

Dallas School Children to Stage Annual Parade Saturday Night

Line to Form At 7 o'clock

Two Outstanding Boys and Girls to Be Given Grand Prizes

DALLAS—A meeting was held on Tuesday night to complete plans for the annual Halloween parade which will be held this year on Saturday night, October 30. The affair is sponsored each year by the Carl B. Fenton post of the American Legion. Judge Herman Van Well is general chairman of this year's parade.

The parade will include Dallas school children from the elementary grades with 16 rooms participating. A first and second grand prize will be given to the two boys and the two girls having the most outstanding costumes in the entire parade.

Prizes for Each Room In addition to these prizes will be given in the 16 rooms for the best witches costume, the best clown, the best ghost, the best jack o' lantern, the ugliest mask, and the most original costume. Each child taking part will receive a box of cracker jacks.

Prizes will be solicited from Dallas business men who have always been very generous in their donations. A special committee was appointed to solicit and includes Fred Stinnette, Walter Waite, Jack Eakin, Frank Davis, Herman Van Well, and Harold Rich.

Committees in Charge Sidney Whitworth was appointed to secure judges for the parade and William Himes, William Mott, Albert Bennett, Clifford Helgeson, Walter Waite and Herman Van Well will have charge of awarding the prizes. Burton Bell is in general charge of getting the children lined up for the parade and for computing the attending percentages. Prizes will be given to the three rooms having the largest number participating.

The children are asked to line up at 7 o'clock and the judges will make their decisions, with the parade scheduled to start at 7:30. The Dallas city band and the Dallas fire department will take part. Mayor Finseth is co-operating with the legion and an effort will be made to keep all cars off of the east side of Main street from Mill to Court and the north side of Court from Main to Jefferson.
