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1937-1938

Christmas eve the writer was driving north and passed through Centralia just at the close of the business day. It was snowing hard, and suddenly there appeared a figure standing at the edge of the highway. It was an "ex" Santa Claus. His hair and beard were snowy white cotton, but his plain overcoat was not the conventional red of the Santa uniform. He was thumping a ride. The cars whizzed by him, and indeed it was hardly safe to stop because of the snow and slippery paving. The figure of a Santa Claus reduced to the level of a hitchhiker was rather pathetic.

Santa had had his day of glory. Only a few hours before, no doubt, he had been the center of attraction in the gift shop. Children crowded around him, their eyes wide open as they sought to encompass all they could of the mystery of Santa Claus. He had passed out the candies, had listened to the wants of boys and girls, had worn joyfully the mask of the bountiful giver of toys and books and wagons. Now he was out on the road, and none so poor to give him a lift on his homeward way.

The analogy applies to 1937. Twelve months ago it was greeted with horns and bells and glad acclaim. New calendars went up on the wall. Three hundred sixty-five days later the calendars were worn out, ready for the wastebasket. Off go the 1937 license plates and into the ash can. Out goes the Christmas tree, its needles dropping, its tinsel and glitter no longer drawing exclamations of happiness. Out goes 1937 with a kick in the pants. Like the Centralia Santa it is just a hitchhiker down the road of time, while the stream-lined age takes up with the new hussie, 1938.

The veteran commentator is wary of making predictions, even at this time of year, when the mood of prophecy is most moving. After all, what would there be to life if we knew definitely what the year would bring, either of weal or woe? We would be mere robots, going through a routine. Even the Calvinist spares man knowledge of what is "fore-ordained" for him. If we knew what would happen life would be as joyless as the pulp of the grape when it comes from the vinepress. Because we do not know, but must face constantly new situations life becomes eternally fascinating, its distress and its suffering affording the variety which deepens one's experience.

What will 1938 do to us, pray tell? Or it might be asked, what will we do to 1938? We mold time; time does not mold human life and institutions. War will not come; we may bring it to pass. Prosperity will not come; we may bring it to pass. Good judgment procure it. Barring the rare accidents of nature, life is what people make it. What 1938 is, depends on what the people who occupy the land, who labor at jobs, who hold positions of responsible leadership, who keep the homes and run the schools, what all the people do. As they succeed in solving their personal problems and in working with others to solve common problems so will they succeed in making 1938 a reasonably happy year.

Local Flood Relief

The week's storms have shown the necessity for fresh study of the problem of taking care of the runoff of rainwater. Shelton ditch, which was planned as a protective measure, proved wholly inadequate. Moreover its success in drawing water off more rapidly from the flat southeast of the city created a greater water problem within the city. The heavy flow ran over streets and undermined bridges. It washed away walls erected by owners of property to protect their land against creek waters, and then washed away portions of their lands. The great increase in the amount of water poured into the lower portion of the ditch increased the damages along that stretch. It is a mistake to try to drain off all the broad flat swiftly down one funnel. The city and county will have to cooperate to do the job over and do it right. The Statesman joins the Capital Journal in urging careful engineering studies be made of the whole matter.

Mayor Kuhn says he intends to give attention to the drainage sewer questions. Salem has done a lot of work in building storm sewers, but more are needed. The new capital needs better accommodation to prevent backup in its basement rooms. Other parts of town got in serious trouble this week, and residents there are clamoring for relief.

The city can't do a complete job all at once. It is not financially possible to provide for all the excesses of nature. But the city can keep working, and Mayor Kuhn has an excellent record of accomplishment.

Jews Face new Oppression

No "happy new year" dawns for the Jews in Rumania. A reactionary government is coming into power, having won the recent elections over the old peasants' party. The new head of the government, Octavian Goga, is an extreme rightist; and his first declaration strikes at Rumanian Jews. The initial move is to expel all foreigners who became citizens since 1920, or to restrict their liberties of occupation to very narrow limits. Since thousands of Jews sought refuge in Rumania from other lands of oppression the blow is aimed at them particularly.

Nazi Germany has set the pace in this modern revival of persecution of the Jews. Poland has long tolerated anti-Jewish pogroms. Russia is perhaps the freest of any country from ostracism or oppression of the Jews, but Russia invites no immigration of any kind.

