation in the far eastern strife and warned of the possibility of international action unless Japan agrees to a peaceful nine-power settlement.

The Agha Khan, president of the assembly, dispatched letters to league members who are signatories of the Washington nine-power treaty, to guarantee China's integrity, inviting them to consider what steps may be taken to end the fighting.

The assembly adjourned but left machinery running to deal with the war through the plan to call league-member adherents of the nine-power treaty and through its advisory committee on Sino-Japanese affairs, on which the United States sits as an observer.

PORTLAND, Oct. 6. (AP)—The Champoeg park commission passed a resolution today asking the state capital planning commission to provide that a pioneer statue, to be placed atop the new capitol building in Salem, be faced toward the park.

The commission planned to resume improvement work at the park within a few days.

Warren, Juntunen and Martinak and three other Oregon boys will compete in dairy and animal husbandry judging at the American FFA Live Stock show at Kansas City held in conjunction with the FFA convention.

The western Oregon delegates will leave Portland on the Portland Rose October 14 and return home via the southern route about October 24. Cooley and three high school agriculture instructors will accompany the delegation.

The three men, none considered dangerous, escaped by picking the lock on a window in their second floor ward and slid down a drain pipe to the ground.

All three of the fugitives formerly lived in Portland. Drennon at one time was a member of the Portland police department.

Brite Boys Lose Out Upon Appeal

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6. (AP)—The mountaineer brothers John H. and Coke T. Brite lost in the state supreme court today their legal fight to beat death sentences imposed for the murder of two officers and a vacationer in the northern California wilds Aug. 30, 1935.

Unanimously the high court upheld the conviction. It ruled the officers were acting legally when they aroused the brothers from their camp to arrest them on assault charges. A midnight battle to the death ensued.

The decision added to a long series of defeats for the Brites and their 65-year-old mother, Martha.

"Mom" Brite claimed the \$1,000 reward offered by Siskiyou county supervisors for capture of the brothers and vowed she would use it in their defense.

The state held up payment of the reward and the courts finally ruled the supervisors had no authority to offer it.

Ross May Retain His Present Post

SEATTLE, Oct. 6. (AP)—J. D. Ross said here it would not be necessary for him to resign as superintendent of the city light department, in the event of his appointment as Bonnevill dam administrator, since such an appointment would be only temporary.

Legislation introduced in the last congress and now pending, he said, would provide for a board of three to administer the new federal districts.

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Mayor to Forego Greeting Farley

Kuhn Probably to Be Gone
to National Municipal
Meeting at Chicago

That Mayor V. E. Kuhn probably will not be on hand to extend greetings to Postmaster General James A. Farley when he visits Salem October 16 was made evident by Mayor Kuhn yesterday.

If present plans proceed unimpeded, the mayor will leave Sunday, October 10, for Chicago where he will attend the convention of American municipal associations, which convenes there October 13, 14 and 15, as a delegate from the League of Oregon Cities.

Mayor Kuhn said he had received a communication from Clifford W. Ham, executive secretary of the national association, asking him to speak at the convention on two occasions. For one address Mayor Kuhn has been asked to make a summary of the luncheon, in which the mayor of Philadelphia is the chief speaker, and present the gist of the digest to the general assembly.

This will be the first time the League of Oregon Cities, of which organization Mayor Kuhn is president, has been represented by its head at the national meeting of municipal associations, according to Mr. Kuhn.

From Chicago the mayor plans to go on to New Orleans to attend the annual convention of city managers which will be held there directly after the Chicago meeting.

Mayor Kuhn said he would be out of town for two weeks, and that he would appoint an acting mayor to take over in his absence.

supreme court was on or off the program.

The convening date of the session, if there is one, he asserted, will be between November 8 and 16. That would give congress time, he said, to get the spade-work done before the Christmas holidays. If there is no special term, congress will not convene until January 3.

He will discuss with aides after he returns to the White House Friday the advisability of recommending additional district judges. That was part of his original court reorganization program and has been approved by a recent conference of senior circuit judges.

Exhibiting a jauntiness and showing no fatigue from his 3,000-mile coast-to-coast tour, the president said he had observed on that trip several important things:

(1) There apparently was little interest in methods but much interest in objectives.

(2) There is a better understanding on the part of voters of what his administration is striving for.

(3) Crop conditions west of the Mississippi river are infinitely better than at any time in the last four years.

Amplifying the first point he said the general attitude was: Maybe the president is right, maybe the president is wrong, but we want the objectives.

Engineer to View Santiam Highway

County Will Take Control
of Another Section
Soon, Planned

H. D. Farmer, senior engineer with the federal bureau of public roads, will arrive in Salem today to make a two-day inspection of the North Santiam highway in company with County Commissioner Roy Melson and County Engineer N. C. Hubbs.

From the inspection will evolve plans for the county's taking over another section of the completed highway, for halting encroachment of logging operators on highway right-of-way timber, for maintenance of the main road and for keeping up detours.

With the county now maintaining 20 miles of the highway immediately above Detroit, the bureau is asking that the court accept an additional 2 1/2 miles. The bureau, however, will maintain the latter section for two years longer.

The last lap in the North Santiam route above Detroit, aside from one bridge, has been completed by the bureau. The bridge is now under construction. Only remaining work to be done is additional rock surfacing.

The major problem left will be to eliminate the 12-mile bottleneck between Detroit and Gates, Engineer Hubbs said yesterday.

Vancouver Strike Closes Theatres

VANCOUVER, Oct. 6. (AP)—Ardent theatre-goers sat at home tonight as negotiations between operators of moving picture houses in 11 major centers and officers of the British Columbia projectionists' society remained deadlocked over wage increase demands.

Of the 50 theatres throughout the province, only seven remained open on the mainland and three on Vancouver Island.

The strike began last night when projection machine operators in 15 independent houses in greater Vancouver and New Westminster walked out.

Today the strike spread to Victoria, Nanaimo, Kamloops, Vernon, Kelowna, Penticton, Rossland, Revelstoke and Prince Rupert, including theatres operated by Famous Players Canadian Corporation.
