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Election Form Gets Approval

Four Proposals Related and not Alternates, Pointed out now

construct a new courthouse on the present site in Salem at a cost of approximately \$550,000 while the other three questions, if approved by the voters, provide a means of financing the project. The latter three take into consideration the possibility, now remote, of the county's receiving federal aid but if adopted would also give the court means of paying for the new building without outside help.

The four questions read as follows:
1. "Shall the county of Marion, state of Oregon, build and construct a new courthouse on the present courthouse site in the city of Salem, in said county, to cost approximately \$550,000, and the county court of said county be authorized and instructed to proceed with such construction on or about April 1, 1938, or as soon thereafter as finances for the same are available? Vote yes or no."

2. "Shall the county court of Marion county, Oregon, establish a fund for courthouse construction purposes to be designated as a budget item entitled 'Courthouse Construction Fund' and transfer and allocate to said fund the sum of \$250,000, to be taken from the following funds now on hand as assets of said county, viz: \$100,000, in cash from the surplus funds of unappropriated and unallocated balances and surpluses in the several subdivisions of the general fund of said county not including the road fund, and the sum of \$150,000, from the uncollected and delinquent general fund taxes of said county for the years 1929 to 1935, inclusive, and shall the county court of said Marion county be authorized to complete its application to the United States government for a federal emergency administration of public works grant of \$266,404 for courthouse construction purposes? Vote yes or no."

3. "Shall the county court of Marion county, Oregon, be authorized and directed to levy a tax of not exceeding two mills on the dollar, on all taxable property in Marion county, for the purpose of constructing and erecting a new courthouse for said county, such levy to be made in said amount for each of the following years, viz: 1938, 1939, 1940, 1941, 1942, 1943 and 1944 and shall said court be authorized to make such levy notwithstanding said levy in any of such years may in whole or in part be made in said amount provided by the Oregon constitution, article XI, section 11, and by statute, said levy to be discontinued when the amount collected in taxes under such levy, plus such sum as may be received by Marion county as federal emergency administration of public works grant, shall equal the cost of the new courthouse? Vote yes or no."

4. "Shall the county court of Marion county, Oregon, levy a tax in November, 1937, for the year 1938 in the amount of two mills on the dollar, or \$80,000 for the purpose of providing funds to construct a new courthouse, which said tax will exceed the 6 per cent limitation imposed by article XI, section 11, of the constitution of the state of Oregon."

"The reason given by the county court for the calling of such election for the submission of the foregoing question is as follows: 'A petition has been filed with the county court as provided by section 27-303 of the Oregon code for 1930, requesting the court to call a special election for the purpose of authorizing construction of a new courthouse for Marion county, Oregon, and requesting that the construction work be financed among other methods by levying a tax of two mills in November, 1937, for the year 1938, and for that purpose it will be necessary to increase the levy to the extent of the two mill tax in excess of constitutional limitation, if construction is authorized. Vote yes or no.'"

Mildred Oleson Outlines Aids to Understanding Modern Art Trends

Declaration that it requires courage to take up the serious study of modern art and attempt to understand it was one of the highlights of the "talk Tuesday" night in the fireplace room at the Salem Public Library by Mildred E. Oleson, recently chosen city librarian, which was given under the auspices of the Salem Arts league.

She had a group of books concerning art and its appreciation on the big round table and referred to them in her talk. She brought out the point that art is indispensable to civilization as it gives a measure for its life and culture. In attempting a study of art, she said that it was necessary to limit the field and choose a particular sector. No rule of art can hold good for all people and for all time, she indicated.

Previous to the general program, a business session was held. Mrs. Jessie Singleton was chosen financial secretary to take the place of Mrs. Don McLeod, who has removed from the city. The league council admitted a newly-formed section formed to develop creative music. This is under the leadership of Mrs. Donna Eason. The section plans to meet the first and third Thursdays of each month at Mrs. Eason's home.

A group of writers interested in producing popular fiction is being formed under the leadership of Mrs. William Merriott. Loren Boulter, formerly an instructor of art at Dana college in Blair, Nebraska, who is leader of the painting section, reported progress in the work of the group. He said it decided to do water colors.

