

### Gas Service Is Soon Restored

#### Corvallis, Lebanon Last to Be Linked up Again Following Checkup

The downtown area. Service was maintained through the supply of gas in the storage holder here and the small back flow from a two-inch main near Oswego.  
Although patrons were waked up at all hours of the night by the crews of servicemen, they were uniformly cooperative and helpful in assisting the company in restoring service without hazards to any user, gas company officials reported.

Salem was the first city in the group to receive complete restoration of service, mainly because of the nearness to the main supply in Portland and because many customers had service throughout the off period.

Service to South Corvallis was restored at 3 p.m. Independence was back on the lines completely at 3:30 yesterday. Dallas customers were reached and all appliances checked by 4. Albany was on the lines at 5 p.m. Corvallis and Lebanon were 90 per cent connected at 5:15 p.m.

A record for speed in calling on customers, turning off services and then calling back to check appliances and turn off gas by the crews in their 18-hour shift-night job. They reached most of the 5300 customers in the district in that period.  
The job was carried through without accidents or delays. Emergency turnouts were made first, with hospitals, state institutions, children's homes and others getting first call.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7-(P)—Chairman Whittington (D-Miss) of the flood control committee said today house committee consideration of a flood control bill to provide for irrigation of the John Day valley in Oregon had been set for January 10, but might have to be changed.

Representative Walter M. Pierce of Oregon said from the new report, feasibility of the proposed program to build reservoirs and use pooled water for irrigation could be determined.

### Pension Revenue Petition Is Near

Petitions for the initiative measure authorizing the licensing and taxing of many gambling and recreational devices were to be placed in circulation in Oregon within the next two weeks, according to information received here Friday. The preliminary petition was filed in the state department some time ago.

Under the provisions of the initiative measure a large percentage of the funds derived from taxes and licenses would be used for old age assistance.

Sponsors of the measure estimated that \$3,000,000 would be raised annually.  
The measure has the support of the Oregon Merchants Legislative league and a number of other organizations.

### Tuesday Opinion On Pinball Seen

The state supreme court next Tuesday is expected to hand down an opinion as to whether the operation of pinball games and slot machines are a lottery and in violation of the gambling provision of the state constitution.

The case came before the supreme court from Polk county where Circuit Judge Arlie Walker held that the pinball machines were legal under a legislative act which authorized them to be licensed. Arguments in the case were heard by the supreme court a month ago.

In many counties of the state operation of the machines have been banned while in other counties they are operating pending a decision of the supreme court.

### Asks Duty Lifting On Flax Scutchers

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7-(P)—Representative Pierce (D-Ore) asked congress to amend the tariff act to permit the free importation of flax scutching machinery.

He said it was impossible to obtain the necessary machinery from American manufacturers.