Oppressed in many lands where now he dwells, the "wandering Jew" faces the worst oppression of all, no place for further wandering. His future looks grim; yet the Jews have survived persecution for centuries. Out of that toughness they will derive strength to carry them on in the hope of ultimate toleration and security.

Police Criticism

The testimony in the Chaffee inquest does not reflect credit on the city police who handled the case, to say the least. The arresting officers assumed the man was drunk and threw him in the cell. The fact was that he had been assaulted. He was allowed to lie in the jail for several hours without observation, and later was taken out dead. Had he been given prompt medical attention there is a possibility that Chaffee might have lived.

The criticism of the officers is one of neglect. They would not knowingly let a man suffer. They were too careless in this case. Just what discipline can or should be enforced is up to the chief and the city government; but certainly there should be a tightening of regulations so that no repetition of the incident may occur. Eternal vigilance is one of the requirements of a police officer. The Chaffee case is a costly lesson in the necessity of exercising that vigilance.

What goes up must come down; and what comes down must run off, only those down below don't want it to come down on them. People above want to get the water out of their way; and the easiest method is to erect it downhill. The people down below don't like it, because it gives them floods. The improved drainage of fields and of roadways is not all good. It makes the floods worse, lowers the water table in the earth and thus causes a deficiency of moisture for growing crops. Floods begin with single drops of water. If they can be kept in small cups in the earth and allowed to run off gradually damage lower down is avoided, but that isn't agreeable to the folk who live up the creeks.

Greatest building boom 1-1-38
In history predicted by
leading research engineer

(Concluding from yesterday.)
"The world isn't finished. We don't even have a good foundation laid. We know very little about anything factually. What we need is more research aimed at finding new products to put our unemployed men and capital back to work. Research means progress."
The quoted words are those of Kettering to Shumway, author. He said to Smith, writer:

"We are told that the depression cost us billions, and yet a billion dollars a year would keep 500 or 600 research laboratories going full time, turning out ideas that would develop into new industries to starve off depression."

"We haven't enough trained men now, but if we had and this plan were carried out for a few years, there would be a 'HELP WANTED' sign on EVERY FACTORY DOOR IN AMERICA."

Further along, the Smith interview with Kettering reads: "What do I consider the most important research problem in the world today? The answer is simple: To find out why grass is green."

"I am not joking. I am so serious that I have put my own time and money into organizing such a research. . . I don't expect it to be solved in my lifetime, but I expect it to be solved some time, because it is the fundamental problem of man's existence on earth. Some little engine in the green of grass and leaf has the mystery of capturing energy from the sun's rays, and storing it. Thence came all the heat and power now stored in coal, wood, oil and natural gas."

"If we knew the secret we could build engines to transform enough radiation from the sun into heat or chemical energy or electricity to run our machinery. . . Incidentally, our study of 'why is grass green?' has already led us off on so many bypaths that it is hard to stick to the main road."

"With the information at hand it is possible to make at least 10,000 new organic compounds. If we had time to make all these, how many new things would be discovered?"

"Quoting further: 'When people say that depression and unemployment are caused by too much science and invention, they forget that there are two kinds of inventions: labor saving inventions and labor creating inventions. . . They think only of labor saving devices, forgetting that the other kind has CREATED SOME 10,000,000 JOBS in industries which didn't exist 30 years ago.'"

"Actually, technological development is behind the procession. We haven't had enough of it in recent years; haven't created enough new industries."
Still further: "One day in Dayton (Ohio) I had lunch with some doctors. I said, 'You doctors have the same problem I have: how to keep up with the research and at the same time earn a living.' They agreed. . . I decided to set up an endowment to pay a first class medical research man to keep up with what was going on in enough doctors. I explained it to the Dayton doctors in weekly meetings."

"A great many things came out of that. For one thing, we got together and developed an artificial fever machine. Fever used to be considered a disease. Now we know it is nature's remedy for disease. This machine can give a temperature of 106 degrees for five hours. At first, a patient had to spend three days in a hospital after treatment. Everybody said that was natural weakness resulting from the fever. But we kept hunting around and found it wasn't 'natural weakness.' It was because the patient sweated all the salt out of his body. So we gave the patient salt water next time. After the treatment he got into his car and drove home."

"Thus it is in research. As you work on one thing you find out others. Originally we were aiming that fever machine at a specific disease. Now we know it cures or alleviates a number of different diseases. The machines are now in many hospitals here and abroad. At recent international fever therapy meeting, it was predicted that the new treatment will revolutionize much of the practice of medicine." (It is understood that the Oregon state hospital already has one of the fever machines, and that experiments are being made with it in rendering insane people sane.)

