Agent Sued by Car Purchaser

Cannot Get 1938 License for Machine, Alleged in Circuit Court

A \$5990 damage action over an automobile sale was filed in circuit court yesterday against Bozell-Grimson Motors, Inc., and its surety, Massachusetts Bonding & Insurance company, by Amos Jarvis, the purchaser of the car involved. The contract was one of a trade-in of Jarvis' old car for a used 1934 model.

The complaint alleges the defendant motor company through its agents, Earl Hatfield, misrepresented that it owned the 1934 machine and that as a result of the plaintiff's not actually receiving certificate of title, he has not been able to have the use of the car because he has not been able to obtain a 1938 license for it.

The plaintiff seeks \$490 damages on the trade, \$250 damages for loss of use of the car, \$250 attorney fees and \$5000 punitive damages.

Healthy Condition Seen, Bank Report

Despite evidence elsewhere of a "recession" in business, a healthy condition is reflected in the statement of condition issued Wednesday by Ladd & Bush, Bankers, in response to a call by the state superintendent of banks.

The bank has over a million dollars more outstanding in loans than it had a year ago. The present figure is \$5,288,235.20 compared to \$4,135,665.91 at the corresponding call last January.

The report shows a drop in deposits from \$11,612,304.45 to \$11,062,900.49, which may be viewed partly as evidence that more of the resources of the community are "at work."

Chaffee Inquest Cost Announced

The inquest into the death of George D. Chaffee, 52, who died in the city jail last December 18, cost \$63.50, according to a report filed yesterday with County Clerk C. G. Boyer by Coroner L. E. Barrick. The proceedings were spread over two days, December 29 and 30.

Costs of the inquest included \$25.50 for witnesses' fees and mileage, \$18 for six jurors, \$15 for court reporter and the \$5 fee of the coroner.

The coroner's jury found that Chaffee died as a result of being struck with an unknown object by an unknown person.

Gosslin Indefinite On Congress Race

W. L. Gosslin, private secretary to Governor Charles H. Martin, has not decided definitely whether he will be a candidate for congress from the first congressional district, he announced Wednesday.

"I am waiting word from the 17 counties included in the congressional district," Gosslin said. In case Gosslin is a candidate for congress in this district it will be necessary for him to change his residence. He is now a legal resident of Multnomah county. Gosslin is a democrat.

This will be the Sons' first meeting in the school building under permission recently granted by the school board.

Bliven said memberships would be granted at this meeting to all eligible boys. Refreshments will be served.

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Dr. Stone's Estate Is Over \$200,000

Appraisal Reveals \$50,000 in Cash, Remainder in Bonds, Property

An appraisal value of \$200,000 was placed on the estate of the late Dr. S. C. Stone in a report filed in probate court yesterday by Arthur Smith, C. C. Ward and J. C. Perry. Of this amount, \$50,570.04 was shown as cash.

Real property of the estate was appraised at only \$10,500, including a valuation of \$6500 on the south 26 feet, 2 inches of lot two, block 22, Salem, with certain exceptions, and of \$4000 on the north 42 1/2 feet of lot three, block 24, Salem. A half interest in a party wall owned by decedent and Arthur H. Moore was valued at \$100. City of Bend tax anticipation warrants were listed at \$420.

The remainder of the estate, totaling \$132,254.58, was shown to consist of small blocks of bonds of Oregon and Washington cities, counties and school districts, and of several thousand dollars' worth of investment trust shares.

The only worthless item of the estate shown in the appraisal was a City of Bend warrant.

The order recited that defendant had voluntarily submitted to remedial treatment.

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Sidelights on Air Broadcasting Told

KOIN's Kirkham Speaker Here; Sports Account Most Intricate

Life's no bed of roses for the man who broadcasts reports of a football game is the opinion of Arthur Kirkham, who does the job for KOIN, Portland. The sportscaster is accused of prejudice for one team or the other, of not knowing his stuff, of using too many or too few adjectives, of not giving the essentials the listeners demand. "It's the infection, not what we say, that gets us in bad," said Kirkham who addressed the Rotary club Wednesday.

"Spotter" Valuable Aide—Kirkham explained the methods used by the announcer to get the facts accurately. On each side he has a spotter, a man closely in touch with each team, an assistant manager or player out of the game for the day. The spotter knows the players and on each play signals by electric device the names of those taking part. Another man behind the announcer checks for distances and passes up a slip with that information. The broadcast is logged and each time the time is recorded and the score is announced.

This to refute the claims of fans that announcers fail to give the score for long periods.

Persons on national broadcast programs work under high tension for rehearsals and performance. The March of Time cast work for then lays off a week for necessary rest.

Radio, said Kirkham, has grown amazingly in its 17 years. His station, he said, exercised a strict censorship so that no spoken word would offend anybody in the listening audience.

Land Blocking Is Topic Here Today

Blocking of Oregon grazing lands, as proposed by the state land board, will be discussed at a meeting here today to be attended by F. R. Carpenter, federal, federal director of grazing. Carpenter was invited to come to Oregon by Governor Charles H. Martin and other state officials.

Educators from all parts of the state were expected to attend the meeting which will be held in the executive department.

The blocking Oregon grazing lands was first proposed by State Treasurer Holman. He said such a plan would operate to the advantage of the livestock interests and increase the receipts of the irrevocable school fund.

Mill Vote Probe Being Continued

Investigators for the executive department yesterday were still probing charges that national labor relations board representatives exerted influence in the recent election of employees of the Inman-Poulson mill in Portland. Governor Charles H. Martin reported.

The charges were filed by B. W. Sleeman and other representatives of the AF of L. The CIO won the election by a two to one vote.

Governor Martin indicated that the investigation would be completed later this week.

The national labor relations board previously had designated the CIO as the collective bargaining agency at the Inman-Poulson plant.

be achieved, and the democratic process implies that those differences of opinion will be given a hearing, that there will be "a decent respect for the opinion of mankind," and a sincere and honest attempt to obtain a consensus of opinion.

But the very process of thinking is bludgeoned by this administration.

Mr. Ickes talks about "certain kept newspapers and kept commentators" who have been criticizing the administration, and he advises big business to "call off its newspapers and commentators." Apart from the fact that even big business enjoys certain constitutional rights, name names Mr. Ickes. Name the commentators who are "kept" by big business in this country. Name them, and give them recourse to justice under the laws of libel.

Because if you do not name them you smear with that allegation every commentator who disagrees with the program of this administration in whole or in part. And that is a coward's trick, and not worthy of you, Mr. Ickes!

If today one says that the situation is dangerous, one is accused of endangering fear. But the chief thing we have to be afraid of is unwillingness to face reality, and the substitution of agitation for deliberation, of slogans for thought, of guesswork for analysis. This is the only thing we are fighting for!

You can't do it any longer with mirrors! It is up to this New Year's congress to begin examining the validity of the criticism that is coming from liberals and conservatives alike, and that is coming on some questions with a quite astonishing amount of unanimity. I wish for us all, for the new year, a congress that is no longer willing to be a Nazi Reichstag.

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
