

Lebanon Timber Company Changes Hands; Reopening Looms

Seits Bids in Lumber Plant

Announces Mill at Lebanon Sold by Sheriff, Will Resume Labors

LEBANON—At a public sale Saturday on the grounds occupied by the Fir Lumber company plant, Deputy Sheriff Mike Southard sold the personal property of the mill including buildings, machinery, tools and pond equipment to M. W. Seits for \$12,500 to satisfy a judgment of \$18,952.58 secured by his client H. E. McCracken.

There was no other bid although there was a large group present at the sale.

Seits stated that operations at the mill will be resumed immediately. The real property in which the Fir Lumber company holds title will be sold February 5.

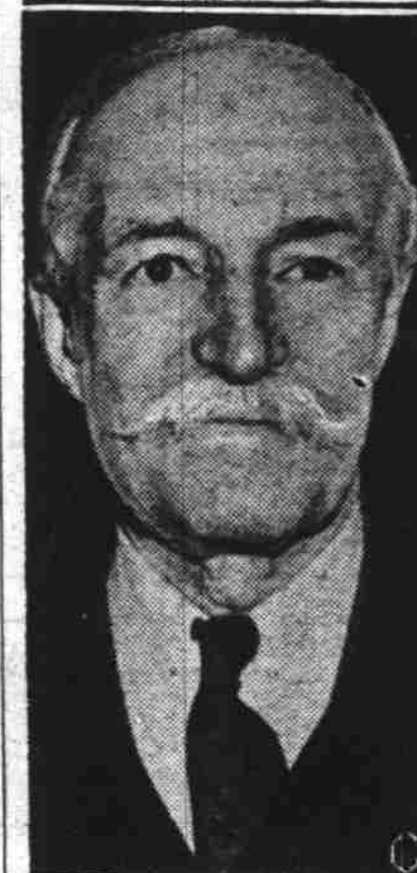

Father John Williams Tuesday, 9:30 a. m., at St. Edwards Catholic church.