The concluding words of the Reader's Digest version of the interview with Kettering follow: "The next 10 years are going to see a complete renaissance of engineering and scientific development. In labor-creation invention. It is all ahead of us. At every period in time there is somebody to say, 'I don't see what there is new to be done.' Go out and look."

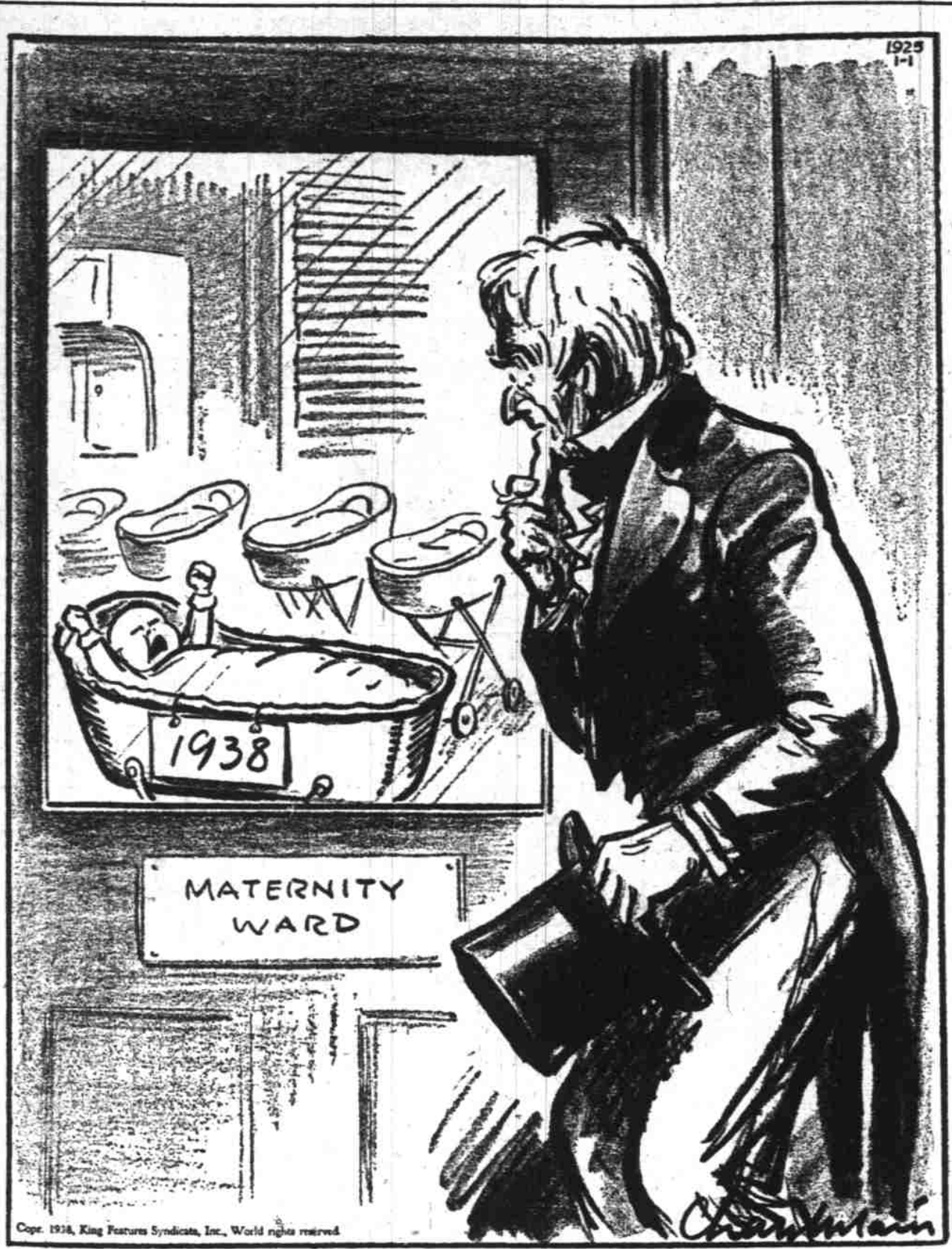
"If we can cast off the bugaboo of 'our world is finished,' and put in its place, 'the world is being made,' we have a marvelous future ahead of us."
