Church Plans Event Sunday

Homecoming and Sunday School Anniversary Will Be Celebrated

SILVERTON—The 69th anniversary since the organization of the Methodist Sunday school will be observed here Sunday in conjunction with the annual homecoming event for the church.

Dr. Louis Magin, district superintendent from Salem, will speak at the morning services at 11 o'clock and immediately following this will dedicate the new Sunday school annex.

Following a basket dinner at 12:30 an afternoon program specially honoring old timers will be held. All "new timers, old timers and former pastors are especially invited," says Rev. D. Lester Fields, present pastor.

Newberg Choir to Sing
At 7:30 the Newberg Methodist choir of 35 voices will give an hour's concert at the church auditorium.

The Methodist church was organized in the Silvertown school buildings in 1868 with Miss Mary Woodworth, a school teacher, as the organizer. During the '70s the group who had formed a church body, purchased the Good Templar's hall and redecorated it for church use. It was standing on North Main and First streets at that time and a wagon shop was housed on the ground floor.

Early pastors were such well-known figures as John Flinn, Nehemiah Doane, members of the first Oregon conference of Methodist churches organized at Salem on March 17, 1853, and D. S. Spaulding, Robert Booth and Rev. Adams.

Royal led Building
In 1882, led by Rev. Thomas F. Royal, the present building was erected and Rev. Harvey K. Hines delivered the dedicatory sermon.

Under Rev. H. R. Salisbury in 1907, the building was modernized, with a basement added for Sunday school purposes. The basement was made possible by a gift, provided by the will of Mr. and Mrs. August Pederson, which amounted to \$3000.
