

Stalin to Run For Assembly

Soviet Voters Will Choose Legislature December 12 in Elections

MOSCOW, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Joseph Stalin tonight was announced as first nominee for a seat in Russia's new nationwide legislature—a two-chambered supreme soviet—to be elected December 12.

With him to share first election honors was nominated Nikolai Yezhov, chief of the Russian political police which has been responsible for exposure of Trotskyists and other anti-Stalin "wreckers" to firing squads.

MOSCOW, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The campaign for a full vote of nearly 100,000,000 electors in the December 12 election to choose soviet Russia's new legislature swung underway today.

First posters appeared, urging everybody to vote.

A two-chambered supreme soviet is to be chosen in the first direct and secret election for a nationwide legislature.

The soviet of the union will have 569 members, elected on the basis of population; the soviet of nationalities will have 574 members, elected on a geographical basis.

The newspaper Izvestia today called for vigilance among the voters to prevent anyone disloyal to "the workers' dictatorship" from slipping into the legislature.

Portlanders Will Aid Highway Work

BURNS, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Portland business men who visited Burns today on a good-will tour pledged their support to the effort of the Burns chamber of commerce to obtain improvement of the central Oregon highway.

Mayor A. A. Bardwell of Burns told the 32 members of the group that the road probably would be impassable in a few days, and charged that contractors had failed to fulfill surfacing and oiling contracts let earlier this year.

Leo Baruh, chairman of the trade and commerce committee of the Portland chamber, said that group, at its next meeting, would urge the state highway commission to speed up improvement of the road which spans the state from Ontario on the east to Bend on the west.

6 Seamen Burn to Death on Tanker

BAYTOWN, Texas, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Six seamen burned to death and nine were injured today when sudden flames enveloped the engine room and galley of the tanker Paraguan.

Trapped when a hose broke as the tanks were being flushed with kerosene, the men screamed for aid as the fire crackled toward them.

The flames leaped higher than the tanker funnel.

Flames from the galley stove, Humble Oil and Refinery company officials announced, ignited the kerosene when the oil line broke.

All except the chief steward were Venezuelans.

The master of the vessel is an Englishman, T. W. Welch.

The boat was being prepared for a cargo of oil for the Dominican republic. The tanker is of 20,000 barrels capacity, officials of the Humble company said. Her home port is Maracaibo, Venezuela.

Mulino Woman Is Victim of Crash

OREGON CITY, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Mrs. Amelia Shockley, 60, of Mulino, died in a local hospital of injuries received in an automobile collision at the intersection of the Pacific highway and the fairgrounds road near Canby.

Lease Is Granted Federal Approval

The federal government yesterday approved a lease prepared recently by the state unemployment compensation insurance commission, under which it will take over a large part of the old Salem high school. The lease will run for a period of four years.

The unemployment compensation commission is now located on the fifth floor of the state office building but will move into its new quarters as soon as remodeling operations are completed.

Officials said additional room was badly required. Payment of benefits under the unemployment compensation law will begin next January.

Display Space at World Fair Taken

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The state of Oregon contracted today to spend \$150,000 for 2000 square feet in the hall of states and 50,000 square feet for a display of industries and wild life.

Charles T. Haas, chairman of the Oregon world's fair commission; Thomas F. Cunn, vice-chairman; and Grover A. Whalen, president of the fair corporation, signed the contract.

Oregon's display will include a model of the Bonneville dam, a real Beaver dam, antelope, cougars, salmon and trout, and many agricultural and industrial products of the state.

Bids on Overhead Crossing Due as Land Deals Ready

ALBANY—Bids for one unit of the new highway overhead crossing in Albany will be called as soon as right-of-way deals are secured, State Highway Engineer Baldock is reported as announcing while here Saturday.

Baldock and party were on their way to Shedd to view the work of widening the highway which is being done from two miles north of Shedd to about a mile south of Halsey. The highway has been completed to the southern limits of Shedd and a crew is now working north from Halsey. It is understood that it will require another month to complete the work.

League Opposing Utility District

HILLSBORO, Oct. 12.—(AP)—H. R. Findley, president of the Washington county taxpayers' league, said the organization planned an active campaign of opposition to the proposed formation of a northwest Oregon Bonneville peoples' utility district.

County Clerk Arthur Tupper reported 31 petitions, bearing 600 certified signatures, had been filed here by sponsors of the district. The proposal provides for inclusion of Washington, Yamhill, Clark, Clatsop, Columbia, Lincoln and Polk counties.

Newspaper Guild To Represent UP

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Mrs. Eleanor M. Merrick, regional director of the national labor relations board, announced today the American Newspaper Guild has been selected as collective bargaining agency by editorial employees of the United Press in a poll of workers here and abroad.

The vote was 277 to 84 in favor of the guild out of 421 eligible to vote.

Nine Killed in Plunge Of Dutch Naval Plane

LONDON, Oct. 13.—(Wednesday)—(AP)—A Reuters (British) news agency dispatch from Amsterdam early today reported nine men were killed when a Dutch naval plane crashed during a night flight.

No further details were immediately available.

Managed Scarcity Opposed by Frank

"Abundant Life" Requires More Production, Says at Banker Meeting

BOSTON, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Dr. Glenn Frank, former president of the University of Wisconsin, denounced production restriction and price raising as "economic insanity" today and urged industry and agriculture to work together to achieve the "abundant life."

"If we are to do more than talk about the abundant life," Dr. Frank declared at the 63rd annual convention of the American Bankers association, "then both the manufacturers of American industry and the farmers of American agriculture must come to believe in and to practice consistently the policy of more goods at

lower prices instead of fewer goods at higher prices."

Dr. Frank, now head of the magazine Rural Progress, Chicago, pleaded for a "workable economics of plenty" after Frank P. Bennett Jr., Boston editor, demanded the federal government keep "its clumsy hands" off the savings field.

The former university president defined the "abundant life" as meaning "a better fed, better clothed, better housed people with bodies and minds and spirits emancipated from the unduly low living standards and freed for values that lie beyond economics."

Charles Kingsford Smith Alive, Brother Believes

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Convinced that his brother, Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith, still is alive, R. H. K. Smith sailed on the liner Mariposa today for Sydney, Australia, to join in a search for the aviator missing almost two years.

Ransom Is Asked For Stolen Body

Body of Man Buried Last Sunday Is Taken From Grave, Discovered

STREETVILLE, Ont., Oct. 12.—(CP)—The grave of a young man buried Sunday was found open today, the coffin empty and a note in the casket demanding payment of \$100 for return of the body.

A woman friend of the family of Hayden Pope, 20, who died last week, saw fresh earth tossed about the grave when she visited the cemetery today.

She told a passing delivery boy of her find. The boy went to police with the story.

Police found the coffin had been pulled partly from the grave and opened. The body was gone.

Kunke Is Injured In 24-Foot Tumble
