Dr. Thompson Speaks on Oxford

"Oxford Traditions" were related by Dr. Franklin Thompson, professor of history and education at Willamette university, at the regular monthly luncheon meeting of the Saleh branch, American Association of University Women at the First Presbyterian church yesterday afternoon.

He told of the traditions that have grown up at Oxford since the founding of the first hall in the ninth century A.D. There are now 23 colleges at Oxford. It has only been in recent years that women have been accepted and there are now two colleges for women at Oxford.

Students who are entering the university for the first time are interviewed by the vice chancellor who reads the rules of the university in Latin to them. At the same time five proctors are sitting in the room carefully observing the students. The new student wears a commoner's cap and gown while on the campus. It is not compulsory to go to classes but one must attend chapel. A few of the traditional places on the campus are Addison's walk, Shelley's room and John Wesley's room.
