Veterans Receive
Holiday Gifts

Every disabled World war veteran who spent Christmas in a hospital received a gift from the American Legion auxiliary, said Mrs. Alfred Williams, rehabilitation chairman of Capital unit of the auxiliary.

The number of veterans receiving auxiliary remembrances this Christmas was larger than last year when gifts went to 80,741 disabled men in hospitals, at an expenditure of \$183,497.53. In many of the hospitals the auxiliary also gave Christmas parties and entertainment for the veterans. The Christmas program was part of the continuous activity of the auxiliary for the welfare of the men who sacrificed health and strength in the World war, explained Mrs. Williams.

In addition to providing Christmas cheer for the men in the hospitals, the auxiliary assured these men that their families at home were having a happy Christmas. Through a nation-wide family contact service, the families of the hospitalized veterans were visited and necessities for a happy Christmas supplied to those in need. Last year 21,919 families were aided in this way.

The program included readings by Leola Huddleston and Audrey Tucker, the latter also giving a vocal solo. Ethel Lawless played a piano solo.

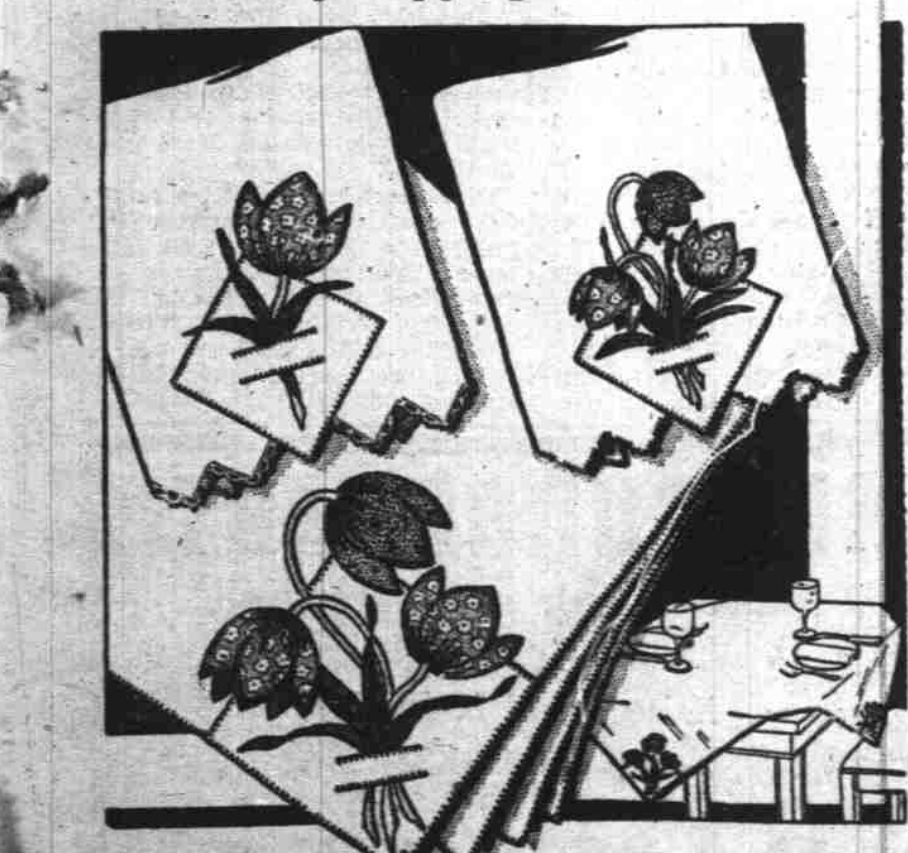
Miss Robertson Tea

Miss Freda Miller, who directed a seven-month survey of the working women's needs in New York city found out a lot of things about wages and living conditions that have nothing to do with our away out west. But she also figured out how much food the average girl takes on in the course of a year.

Here are the surprising figures which she gleaned from the survey. Each year a girl eats:

184 pounds of flour, bread, and cereals.
182 quarts of milk.
137 pounds of potatoes.
72 pounds of tomatoes and citrus fruit.
111 pounds of leafy, green and yellow vegetables.
176 pounds of other vegetables and fruits, including dried ones.
44 pounds of fats.
42 pounds of sugars.
78 pounds of lean meat, poultry and fish.
Those foods, or their equivalent, plus tea or coffee "for pleasure if not for nourishment."

No wonder that what goes in one's mouth is mighty important when the New Year's budget is being prepared.

Ice Cream Mixed as Purchased

Having ice cream put in the cartons half-half as it is purchased makes a more interesting dessert. Chocolate and peppermint will combine in the dessert dishes much to the pleasure of the diners. Strawberry and lemon make a good combination. Fruit salad combines with lime. Almonds, heated in butter and moistened with maple syrup will make a sauce to top vanilla ice cream for a professional touch. Chocolate sauce with whipped cream folded in will make an elegant topping for chocolate flavored cream. Chocolate peppermint dollars melted slowly in the double boiler makes another sauce to go over the frozen dessert.

Fruits Will Mix in Salad Bowls

Tangerines and bananas make excellent mid-winter salads. Cut the bananas and roll in chopped sautéed peanuts or almonds. Arrange on lettuce with the tangerine sections.

Cashed pineapple, tangerine sections, banana slices and whipped cream with mayonnaise make another combination of fruits that pleases the family or will be welcomed by guests.

A good old ham and egg serving on a dinner plate, especially for Saturday evening when the family is plenty hungry, makes a favorite meal for winter. Serve two eggs, two thin slices of ham, and a hot vegetable to each grownup.

Rice makes the main dish for Monday's dinner and makes the whole course.

Cottage cheese-pear salad
Rice a la Riston
Curled celery
Banana shortcake
RICE A LA RISTON
1 1/2 cups cooked rice
2 slices bacon, chopped fine
1/2 medium sized cabbage, chopped
1/2 teaspoon parsley
1/2 cup stock or bouillon.
Cook cabbage with bacon for 30 minutes over a slow fire. Add other ingredients, salt and pepper to taste and cook 15 minutes.

Baked Beans Among Popular Recipes

The deliciousness of baked beans is said to rest largely with the pot. An old stone jug that's been used for years produces a better batch of beans by far than a bright shiny new container. Here is a good recipe, further success of the dish must rest with the bean pot.

BOSTON BAKED BEANS

Pick over one quart pea beans, cover with cold water and soak over night. In morning drain, cover with fresh water, heat slowly (keeping water below boiling point), and cook until skins will burst, which is best determined by taking a few beans on the tip of a spoon and blowing on them, when skins will burst if sufficiently cooked. Drain. Put small piece of salt pork or ham end in bottom of bean pot. Put beans in pot and bury more pork in beans, with some on top. Mix and add one tablespoon salt, one tablespoon molasses, and three tablespoons sugar and enough boiling water to cover. Cover, put in oven, and bake slowly six or eight hours, uncovering the last hour of cooking, so pork may become brown and crisp. Add water as needed. Many feel sure that by adding with seasoning one-half tablespoon mustard, the beans are more easily digested. If pork mixed with lean is preferred, use less salt. Use earthenware bean pot.

Lemon Cheese Is Sweet Spread

Lemon cheese is an old world spread from England and goes on toast or bread. If you are going out to dinner take a small jar as a gift to your hostess or plan to use when company comes to your house.

Combine 6 well beaten eggs, 2 cups sugar, 1/2 cup lemon juice and 1/4 cup butter, cook over hot water until thick, pour into sterilized bottle or jar and seal with paraffin.
