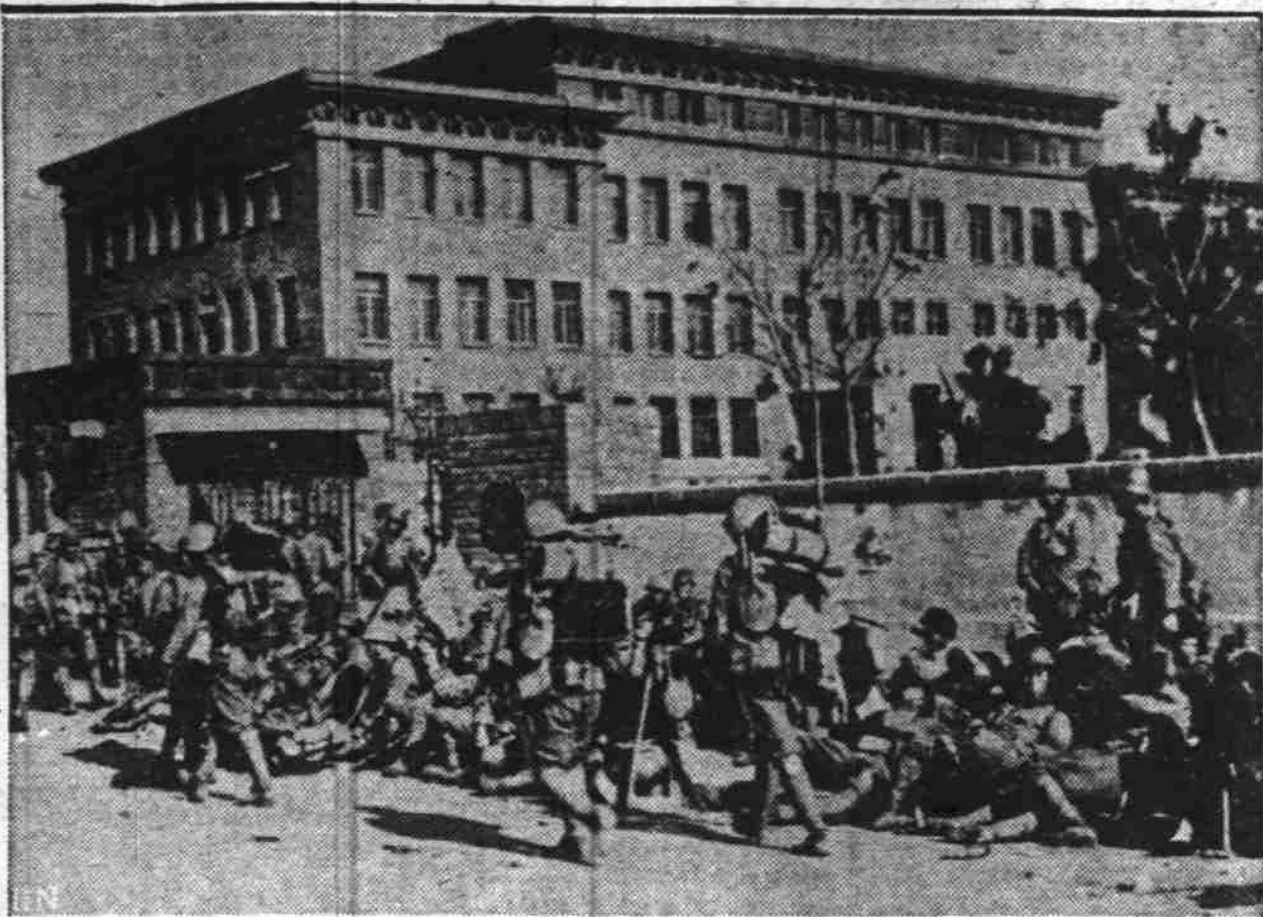
Offer Chemical Engine

The total sale for the year was \$49,890.40, an increase of \$2,352.58 over 1936.

The heaviest month for the year was December with a sale of \$6,499.52 and July with a sale of \$3,622.16 was the lowest.

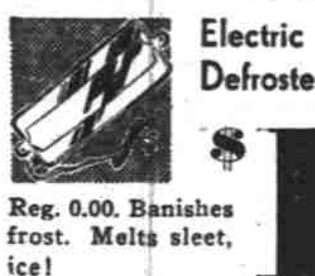

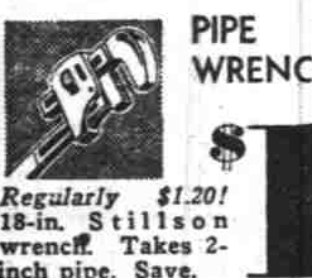

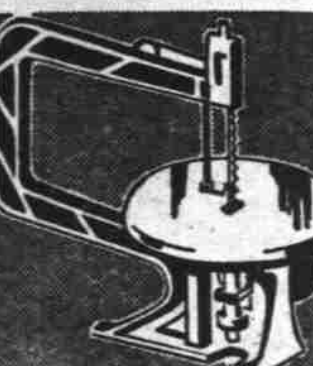
