

Salem Heights School Goes 100 Per Cent for Finger Printing

Salem 20-30 Does Project

PTA and School Directors Lend Support; State Police Help

SALEM HEIGHTS—With completion late Monday of finger printing of every student in all five rooms of the school here, Salem Heights school becomes the first school in Oregon to fall 100 per cent in line with the 20-30 club's project for finger printing children.

The local move was started recently after Harold Pruitt, president of the Salem 20-30 club, explained the finger printing movement at a meeting of the local Parent-Teachers association, attended also by the school board directors.

PTA Cooperates

The PTA endorsed the move, as also did the school directors who are: Dr. F. W. Burger, A. W. Blankenship and George Averitt. Assistance of the school faculty was also accorded, and parents, an every child had to have written consent of the parents before the finger prints were taken.

State Police Help

The actual finger printing was done by State Police Officer Cedric Emahiser and Wayne Smith and Farrell Covalt, representing the 20-30 club.

Other rural schools which have adopted the project include Liberty, where work will be done shortly. The Salem school board has approved the movement also.
