

Davis Estate Report Made

Additional Building Plan for This Year; Board Is Relected

TURNER—The trustees of the Cornelia A. Davis estate, at their annual meeting received encouraging reports from the different committees. All financial affairs are reported to the county court semi-annually and are on file and become a public record.

Under a court order during the past year, the two properties have been joined under one head, the Memorial Home which was built before Mrs. Davis died and is used for the home of retired ministers and their wives, and the "court" consisting of six modern cottages, to be used for the homes of needy old people, as directed by the will of Mrs. Davis. Also a cottage near the main building is in use. In all 26 persons have been occupants of the properties during the past year.

Estate Value Holds
A total of 269 acres and four city lots of the estate have been sold, all bills have been paid and the value of the estate has not decreased.

Members of the court committee are Thomas Brunk, T. C. Crabtree and Edward Townsend who gave a favorable general report including the upkeep of building and the irrigated landscaped lawns and gardens, the latter yielding well. Sixteen people have benefited during the year from the cottage homes, which are recognized as ranking with any such plan.

Mrs. E. J. Gilstrap is matron for all the groups and Dr. W. M. Thorne is house physician. The general health has been good. The report of Superintendent E. J. Gilstrap was optimistic. The memorial library building is used more each year by the public; it contains besides a valuable library, a museum, an art studio in the fireplace room, an office and fireproof file case.

Plan More Building
The few acres extending east of the main building to Mill creek is to be platted for cottages for future use. G. E. Williams, field representative, is at present raising funds for the project, hoping it will be possible to build the first cottage within the year. The trust for the Memorial Home was made 11 years ago; the report showed it to be in good shape.

Superintendent E. J. Gilstrap was reelected as were the trustees: Dr. H. C. Epley, president; Curtis C. Cole, vice president; Norris J. Reasoner, secretary. Henry Leep and Elmore J. Gilstrap.

Sutherland's conclusions were predicted upon the prospect that the local system was in danger of being sold for county taxes, and he admonished patrons to get behind the institution with all practicable speed in a concerted effort to tide the affairs over the present billowy financial bumps.

Delinquent taxes and interest thereon were revealed by the secretary's report to be approximately \$500 at this time. The county tax collector had warned the association that forced sale of its property would follow failure to meet the tax debt.