Leaders of the various sections, as announced by Mrs. Blanche Jones, president of the league, are: Writers, Prof. W. E. Lawrence, Corvallis; painting, Loren Boulter; music composition, Mrs. David Eason. Mrs. Ella Hathaway, chairman of the program committee, announced that C. B. McCullough, assistant state highway engineer and formerly state bridge engineer, will speak at the November session of the league on "The Art of Designing Bridges."

Seal Sale Heads Hear Mrs. Dunbar

Marion County Leaders at Meeting Told of TB Work in State

Standards which tuberculosis associations of 11 western states will strive for in the next few years were recounted by Mrs. Saldie Orr Dunbar, secretary of the Oregon TB association, at a luncheon meeting at the Quella yesterday of Marion county tuberculosis seal sale leaders here for the seal sale institute.

Eradication of tuberculosis headlines the controlled program, but to drop from the 1936 figure of 26 plus per 100,000 to the goal of 15 per 100,000 will mean even harder work than the history-making work which has already been accomplished, she said.

Marion county seal sale purchasers will aid in this work as well as other features of the tuberculosis program, Mrs. Dunbar pointed out.

Local Seal Aid Large
As high as 75 per cent of the seal sale funds may be retained in the county this year for local use, with 5 per cent to go for national and 20 per cent for the state association. Goal of the seal sale has been upped some over last year, in anticipation that the record of \$56,000 in 1936 may be the goal in another year or so.

Mrs. Dunbar said there are now 97 persons on the constant waiting list for hospital beds in Oregon.

She declared, too, that hope is still held that federal aid will be realized for construction of another tuberculosis hospital in Oregon.

Drill Trophy for ROTC Men Posted

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 12.—A perpetual trophy, to be won each year in competitive company drill at both the University of Oregon and Oregon State college, will be posted by Governor Charles H. Martin, it was announced here.

The competition plan includes a grand review of both the university and the state college cadet units, alternating at the end of each school year at the respective institutions. At this time the award will be made. The first of these parades will be held on this campus next spring.

The outstanding company of each corps will be selected by army officers attached to the schools prior to the date of the grand review. The competition between these two crack companies will then precede the grand review and the winning unit will take a place on the reviewing stand after his company has passed.

Few Wood Cutting Jobs Offered now

A record lack of wood cutting jobs was reported at the local office of the state employment service by Manager D. D. Dotson yesterday. He declared this fall was the first in his five years with the service, he believed, that the job office had no orders for wood cutters on file. Farm jobs are at almost as low an ebb.

"In other years there scarcely was a time when we didn't have at least one wood cutting job to be filled," Dotson remarked.

The program, starting at 6 p. m., will be informal. Malcolm L. Jones, dean of Wolverson senate, will act as toastmaster.

Convict Is Released but Not Free; Faces Charges in California, Revealed

R. W. Dale, who had served ten months of a one-year sentence in the Oregon penitentiary for larceny committed in Multnomah county, was released from the prison here Tuesday but did not regain his freedom.

He was taken into custody immediately by officers from San Quentin prison, California, on a larceny charge preferred in that state.

Library Advisory Board Will Meet

Session Here October 13, State System's Needs to Be Analyzed

Members of the special library advisory committee of the Oregon state planning board will meet in Salem October 13 to complete plans for the state survey of library facilities, it is announced by Miss Harriet C. Long, state librarian and chairman of the group.

Miss Long has just returned from a meeting in Chicago of the executive and library extension boards, where she outlined the Oregon plan for a library survey. She received a number of suggestions from association members, and these she will discuss at the committee meeting.

The state survey, one of the first to be undertaken in the United States, is expected to be the basis for improving library service in all sections of Oregon, especially in areas not adequately served at present. Members of the committee, named in every part of the state, will assist in the survey as well as make suggestions for carrying it out.

WPA to Aid Survey
Work on the study is already under way, with Morris Isseks, technician, in charge. A corps of WPA workers are assisting him in gathering and classifying data.
