36 Rounds on CYO Program

Thirty-six rounds of amateur fisticuffs are in store for fistic fray lovers at the armory tonight, where the local CYO simon-pures play host to the Multnomah Athletic club fighters.

Bushnell Assumes Sports Czarship

37-Year old Princetonian Heads Huge Eastern Athletic Setup

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Asa S. Bushnell today plunged into duties that eventually may make the 37-year-old Princeton graduate the most powerful figure in intercollegiate athletics.

Officially he is the executive director of eastern intercollegiate athletics. Just what all that entails not even he himself knows.

He does know, however, he has been hired to serve a gigantic but loosely woven federation in which 55 colleges, 11 associations and seven sports are involved.

Each Unit Distinct Each association will keep its entity, but Bushnell will be the administrative officer of each. Whether he will be strictly an administrative officer, or will be called upon to settle disputes depends on the federated organizations themselves.

"I've got to feel my way along at first," he said. "There is no precedent to guide me. I have some definite ideas on the running of such events as the ICAAAA track and field meets but would rather not say just what they are until after I have talked them over with the directors."

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Colorful Trainer Of Colonels Dies

ASHLAND, Ky., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Roscoe Brumfield, negro football trainer and rubber, whose day of glory came in 1931 when he entertained Cambridge fans after Centre's "Praying Colonels" had downed mighty Harvard, 6 to 0, is dead here, victim of an automobile accident. He was 55 years old.

Roscoe, in checkered pants, yellow vest, cut-away coat and silk hat, sat on the bench with "Uncle Charlie" Moran, the coach, and out-yelled everybody else when "Bo" McMillin scored the winning touchdown. His dress and antics attracted a crowd after the game and while the Harvard band played he cake-walked to the delight of thousands.

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Ousting Chaos in Boxing World Aim

International Agreements Proposed to Prevent Current Confusion

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Plans to bring some order out of chaos in the prize fight business, from an international standpoint, were set forth today for the benefit of New York's boxing writers by Edward C. Foster of Providence, R. I., executive secretary of the National Boxing association.

Foster, a wealthy importer who has been instrumental in removing many causes of confusion from the American prize scene, will present a standardization program to the International Boxing conference scheduled at Rome, Italy, beginning April 11.

Chief among the proposals on which it is hoped to obtain international agreement are: (1) appointment of an international committee to decide on world champions, to eliminate present confusion; (2) adoption of a universal "no-foul" rule; (3) requirement that all title matches be at 15 rounds; (4) adoption of a uniform system of point scoring; (5) cooperation of all countries on suspension or other disciplinary measures; and (6) better control of amateur boxing, to eliminate "bootleg" promotion and semi-professionalism.
