Four Active Members, two Alternates Chosen, to Go on Trip Soon

Chosen on the traveling debate squad for Willamette university this year are Bill Thomas, Waldo Lando Hiebert and Aldus Smith. These men will represent Willamette at the Western Association for Teachers of Speech convention to be held at Denver November 22-24. Professor Herbert E. Rahe, head of the university speech department, will leave with his squad next Friday for a 10-day trip.

Edwin Minneman has been chosen as first alternate and Myron Pogue second alternate. The new type of debate this year will feature progression type analogous to the symposium debate. The subject will be "Democracy in Industry."

Speakers Experienced
The four men have had considerable experience and it is hoped they will be able to fill the shoes of Randall Kester and Lawrence Morley, career debaters for four years. Aldus Smith has had three years experience and was on the active squad last year, participating in the Pasadena and Linfield tournaments. Bill Thomas, graduate of Salem high school last year, is known all over the state in high school forensics. Waldo and Lando Hiebert have debated for the past two years and attended the Linfield meet last year.

Ed Minneman has had no real debating experience but has been prominent in oratory, placing second in the Keyes contest last year. Myron Pogue is a freshman and a graduate of Salem high school where he was in debate activities.

Decision Coming On Trucker Case
A decision of paramount importance involving the duties of inter-city truck operators under the state transportation law, is now being written by N. G. Wallace, state utility commissioner, he announced Friday.

The complaint was filed by the Quella restaurant here and charged that two local truck operators had failed to deliver supplies to the restaurant because a picket was stationed outside. The hearing was held last week.

Wallace's decision will determine whether a truck operator, under state permit, can refuse to deliver supplies to a business establishment even though it is under picket.

Further Witnesses to Be Examined in Fatal Hit-Run Case

The Marion county grand jury adjourned late Friday afternoon until Monday morning without returning a report on its investigation of the Clarence LeRoy Hoogerhyde case. It is understood additional witnesses will be examined in this connection Monday morning.

Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan Wednesday declined to accept a plea by Hoogerhyde to an involuntary manslaughter charge which District Attorney Lyle J. Page was about to present and ordered the matter referred to the grand jury. Reunion of 90th Pleases Governor

Executive Returns Friday, Army Division Meet Spirit Praised

Governor Charles H. Martin, upon his return here early yesterday from Tulsa, Okla., declared himself proud of the devotion shown him by the men of the 90th division of the United States army.

The governor spent three days at Tulsa attending the annual reunion of the division.

Governor Martin said all ranks were in attendance, including privates, corporals, sergeants, lieutenants, captains, majors, colonels and generals.

"These men met on a common ground bound together by the universal thought that in a great crisis of their country they had all played their part in the task assigned whether high or low," Governor Martin said.

"None of the jealousy, pettiness or class feeling which harass the country today could find lodgment in the hearts of men recalling their devotion to duty, honor and country."

290,692 Security Accounts Issued

Social security account numbers under the federal social security act had been issued to 290,692 Oregon workers at the end of October, Ben O. Lipscomb, Salem manager of the social security board, announced Friday.

The national total at that time was 35,368,865 of which more than 3,000,000 had been issued to workers in the three Pacific coast states.

Applications for account numbers have declined sharply in recent weeks. Lipscomb said, following the peak of canning and crop moving season when a large number of workers, who are ordinarily not employed at any other time of the year, were obtaining social security cards. In October 14,611 additional account numbers were issued to Oregon workers.

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Martin Proclaims Thanksgiving Day

Governor Charles H. Martin yesterday issued a proclamation setting aside Thursday, November 25, as Thanksgiving day.

The proclamation reads: "It is particularly fitting and proper that at this season of the year we give thanks to God for the many blessings that have been bestowed upon us. Let us not forget to be grateful for the health that is given us and strive to acquire the peace of mind and spiritual contentment that comes to those who look above mere material comfort."

Oregon Held Fortunate
"We citizens of Oregon are particularly blessed, for in this beautiful state of ours we can find inspiration at every hand from our magnificent mountains, gem-like lakes, rugged coastlines and peaceful valleys."

"Our future lies ahead of us, for our state is one of untold possibilities for development."

"Let us remember the inception of Thanksgiving, and in our hearts pay homage to the Almighty who has made all good things possible."

Gaiser Addresses Ad Club Members
Distinguishing between speculation and investment and the part each plays in the field of business, Superintendent of Schools Silas Gaiser, in a speech before the Salem Ad club yesterday noon, applied his definitions to education to show that the business of education represents investment of rather than speculation with the taxpayer's money.

Gaiser said education—a business in which one out of every four persons in the US participates—tops all other enterprises, commercial or governmental, in size. Despite its magnitude, administration is as skillful and funds are handled more accurately than probably any branch of government activity.

Costs Rise, Revenue Falls
Speaking of the problems of the Salem school system faces, Gaiser stated that enrollment had been upped 20 per cent in recent years but property valuation, source of revenue for the school system, had fallen approximately 15 per cent. Another difficulty encountered is in keeping experienced teachers, who, attracted by higher salary levels in both Washington and California, seek employment in these states.

Gaiser was introduced by O. D. Adams, head of the state vocational education department, who presided over the program.
