

Clubs Enjoy Joint Affair

Accurate History Relies on Hudson Bay Records, Barker Avows

DALLAS — A joint dinner meeting of the Dallas chamber of commerce, Lions club, Dallas Woman's club and the Junior Woman's club was held Tuesday night in the chamber of commerce rooms in the new city hall. The meeting is an annual affair sponsored by the Woman's club. Mrs. Raleigh Middleton acted as toastmaster.

Brief talks were given by Mrs. H. D. Peterson, president of the Woman's club; Mrs. Ray McKee, president of the Junior Woman's club; Wayne Hawke, president of the Lions club; and by Oscar Hayter, on behalf of the chamber.

Mrs. Ivan E. Warner arranged an interesting program of readings and musical numbers. These included numbers by Mrs. Ethel James Thompson, whistler, of Portland; a reading and pantomime by Miss Mary Jane Hottel of Salem and two vocal solos by Hubert Springsteen, accompanied by Daniel Abel.

Barker Is Speaker
Burt Brown Barker, vice-president of the University of Oregon and guest speaker, gave an interesting talk in which he told of his experiences a year ago when he and Dr. Clarke, head of the history department of the University of Oregon, spent five months at London examining the records of the Hudson Bay company. He traced the history of the Hudson Bay company as given by these records and gave a vivid account of the struggle between the Northwest Fur company and the Hudson Bay company to gain control of the valuable furs in the northern part of North America. He said for a time after signing of the treaty of Utrecht in 1713 it seemed that the Hudson Bay company might win out in the struggle for a monopoly of this trade, but that soon the Northwest again was a bitter rival. In the years from 1817 to 1821 the rivalry was so bitter that the records show that neither company made any profit.

In 1821 the two companies merged and soon after this John McLoughlin, who played such an important part in the history of Oregon, was sent out by the new company as chief factor in charge of all the posts west of the Rocky mountains. Sir George Simpson became governor of the territory.

Need Records for History
Mr. Barker stated that an accurate history of Oregon and of the northwest cannot be written until the records, now in their archives in London, to be published.

In closing he brought out some very interesting facts which are not generally known about Oregon history but which were revealed on studying these old records.

Among these is the prevalent idea that McLoughlin was "fired" by the company for giving too much aid to the American missionaries and pioneers, who were settling here, but these records show he resigned because of an illness between Governor Simpson and himself on the death of Simpson's son.
