

Committee Named On Jobless Count

Group to Promote Census Response Is Headed by R. J. Hendricks

Mayer V. E. Kuhn has appointed R. J. Hendricks chairman of a committee which the chairman is to appoint, with the assignment of making the unemployed of Salem conscious of their duty to answer the questions of the national unemployment census, which is to be taken all over the United States, beginning Tuesday next, Nov. 15, and lasting until Saturday the 20th, inclusive.

Mr. Hendricks has already appointed four members of the mayor's committee, and proposes to name six to eight more. The four are George Putnam, Charles A. Sprague, Stephen A. Stone and Ralph C. Curtis. All are to work without pay, and so is the chairman.

He has also secured the pledge of J. E. Monroe, scout executive for the Cascade area council, Boy Scouts, that his organization will attend to the distribution of the posters needed in the campaign, on November 15.

What is this national unemployment census? It is a thing authorized by congress, and its execution ordered over the signature of President Roosevelt. It is an effort to find out just how many persons in the United States who want work are now out of work.

The postoffice department will have cards sent to every family, by mail, so that they will be ready Tuesday morning. The cards are to be filled out by the jobless people themselves, and mailed by them. There is no risk. The answers are secret.

Information Sought

But the idea is that, soon after the cards are all in on Saturday next, the people of this country will know just how many of them who want work are out of work.

Then the authorities at Washington will know better what to do about it. They will know more for the cards will tell these things:

Name, address, totally unemployed and want work, partly employed and want more work, on the W.P.A., N.Y.C. or other emergency work. Also these:

Are you able to work? Age at last birthday, white, negro or other race, occupation or kind of work, kind of business or industry in which you did or are doing this kind of work.

Also, how many other workers in your family or household, and how many out of work or partially so, and want work, or more work.

Also how many dependents. Also your total income last week.

President Roosevelt's section of the letter to the unemployed reads in part:

"The congress directed me to take this census. It is important to the unemployed and to everyone in this land that the census be complete, honest, and accurate. If you give me the facts I shall try to use them for the benefit of all who need and want work and do not now have it."

As indicated, the chairman wants six to eight more members of the mayor's committee. He would like to have labor represented, and also any groups that might need explanations and urging.

All churches in the United States are supposedly to make announcements similar to the above, in their services, tomorrow. The information has come to Salem belatedly. But will those church officials who can do so please make the arrangement indicated.
