Brother to Administrator; Four Couples Obtain Marriage Licenses

Emanuel Schindler, pioneer Polk county dairyman who died October 17 at his home, 340 Myers street, Salem, left a personal property estate valued at \$4000, according to petition filed in probate court yesterday for administration of the estate. No real property subject to probate was listed.

passing a parked auto, some two miles south of Halsey, noticed what they first thought to be a boy lying in the rear seat. She was taken to the office of Dr. T. I. Marks, who said he believed she was "doped." Sheriff Frank Richards and Deputy Sheriff J. S. Lillard were notified, and in company with L. G. Levelling, present circuit judge, went to Halsey to investigate.

In the meantime Matson had returned to his home for lunch, only to find the house in disorder, a window broken, and signs of a scuffle, and his wife missing. He also found a note which read: "We are drunk and want some fun. Will leave her along the highway." Matson reached Halsey shortly after Mrs. Matson had been brought in and before she had been removed from the car. Giving her one look, Matson said: "Yes, that's her" and walked away, adding that he would "get them."

Upon recovering sufficiently to be able to talk, Mrs. Matson told the officers she had been attacked and criminally assaulted by two men who had come to the house and asked to use the telephone. Later the men placed her in the Matson car and drove to the highway where she was found according to her story.

On July 27, 1935, Mrs. Matson informed the sheriff's office that she had received a threatening letter, demanding \$5000 and threatening a repetition of the previous episode if the money was not left in a certain mail box on the Pacific highway south of Halsey. Again on August 12 of the same year, Mrs. Matson reported to the sheriff another threatening letter had been received, this one also demanding \$5000.

In the meantime the first letter had been called to the notice of W. I. Staley, Salem handwriting expert. Staley pronounced the notes the work of Mrs. Matson herself. The notes were turned over to the postal authorities and the case finally dropped.

Tangled Plot Marks First Play of Season Given by Civic Players

The action takes place on the stage of the St. James theatre, where Sir Charles Jasper gives a party to celebrate inheritance of a million pounds. That is, he will receive the money if he lives until midnight. He sets the stage to re-enact a legend of the theatre which recalls a ghostly murder in which a dumb woman is supposed to walk the stage to foreshadow a murder.

Plenty of thrills and complications lead up to the unexpected climax of the play. The interest lies in the odd setting of an empty theatre and unused stage.

operators at from \$250 to \$300 an acre. Dead trees are to be felled and removed along with logging debris from view of the right-of-way.

Representatives of the Silver Falls Timber company, which bought logs from some of the encroaching operators agreed to pay for certain stumpage as did Timber Owner William McLeod.

Harris & Hadley and Harry Johnson, other loggers, also promised to clean up at the sites of their encroachments.

Court members said they believed the conference would result in the encroachment problem being cleared up for the most part though there were some other responsible operators who were not present yesterday. Stumpage damages assessed yesterday included \$32.38 against Johnson brothers and \$106.54 against William McLeod. The latter included stumpage cut by Harris & Hadley.
