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Virtuous Pair Meet Meanies

Don Coons, ex-Viking pigskin artist who had a whale of a good year with the orange-clad gladders at Oregon State this year, arrived in Salem Friday after finishing a tussle with the exams, preliminary to Christmas vacation. He and hearty, Don says, he weighs in at around 172—which is probably the lightweight record of the coast for an end. They don't come much tougher, however, and Don was chosen on several all-opponent teams.

New System.
It is Don's personal belief that Oregon State will have an even better ball club next fall than was fielded this year, despite the loss of the phantom, Joe Gray, Fullback Kolberg and Guards Watts and Ramsey. Coons says that Stiner expects to change his whole offensive tactics next year, and will sport two ball-carriers in his backfield instead of one. It is the plan to use both Alexander and Higgins in the backfield. Under this setup, Jay Mercer will be moved to the quarterback post vacated by the graduating Duncan. Mercer coveted at right half this year.

Younce to Do Punting.
It is Stiner's intention, according to Coons, to convert Younce into a fullback and use his kicking ability to do the punting. Ben Ell is also available for the boomer spot, and will probably understudy Younce. Both pass-snatching Joe Wendlick and Coons will be back for their last year at the wing berth, Yvevan Jim One should be even better at his snapper-back post. Hackenbruck and Gills will probably handle the tackles, and Schultz and Schell at the guards.

Needed Change.

There was, perhaps, more evident animosity in that ball game than in any Coast conference tilt we've ever seen. It finally broke out in the third quarter, in an open fist fight between Hackenbruck and a Uclan that banished both from the field. It seems, according to Coons, that the Los Angeles huskies thought every pickup was a signal for an underdog slugging bee and the Staters naturally resented such ungentlemanly tactics.

Webfoots Ruthless.
Those high-scoring Webfoot hoopers continued their ruthless assault on enemy baskets last week when they defeated Union Oil 66 to 32 and Southern Oregon Normal 72 to 43. In the five frays played so far the Oregon team has amassed a total of 212 points, as against 161 scored by opponents. Some figures to be better than 60 points per 40-minute period. Golden Bears Triumph, 46 to 34; Idaho Vandals Still Undefeated

PORTLAND, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The Golden Bears of the University of California opened an extended barnstorming tour here tonight with a 46 to 34 victory over Oregon State college.

The Bears took an early lead and increased it steadily, matching a late Beaver rally almost point for point, and springing a zone defense which the Staters could not penetrate consistently.

Carlyle, California center, netted five field goals and four free throws for 14 points and scoring honors. Other scoring was well distributed.

Play was rough, with 30 fouls called.

Sam Snead Takes Title at Nassau

Third Straight Par Keeps Him Ahead; Harrison Smashes Record

NASSAU, Bahamas, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Samuel Jackson Snead, White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., whose stretch finishes are almost as famous as his powerful tee shots, came from behind again today to win the \$3,500 Nassau open golf tournament with a 72-hole 276.

Snead added a third straight par 70 to his opening 66 to draw down top money of \$750 as Victor Ghezzi, Deal, N. J., the 54-hole leader, faded to a 73 today and finished one stroke back. Ghezzi earned \$550.

It was Snead's first victory since he won the St. Paul open this summer. His 276 was four under par for the route.

E. J. Harrison, Little Rock, Ark., stole the final day spotlight with a course record 64, six below par, to leap from 14th place to third and a \$450 prize at 278. Harrison's 31-33 record two strokes from the record 66 established by Snead Friday and equalled three times yesterday—twice by Ghezzi and once by Billy Burke, Bellair, Fla. Harrison, winner of the recent mid-south open at Pinehurst, N. C., had seven birdies.
